

Spoiler Alert - The Revenant

It is not often that the title of a Hollywood film gets me scurrying for the dictionary, but that was the case with Leonardo DiCaprio's latest, *The Revenant*. The word, I discovered, comes from the French 'revenir' meaning 'to come back'. In English 'revenant' can be used of one who returns from a long journey, or a spirit coming back from the dead – a ghost.

In the film DiCaprio plays a man who returns from the brink of death. Fur Trapper Hugh Glass is severely mauled by a bear whilst on a hunting expedition on the American frontier in the 1820s. One member of the hunting party, John Travers (played by Tom Hardy), not wanting to be encumbered by the injured man on their journey back to civilisation, leaves Glass for dead in a shallow grave, and murders his half-Indian son, Hawk. In spite of his terrible injuries Glass manages to escape the grave, and so begins his arduous journey to find Travers and have his revenge. The subtitle of the novel by Michael Punke on which the film is based is — A Novel of Revenge.

My brother and I were able to watch the film on the IMAX screen in Broughton. The cinematography was as breathtakingly beautiful as the action sequences and storyline were gruesome. I can understand why *The Revenant* has been nominated for a host of Oscar awards.

There are a number of religious motifs in the film, particularly the theme of death and rebirth. Jesus Christ is, so Christians believe, the ultimate revenant. Following his ghastly execution, he is laid in a tomb. On the first Easter Sunday he emerges from the grave, not as a revived casualty nor as a ghost, but as one who has undergone bodily resurrection, and he appears to his followers. However, the mission of the risen Lord Jesus is not one of revenge but of grace and mercy. He had prayed for those who crucified him, 'Father, forgive them'. He now greets the disciples who had abandoned him and denied him in his hour of greatest need with the words, 'Peace, be with you.' He commissioned them to go into all the world with his message of forgiveness and grace.

The Revenant is a powerful film about revenge. The story of Jesus, the greatest story ever told, is about the triumph of mercy over revenge, love over hatred and life over death.


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Memories of an oilfield man

Ras Shokeir-1974 (continued)

Climbing over the four ft hand rail of Rig Tender 3,then stepping back onto the Quay side, I say Quayside but it was more like big boulders piled on the water's edge in the gulf of Suez, four inch braided mooring lines secured the Tender to the steel capstans these were sunk into a concrete base, with the water being so shallow and clear one could see the sea life, crabs small octopus and fish, quite often we would see Barracuda swimming around the tender they were attracted by the smaller fish, later on I would realise what an amazing fighting fish these were when caught on rod and line, (pity about the Tender, it looked like a pile of scrap dragged up off the sea bed) but I later became very attached to it, in those early days we treated our Rigs like football teams, rig crews from other companies would argue and become very competitive over them, but as I stepped onto that Quayside into that scrapyard into the unbelievable heat, I could not believe that I would be one those people,

"Right Tom, lets show you around the dock side" Jimmy King said, I was still coming to terms with his southern accent, "Tell me Jim, if this is a dock why are there no other ships etc." I imagined the docks to be like Liverpool docks or maybe a little smaller "well it's not a real dock as such, but it was the only place available where we could work in shallow water, the main port of Ras-Gharib

is about five miles away but there is some sort of community here though, come on I will show you around the camp" he replied,

"when do I start my shift and what are my working hours Jim" I asked "and what the hell is expected of me, if there is no Rig, no working cranes that I can see, no drilling operations, what is my position here?" he just stood there with a silly smile "I guess nobody has explained or told you anything about this operation. If they did, you would be on the next plane back to the UK"

"Ok lay it on the line and give it to me straight what's my job"? He looked at me took off his baseball cap scratched his head then spoke, "I am a Driller, but there is no rig as yet, Eric is the chief mechanic, but there is no engines as such, Brian is the chief electrician, we have expat assistant drillers but we are not drilling, we have three months to prepare the unit into a drilling mode, we have any amount of local labour, but is easier for us to do the work ourselves than try and explain what is required and use the locals to fetch and carry, we also have a 140ton crawler crane on site that is yours, we also have a couple of fork lift and dumper trucks for site use", then he continued "As you know nearly all of Rig 22 is from the rig Aquarius that was recovered from the sea bed the electricians and the mechanics have a couple of local Egyptian trades men to help them but your crew will be from local villages so their English is zero, your job will be jack of all trades, the main one is to have all the derrick sandblasted ready for spray painting it has been dismantled and in sections, after painting you will get together with the engineers and drill crew, make a detailed drawing of the derrick then paint numbers on each section so that it can be easily reassembled if you can find any casual workers amongst your labourers that will make roustabouts for when we start drilling all the better, but they will not be employed by our company IDC, we have to go through the local headman, and pay him their wages and he takes his cut it's the system",

"Hold on a minute Jim you must be joking I am a bloody crane op/deck supervisor not a rig engineer, or a scaffolder, or professional rig painter", I replied,

"but according to your cv you have your certificate for erecting scaffolding and also completed, and have a certificate in painting through National paints Co for Offshore painting"

"But that's for maintenance only around the rig, what IDC is asking is way beyond my experience and I certainly would not be prepared to put people's lives at risk just to get the rig ready in time for drilling," I was absolutely gobsmacked "we have had four crane op/deck supervisors in the last month, they decided that this project was just far too much for them and decided that they could not handle it, then demanded a return ticket back to the UK, but I have a feeling you are not one of the

normal Limeys (sorry Tom) guys we have had in the last few weeks" he gave me the impression that he would like me to accept these conditions I thought to hell with it why not and decided yep, I will give it my best shot and see what life has in store for me although it was the most challenging start of my career I was glad I did, and believe me it was very, very challenging.

Too late to back out now, I asked Jim for a guided tour around the camp, which was a little away from the Quayside, there were a number of portable cabins but there were two cabins joined together set apart from the others, outside there were four oil drums filled with concrete, a scaffold pole in each and a tarpaulin cover for shade and approximately twenty foot by twenty foot "what's this place" I asked, "that belongs to the Comex divers, and sometimes they share it with the chopper pilots, we call it the clubhouse and after work we all get together under the cover have a few cold beers and shoot the bull, I will introduce you to the guy's later when you settle in, some of the men you meet out here are so different from any you have worked with before nearly all of the pilots are Vietnam veterans and they are crazy guys", the war was just ending so there were a bunch of guy's trying to sort their lives out and for some reason the American people treated them as outcasts and seem to blame them for the war but I found they were a great bunch of guy's and made good friends with the ones that I met,

"what sort of hours do we work and when do I start" I asked Jim, "all of the expats meet at in the office (porta cabin) at 6am for a pre shift talk, your mate Melvin is in charge(rig manager without a rig at the moment)he will brief everyone on the days expectations, give you a list of work to be done, normally it's an impossible amount of work for all of us, but we do our best, we try and finish for 6 pm," I asked Jim "why did he take an instant dislike to me or was he like that with everyone" he replied in his deep Southern drawl "he is a god damn coonass" this was the first time that I had heard of this expression "what on earth is a coonass "I asked," that's a person who comes from Louisiana and the Mississippi and pretty low in manners "he replied, as if that explained everything, I was none the wiser, so I let it pass,

It was still early afternoon, Jimmy told me it was too late for me to get changed and start work so we can just amble around and get use to the area, I noticed a few shacks constructed of plywood and pallets I asked him what they were for, "there are quite a few knocking around here, after the six day war with Israel in 1967 there were a number of displaced people with no homes and the government would not give them work permits so they hang around here hoping for some casual labour and they live in those shacks" he replied, I must say their living conditions were appalling I asked Jim about their toilet facilities, "you will see them going over into the sand dunes with their can of water and nothing else, they use one hand for their toilet use and the other for eating "sorry I asked,

I noticed a number of dogs roaming around the cabins and shack's, when I mentioned this to him, he told me these dogs just hang around the camp living on scraps, but the dog's you have to be aware of are the desert dogs they are nearly all of a yellow/sandy colour they roam in packs and sometimes come into the camp, they can be dangerous, and sometimes rabid,

"I reckon we will get back to the office now get some working gear for you, then get you settled in you cabin, have a bite to eat then we will go over to the Comex bar(four scaffold poles with the tarpaulin cover) for some ice cold beers, we all contribute towards the cold beer etc, In the morning we get to the galley around 5am have some breakfast, there is a cook(of sorts) and two galley hands they also clean the cabins" "Is Rig 22 our only rig in the Gulf? "I asked, "No we also have Rig 21 Tender5 with the barge Estralita, our barge is called the Zarah, but rig 21 has been drilling for 6mths now, most of the expats who work on it live in Maadi in Cairo there are a couple of guys who commute to and from the UK, their wives refused to move here, so they are on a single man's contract" he replied, "Is that where you live and do you have a family here with you" I asked him, "Yep, my wife Pat, we have both been married before, she has a daughter Barbie, and I have a daughter Lynne, and we both have a son Thumper, aged four,(his hers and ours)"in the years that I knew Jim I only ever knew his son as Thumper,

I was glad to be back inside the air conditioned cabin, Melvin Whitmire leaning back in his chair feet on the table "well what do you think our set up here" straight to the point, he never called me

by my name in the time that we worked together, (about 8mths until he transferred away from me I will explain the reason why in a later issue) I thought I would wind him up a little, "you know something Melvin, It is a lot better than I expected, I've lived in a lot worse places in Liverpool. I Think I will enjoy the challenge, and if all of my co-workers are as nice and affable as you then it's going to be great" the other guys sitting around all gave me the thumbs up, Melvin took it as a compliment I think, but the gauntlet was thrown down, any way enough of that. the rest will come later "So Jims explained what's required of you" yep and I cannot wait to get started in the morning and meet my crew",




Tom had other things on his mind.

Technical Corner by Joseph Caruana

It is common practice that when solids, liquids, and gases are heated they expands, and when cooled they contract. The rate at which they expand and contract depends on their physical structure. For example, steel expands and contracts at a much slower rate than air. The amount of expansion and contraction of a substance depends on what is known as the coefficient of expansion. Each substance has a different coefficient of expansion, which is why different substances expands and contracts by different amounts. Because of its rate of expansion and contraction, air is used in a comprehensive range of applications, where rapid expansion and contraction is required. One such application is found in what is known as the Sterling engine which is another British invention. The figure below shows a cross sectional view of a basic functional sterling engine, and it works as follows.



When the displacer piston moves back and forth within the displacer cylinder, it reciprocates the air within the cylinder. As the air moves from the cold workspace to the hot workspace it expands, thus creating a pressure within the cylinder. The pressure pushes the power piston outwards, which will in turn rotate the flywheel via the connecting rod. When the displacer piston reverses its position, it pushes the air to the cold side where it contracts and creates a vacuum. The vacuum will pull the power piston inwards which will continue rotating the flywheel. As long as there is a temperature difference between the two ends of the displacer cylinder, the air will continue to expand and contract each time the displacer piston reciprocates it within the cylinder.

These days, sterling engines comes in different forms and sizes, some are very simple and can be bought in kit form, others are more advanced with the probability of being more complicated. Nevertheless, irrespective of how advanced these engines have become, the origin started in this country, and it was invented in this country by Rev. Sterling.

These were received from Councillors D. Rule, G. Sherwood (Vice-Chairman) and R. Williams (Chairman).

DECLARATION OF INTEREST – MEMBERS CODE OF CONDUCT

There were no declarations of interest.

POLICE LIAISON

PCSO 3461 Poppy Hadfield-Jones was present at the meeting. She presented an Incident update report.

04/11/2015 - Anti-social behaviour (personal) - this is a civil issue.

04/11/2015 - Anti-social behaviour (personal).

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11/11/2015 – Criminal damage to a vehicle (slight – not noticed immediately).

18/11/2015 – Anti-social behaviour.

18/11/2015 – Contact record (possibly not an incident but was necessary for Police to have communication).

Community Beat Managers are going to be phased out. Generic changes are to take place within the Police Force – how neighbourhood policing teams will function – these changes will not be drastic. Plain clothes officers are to work with the Community Police Team.

MINUTES

The minutes of the monthly meeting held on Tuesday 1st December 2015 had been circulated to all members. It was proposed by Councillor R. Hughes and seconded by Councillor Terry Hughes that the minutes of the monthly meeting be accepted as a true record of proceedings. All Councillors in agreement.

VACANCY FOR A COMMUNITY COUNCILLOR

There had been three applications for the vacancy of Community Councillor. These were from Mrs J. Lincoln, Mr N. McCallum and Mr J. Phoenix. Councillor K. McCallum JP declared an interest being the father of one of the applicants. Following a procedure of voting, it was decided that Mr J. Phoenix be informed that his application had been successful. The unsuccessful candidates were to be written to and thanked for their interest.

ACQUISITION OF LAND - CEMETERY REQUIREMENTS

It was reported that the Legal Department of the Flintshire County Council had closed their file on this. There had still been no success in trying to arrange a meeting with Mr George Owens. It was suggested that consideration be given to once again looking at alternative sites. All Councillors agreed that suggestions should be discussed at the February meeting.

CEMETERY

The Clerk advised that the Cemetery sub-contractor had e-mailed stating that he intended to possibly looking at laying the big hedge in the Cemetery during the next few months. Also, he was waiting for the ground to dry up before removing the clay and replacing with topsoil. It was suggested that a meeting with the Cemetery sub-contractor should be arranged on site. The Clerk was to attend to this.

PLANNING APPLICATIONS

There were no planning applications.

Reference was made to the planning application discussed at the last meeting: - Application Number 054041

Use of land for the erection of a solar photovoltaic array including meter and inverter kiosks, security cameras, fencing and gates, temporary construction compound and access track. Celyn Farm, Stryt Cae Rhedyn, Leeswood, Mold, CH7 4SS.

A photograph of the solar photovoltaic array was made available for Councillors to look at. It was pointed out that Flintshire County Council were obliged to provide a certain percentage of this within the County. All Councillors agree that this matter was to be put on the agenda for the February meeting.

PLANNING DECISIONS

Application Number 053621

Demolition of existing garage and erection of two storey, single storey and first floor extensions. Station House, Alyn Lane, Llong, Mold, CH7 4JR.

Report was received that Flintshire County Council had refused this application and it had gone to appeal. At the appeal stage, half of the plan had been approved with the other half refused. This is considered to be unusual as a planning application is generally approved or refused in its entirety. Questions had been raised as to why this plan had been treated differently.

SPEED CAMERA IN PONTBLYDDYN

Comment was made that the speed camera was now in place and this would hopefully deter speeding and save lives. This speed camera had been paid for by a grant. Councillor R. Hughes was thanked for all the work that he had put in supporting the installation of this speed camera. It was observed that whilst there had been a noticeable reduction in speed coming off the dual carriageway and through the wooded area, this had not translated to the village of Pontblyddyn itself where vehicles will still travelling much quicker than they ought to be.

CHANGE OF COMMUNITY COUNCIL NAME TO LEESWOOD & PONTBLYDDYN COMMUNITY COUNCIL

A letter has been sent to the Legal Services Department at Flintshire County Council formally requesting that the Leeswood Community Council changes its name to the Leeswood and Pontblyddyn Community Council.

This request is made under Section 76 of the Local Government Act 1972.

BARRY RICHARDS - RETIREMENT GIFT

All Councillors were in agreement that a pair of large engraved vases were to be purchased as a retirement gift for Mr Barry Richards. The wording on these is to read 'For Barry Richards – in appreciation of the long service to our Community. Presented by the Leeswood & Pontblyddyn Community Council'.

POND AREA ON PHOENIX PARK

An e-mail had been received from Mr Richard Roberts of Organisational Change, Flintshire County Council advising that this matter had been passed on to Mr Alan Roberts who would respond in due course.

PLAY EQUIPMENT - MATCH FUNDING ON PHOENIX PARK

Richard Roberts of Organisational Change, Flintshire County Council advised that the old adventure trail on the Phoenix Park play area is to be replaced with a new play structure that has climbing ropes, nets and climbing beams. It is hoped that this work will be implemented before the end of March 2016.

MATTERS OF AN IMPORTANT NATURE

- a) Community Christmas Lights Councillor J.E. Saul was thanked for the work he does in arranging the installation of the Christmas Lights in the Community. Comment was made that there were some of the lights that had not been lit during the festive period. It was understood that the bulbs on the fittings had been checked and replaced where necessary, however, if there was no power reaching a particular standard there was no way of inspecting this.
- b) Dog fouling on Maxwell Drive it was brought to the Council's attention that there was dog fouling on Maxwell Drive. Remark was made that there are dog fouling disposal bins in the Community to be used. It was unfortunate, but Maxwell Drive was not the only area to suffer from this problem. There was little that could be done unless catching the owner of the dog not clearing up after and reporting the incident.
