Chapter 11

The Prize-fighter

During his rounds collecting eggs Tom heard stories about the Castlebar priest they were about to visit:

Paddy Byrne, the young successful prize-fighter from Dublin whom at the age of twenty-six 'saw the light' and gave up the chance to earn good money with his fists to join the church.

Paddy's last fight was set up in an old warehouse prepared for the fight by arranging wooden crates to form a ring. His opponent was an ageing bare-knuckle boxer from the same neighbourhood. They were evenly matched and seriously hurting each other. After ten minutes of punishing 'blow for blow' brutality, Paddy delivered right cross that sent the older man crashing to the hard unforgiving floor of the warehouse. The sound of the opponent's skull hitting the stone slabs would haunt him for the rest of his life.

That was the last punch Paddy Byrne threw as a prize-fighter. His opponent, prostrate on the hard floor appeared to be close to death. A priest was called to administer the last rites. Luckily he survived, although he never fully recovered and was so severely disabled that he never fought again.

In the days following the fight Paddy turned to the church praying for his recovery. He spent so much time in church praying that a priest moved to enquire. 'What's troubling you my son?' Paddy tried to put the priest off saying, 'I'm fine father.' The wise old the priest could see Paddy was a 'troubled soul'. Little by little he persuaded the young fighter to confide in him, and took his confession. After hearing the story of his last fight, he suggested that Paddy might find consolation in doing charitable work.

The ex-boxer soon became a common sight on the streets of Dublin, his warm smile and good humour bringing comfort to the poor and homeless as he distributed food and clothing. A year later with the priest's help, he was accepted into a religious seminary in Roscommon. After two years of study, to gain field experience Paddy was posted to work alongside a street-wise priest in Galway where he saw at first hand the plight of the poor tenant farmers in their struggle for survival.

His no-nonsense style came to the attention of the Bishop at near-by Tuam. Six months later he was given the Castlebar posting where his muscular physique and quick wit made his reputation as a formidable negotiator with both the local population and the Military.

Occasionally the local militia would ask his advice when dealing with disputes between tenants and agents of the absentee landlords gaining the respect of all.

I have had a deep sense of the reality and presence of God since early childhood. The wonder and beauty of nature, in particular, has been a channel through which God has revealed himself to me: whether watching dolphins swimming next to a boat, or spending a couple of hours in the back garden observing a meteor shower. I have met many people who have said something similar to me about finding God in nature. Some of them have gone on to say: 'I don't need church. Nature is my cathedral.' I certainly understand where they are coming from.

As a young teenager, I discovered God in another kind of beauty. The moral beauty and awesome presence of Jesus Christ captivated me as a read the New Testament for myself for the first time. At that age, I made the life choice to centre my life on Jesus. I firmly believe that decision has made my life more joyful, more purposeful, and it has seen me through seem really tough times too.

Being a Christian means being a follower of Jesus, but not in the sense of a solitary religious quest. From the outset, people have followed Jesus as part of a community - a band of brothers and sisters. In Bethania we have recently ordered a new sign for our church. The sign refers to us as a 'church community'. A local church is a community, a family. Like any family, it is certainly not perfect. But my experience is that the love and goodness of God is to be found there too, in community.



Technical Corner by Joseph Caruana

Some people say I want a job, some others say I want a career, but then there are others that would create careers. It is up to each one of us, to peruse individual capabilities, and apply those capabilities to a successful future.

One could come to the conclusion, that for an effort to be successful, all those involved need to make a collective and progressive contribution. In certain cases, there could be instances, where progress is held back because an idea has come from a lower rank. In cases like these, a good idea might not reach the appropriate level within an organisation, or it could get altered further up the line, and claimed by someone at a higher level within the organisation.

If whenever a new idea is proposed, one gets an answer like "we have already thought about that", one could close in; become an introvert, and holds ideas to him-self, which would eventually stifle progress. Leeswood & District Angling Club

Well, spring has sprung and we are well on our way into the delightful summer. Nights are getting lighter and the water temperature is slowly rising, which in turn sees the pool springing into life again.Water boatmen on top of the surface layer glide around like Tourville and Dean on ice and we find the carp taking in the first warm rays of sun, warming up their backs ready for the first feeding frenzy of the year.

North End has been quiet and dormant over the winter season, only the hardy anglers have attempted to fish in between the rope lines which are covering the pool from November till mid March. If you are wondering why these are put on every winter, it's to stop the cormorants from landing and taking off to eat our stock of fish.They fly in from the Dee and eat in between 2-3 lb of fish each per day, in 2010 we counted 9 cormorants in one sitting. We lost most of our stock that year. We also introduced 'baskets' into the pool at that time for any small fish to use as a safe haven, they have a 3x3 inch mesh so they can swim into the baskets without the cormorant getting to them. Fingers crossed, the measures we have taken have kept them at bay up till now.

In early March we stocked 400 common and mirror carp, 400 crusian carp and 300 bream. Delivered from Derby I'm pleased to say all survived the long trip and are now getting caught regularly.Pleasure fishing has started off well, Ted Lane having quite a few good sessions with the carp lads Lee Pryddych and Tom Evans having some good catches so far. Rod and pole anglers are catching early rising tench on pellet, corn and caster, as well as the silvers and the odd greedy carp. With great sadness, we lost our committee member Mr George Kettle after a short illness in March. George has been a member of the club since it started up in the early 70's, he would always attend work party's and meetings, helping out where he could (although, I think he went more for the pints of Fosters than the meetings most times!). George will be sorely missed by all at the club, his departing has left a gap which can never be filled. We would like to give our condolences to his family and thank them for the kind donation given to us in George's memory.



Memories of an oilfield man

meet some of the expats:-

Before we move on from Willie Booth, here are a few more tales about him, and there were quite a few because he was such a character, I recall one particular difficult working hitch (time on the rig) Willie was having mechanical problems with the Cat engines down below in the engine room, this was to be expected, as these engines no doubt came out of Noah's Ark, this working hitch was a little stressful for everyone because we were also having problems with the mud pumps these had stopped pumping,(these are huge pumps that send the mixed mud down the well,) Willie was working twenty fours solid with only myself and a local donkey man assisting him,(donkey man is basically an oiler and greaser for the mechanic)so myself and Willie were doing most of the work, as I say we had a rough couple of weeks between the engine, and the pump room the heat was unbearable, as there was no air conditioning we only had two big fans these were called Bug blowers their main purpose was to keep the bugs and flies away, and not for cooling, most of the time we were both be stripped down to our underpants (not a pretty sight) "I've had enough of this crap, I really am going to quit as soon as I land on the beach," Willie said in his Glaswegian accent, I took it with a pinch of salt as Willie quit every week, "ok Will no problem but let's get these pumps sorted first," working between the engine room and the pump room while waiting for parts that more often than not were the wrong ones to arrive from god knows where,

After twenty eight days working in temperatures reaching the nineties we were more than ready for Crew change, I could hardly wait for the chopper to land on the sandy strip with its lonely limp wind sock (no wind) Willie climbs down the steps and starts walking off in the opposite direction away from the two oil drums with the plank of wood on top that was our seating area where we expected my (mate) Melvin to be waiting to pick us up, he was ten minutes late as usual, not much fun in the burning heat of the day, "Were the hell is that Scottish idiot walking to" Melvin asked, "he quit and he's walking home" I replied,

"his choice, let's get back to the office for a rig debrief, you have a couple of hours before your flight back to Cairo, let's go" "hold on Melvin you can't just leave Willie walking in the desert in this heat" "Tell you what, let's get back to the cabin then you can turn around and go pick him up, maybe that will teach him a lesson it will not be more than ten minutes" this man is unbelievable I thought, it was a good job the camp was a short distance, as soon as we stopped the other guy's stepped out, I asked Jimmy King if he would come with me (safety in numbers I thought) then I climbed into the driver's seat and went looking for Willie, this must have been one of the most craziest things he could possibly do, walking in the desert not knowing in which direction to go, nobody ever knew what was going through his head, although in later years I met many more oddballs similar to Willie, (but he was great mechanic)

I drove slowly following some sort of goat track, ,he cannot be too far away I was thinking as we drove over the top of the first small sand dune I could not believe what I saw, "get a load of that Jim" There was our Willie, carrying his beat up little suitcase held together with string, all five foot six of him but he was not what I was looking at, It was Willie with two Bedouin Arabs mounted on very tall light coloured camels one either side of him (I later found these were a type of racing camels)this was one time I wish I had my camera, two fully dressed Arabs carrying 303 Le Enfield rifles last used in ww11 with a bandolier of bullets across their chest, the rider plus camel was about 8ft-10ft in height and Willie 5ft-6,this little group halted as we approached, neither of us could speak the others language then, I learned a little Gulf Arabic in later year's the only words spoken came from the Bedouin they placed one hand across their chest spoke in their language and carried on with their journey, I believe that they were riding alongside Willie for his own safety, I will never know,

Willie was a great guy when he was sober, but I believe this is all down to his war time experience, one more short story before I leave him; every field break there would be drinking parties in Willies house (and everyone else's house for that matter)this time he had a full house and everybody was invited including Ameena's Egyptian friends and relatives, this time the party ended with him opening the bedroom window and throwing everything through it, this included his war time medals with their ribbons, the stereo equipment and furniture soon followed, he never did recover his medals, that was my mate Willie.

Ok let's go back to Ras-Shokar on my first day in our Comex bar, more about Willie when we moved to Cyprus, but here we were into our second bottle of Jack Daniels, and half a crate of (wonderful) Stella beer, "hey Will (Willie Johnson) how come you ended up here, it's a long way from Montana USA" I asked him. It was not until later I realised it is best not to ask questions about some guy's personal lives, but he was ok with it,

"I wanted to get as far away as possible from my ex-wife and her family, they are a bunch crazy hillbillies" he drawled, he then began his story, "I had always worked on Land rigs in the states but a lot of the wells run dry(dusters they were called) so I had a choice, the Gulf of Mexico or the North sea and there was no way I would be going to the North sea from what I had heard about it, so it was the Gulf but I had to retrain from Land rigs to Offshore, and boy was I in for a shock until now I had only worked on land rigs so the only thing I knew about offshore drilling was what I had been told, when you think about it on land rigs you drill straight down and there is only the land formation to think about, but offshore, not only is there the water depth and that can be a couple of hundred feet before you even reach the seabed and begin drilling, then the rig, plus the boat movement, and the adverse weather conditions it's a whole new ball game Xmas trees on the seabed, then there is the divers going down" "no need to tell me Will I worked the North sea for a couple of years" I told him, "anyway carry on with your tale of woe" as I said, we were all well into our liquid refreshment by now and forgetting that I would have a very early and interesting day tomorrow,

"we were having some marital problems, it was ok for the first couple of years but then it began to get physical and at times we both ended up visiting hospital with minor injuries, things came to a head when her brothers, cousins etc, started calling on me to teach me a lesson; it wasn't too bad in the beginning, as you can see I am a big guy and I gave as good as I got, ,but then they came carrying guns that they pointed at me while the other two beat the crap out of me, it was time for me to go, and working in the gulf would be a way out for me even if it meant leaving the three kids with her, I sent her money every month but after a year she started asking for more and more,- then another guy moved in with her so I called it a day, and stopped sending her money, then she took me to court soon I fell behind with her payments, I was also having problems with the tax man, so the best thing I could do was look for an overseas contract which was tax free earnings, no doubt they will all be waiting for me when I eventually return to the States" I asked him how long had he lived in Cairo "been here for three years with IDC I worked on the Estralita, tender 21, that, s another rig further down the gulf" I then asked about his social life here "I was here for a month when Humdinger came asking if I wanted a house keeper so she moved in" "surely that's not her real name" I asked, "I could never pronounce it so we settled on Humdinger, and we have two kids now" the one time Carol and I met them in Cairo I we thought they were local Egyptian children with American accents, running around barefooted, before I finish talking about Willie Johnson there was this time when he purchased a chaise Lounge from a local Egyptian while he was sitting on it he happened to feel down the side of the upholstery and found a silver chain mail purse filled with all kinds of goodies a pair of diamond earrings, very ornate bangle, and a colourful broach, he knew I was interested in antiques so he asked my opinion,

I found the Egyptian equivalent of a hallmark on most of his items, "tell you what Will I will take a chance on them being genuine and offer you £500 (around \$1000)"I thought he would agree at first "nope don't think so, think I will take them into the city to a jewellers, if you come with me I will buy you a bottle of Jack Daniels" I was glad to go with him, we found them to be very genuine rubies and diamonds with white gold, and very valuable, sad to say Will had the earrings broken

down and made into a huge ugly signet ring, he sold the rest for a reasonable amount of money "guess that will go to the taxman when I go back to the States, which he did when his contract ended, leaving Humdinger with their two kids in Egypt with a small lump sum, that was Willie Johnson from Montana and there are more characters like him that I worked with, some running from the local police in the states such as Johnny Steagle but I will save him for later, as I say the oilfield was a great place if a person had reason to leave his country of origin for some reason,

I will introduce more of my co-workers in later issues but it was now 2am and we were all feeling the effects of the alcohol (me in particular,) we still had to make our way back to the tender and hopefully I will be able to find my cabin and bunk bed, if it was not for the cook standing near the gangplank (access to the tender) having a cigarette then giving me a helping hand down to the sleeping quarters or I would never have made it, he recognised me after being introduced earlier in the day,

"Wake up, wake up Mr Tom (SabaHel khair) good morning "thank god he spoke a little English, this was the same cook who helped me to my cabin two hrs ago, and I felt like hell, my cabin was fitted with a small porthole window and measured ten foot by eight foot containing two bunk beds with a small side cabinet and no washing facilities, we had communal showers etc. for the expats unless one was a rig manager or tool pusher, I barely made it cursing myself and promising not to touch the evil drink ever again, the pot water we used for showers etc. came from portable tanks so it was never really cold always tepid, it was a type of brine (a little salty) any after a very quick shower I made my way to the galley I was a little surprised to see my drinking buddies from the night before were already eating a full cooked breakfast, which sent me immediately back to the toilets, I eventually returned to the table" what are you lot laughing at" I asked, "take a look in that mirror mate" Willie said, I never recognised the face staring back at me, yesterday I had a reasonable tan this morning my face was white and my hair was standing up like the Jedward twins due to the salty brine water that I had showered in, and to be truthful the way I was feeling I didn't care, my first breakfast on tender 3 consisted of plenty of water and dried bread,

"Time to meet your crew mate let's go "Jimmy said, I would like to say we changed into working gear such as coveralls, hard hat, safety boots etc, but we didn't, Jimmy and myself proceeded down the gangplank, standing near the bottom were the most motley bunch of characters you could imagine, seven of them dressed in what can only be described as rags, they had no safety wear either, "Meet your crew mate" with a silly grin on his face, not to mention the seven smiling new members of my crew, the only one not smiling was me, "what the hell am I supposed to do with this lot", I asked "If you take them to that sand dune over there that's where the dismantled derrick is

your job is to sand blast all parts ready for painting as you know, I suppose you know how to use a sand blaster Tom", "Yes of course I do I went on a training course in Aberdeen when I blasted and painted the decks on Sedneth 701 but the company supplied all the safety gear these don't have any"

"We don't have much in the stores yet but there are some safety goggles and they can wrap rags around their faces and they are glad of the work" sad to say that this was a general working practice in third world areas at the time, it could never happen now in this day and age, (so they say) "there is a small mobile crane for you to handle heavy metal parts and there is plenty of sand so we will see you about midday" with that he left me there with the crew,

what next I thought scratching my head, let's see what we have here, "Is there anybody here that can speak English" I asked the group, one man answered that he spoke a little English, that's a good start I thought, "what is your name" "Mohamed Atir Abid "he answered in broken English, he was the only one among them who could, "my name is Tom" and he ended up being my right hand man, we worked together for the number of years that I worked in Egypt, there was a lot more to Mohamed which I will explain later, he was involved in the six day war with Israel, So there we were me leading my merry men who carried shovels, and sieves for the sand, heading out to my work area I was so engrossed with my project that I did not notice the other expats standing near the handrail laughing like hell, as we set off they all starting singing Hi Ho Hi Ho it's off to work we go, and for two weeks they called Tom Nick and his seven dwarfs, it took a while for me to live that down, how did I end up here, a crane operator from what was then a state of the art modern oilrig in the North Sea to a scrap yard in the desert, I don't know but I was beginning to like it,



THE MINUTES OF THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE MEETING OF LEESWOOD COMMUNITY COUNCIL HELD AT THE COMMUNITY CENTRE ON TUESDAY 5th APRIL 2016.

PRESENT

Councillor R. Williams (in the Chair) Councillors J. Atkinson, J. Caruana, D.K. Crowther, R. Hughes, T. Hughes, Terry Hughes, C.E. Jones JP, J. Phoenix, D. Rule, J.E. Saul and G. Sherwood (Vice-Chairman).

Also in attendance Marie Reynolds - Clerk to the Council.

APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE

These were received from Councillor K. McCallum JP.

DECLARATION OF INTEREST - MEMBERS CODE OF CONDUCT

There were no declarations of interest.

MINUTES

The minutes of the monthly meeting held on Tuesday 1st March 2016 had been circulated to all members. It was proposed by Councillor R. Hughes and seconded by Councillor J. Caruana that the minutes of the monthly meeting be accepted as a true record of proceedings. All Councillors in agreement.

POLICE LIAISON

PCSO 3461 Poppy Hadfield-Jones was unable to attend the meeting and had sent an e-mail to the Clerk. In her e-mail PCSO Hadfield-Jones explained that she had been unable to attend recent meetings as she had been on a course which had interrupted her normal working pattern. She went on to say that she had intended to attend the meeting this evening but had been unable to gather the latest statistics from the server at Mold Police Station as it was down. PCSO Hadfield-Jones added that she would attend the next meeting.

Comment was made that there seemed to be a gang with twelve plus members roaming through the village - the ages of the children quite diverse. Further concern was expressed at this and it was pointed out that it had been a long time since the community had seen this type of activity. It was suggested that the Clerk should e-mail PCSO Hadfield-Jones drawing her attention to this. All Councillors were in agreement.

COUNTY COUNCIL MATTERS

This matter was moved up the Agenda as Councillor R. Hughes had to leave the meeting early due to another commitment.

Legion D'Honneur, Mr J.K. Hughes of Ffordd Siarl - Councillor R. Hughes informed that he had attended the ceremony honouring Mr Hughes on Friday 4th March 2016. It had been pleasing to see Councillor R. Williams, Chairman to this Council also present. Mr. Hughes had been awarded a medal and a certificate, very gratifying to see a member of the Community honoured in this way.

Water coming off fields, Dual Carriageway Pontblyddyn - this matter was to be attended to.

30mph Stryt Cae Rhedyn, Leeswood - the movement of the sign was in progress. There is a legal process which involves the advertisement of the intention to extend the speed limit around the corner.

Double yellow lines on the junction of Bryn Clyd/King Street, Leeswood - these were a possibility and it was hoped that they would alleviate the issues with parking on the junction.

Dingle Road, Leeswood - it was pointed out that the road had deteriorated badly and could cause damage to vehicles. This is to be repaired.

Street lights - these were out on Dingle Road in Leeswood and also opposite the Fferm in Pontblyddyn.

Flintshire County Council's Chairman's Charity Dinner - Councillor R. Hughes stated that this had been an excellent evening and had raised $\pounds4,140$ on the evening. His Charity fund for the year was now in the region of $\pounds17,000$.

New Flintshire County Council properties in Leeswood - report was received that the Flintshire County Council were looking to demolish the Council garages at Maes-Y-Meillion and Heol-y-Goron. It was the intention to build three two bedroom bungalows and four two bedroom apartments on the site at Maes-Y-Meillion. Two three bedroom houses and three two bedroom houses were hoped to be built on the site at Heol-y-Goron. A public consultation is to take place at the Community Centre on Wednesday 6th April between 3pm and 7pm.

Council vans outside 49 Heol-y-Goron, Leeswood - comment was made that there had been a number of vans parked outside this property and these were causing problems with traffic. Councillor R. Hughes stated that he would look into this.

CEMETERY

The mole problem in the Cemetery is being dealt with. Mr Aled Davies has laid traps and these are being monitored.

PLANNING APPEALS

Planning Reference - 054344 Appeal Reference - APP/A6835/D/16/3144068 Triple Garage with ancillary accommodation over. The Old Barn, Padeswood Lake Road, Padeswood, Mold, CH7 4HZ. An appeal has been made to the Welsh Ministers following the Flintshire County Council refusal to grant Planning Permission.

HANSON HEIDELBERG LIAISON COMMITTEE

It was reported that there are no issues with dust emissions. Wagons are being loaded inside the plant and any spillage can, therefore, be contained. Any impact on the environment is minimal. There is currently a problem with complaints regarding noise.

POND AREA ON PHOENIX PARK

No further information had been received regarding this matter.

Observation was made that there were four footballs in the pond area and concern was expressed that children may make an attempt to climb over the fence to retrieve these. It was agreed that the Clerk should speak to Councillor R. Hughes the following morning to advise him of the situation

and to request that the Flintshire County Council remove these footballs in order to prevent any possible danger to children.

WITHDRAWAL OF FLINTSHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL SUBSIDISED BUS SERVICES

Mr Steve Jones, Head of Streetscene & Transportation, Flintshire County Council, had provided details of the proposed withdrawal of Bus Services that will affect this Community. Workshops have been arranged to take place on Tuesday 26th April 2016 at 4pm and 7pm. It was agreed that Councillor Terry Hughes and the Clerk would attend.

FLINTSHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL - SUSPENSION OF RIGHT TO BUY COUNCIL PROPERTIES

Denise Naylor, Community and Enterprise, Flintshire County Council had e-mailed advising that the Flintshire County Council were seeking to apply to the Welsh Assembly Government for a suspension of the Right to Buy Council properties in Flintshire for a minimum of five years. She went on to state that during 2016, the Council will start its ambitious Strategic Housing and Regeneration Programme (SHARP) which will see 500 new council and affordable homes built across Flintshire over the next five years. The new Council homes will be managed by the Council and the remaining 300 affordable properties will be managed by the Council owned NEW Homes housing company. By suspending the Right to Buy, Flintshire will not only retain its existing council housing stock levels but will also safeguard these new properties to maximise the housing opportunities for local people living in Flintshire.

In order to submit an application to Welsh Government Ministers before the pre-election period commences, the closing date for receipt of all views on the proposal was 16th March, 2016. Because of this date, the details had already been circulated to Councillors. The Clerk reported that eight Members had responded to a request for views and the majority opinion was in support of the Flintshire County Council's wish to put in a request to the Welsh Assembly Government for the Suspension of the Right to Buy Council Properties for a minimum of five years. An e-mail was sent to Flintshire County Council by the deadline date advising of this.

DOG FOULING

Correspondence received from Margaret Parry-Jones, Environment & Social Care Facilitator, Flintshire County Council, (again already circulated to Councillors - replies were needed by 1st April 2016), requesting 'thoughts' on dog fouling in the Community and an opinion on an initiative taken up by Barking and Dagenham Council to run a pilot scheme regarding Dog DNA Registration. The Clerk reported that four Councillors had replied and that there were three thoughts - a) if it was successful in Barking and Dagenham then running such a Scheme in Flintshire would be broadly supported; b) it was believed that dog fouling was still a problem in our Community but not so much so that it warranted the Scheme being put forward. It was also considered that the cost of such a Scheme could be put to better use and c) that the majority of dog owners in the Community are responsible and it is the minority that need to be targeted. Any DNA Registration Scheme would need to be cost effective and it is unlikely that the 'irresponsible' dog owners would sign up voluntarily. A suggestion of hefty fines for dog owners who deliberately allow the fouling of play/sport areas. Flintshire County Council had been e-mailed a letter outlining these points by the deadline date.

FLINTSHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL - SUMMER PLAYSCHEME 2016

From Alan Roberts, Public Open Spaces Manager, Flintshire County Council, details of the part funding available for the provision of the Summer Playscheme 2016. The cost will be £900 for the first three weeks and then £260 per week thereafter. It was previously agreed that the Community

Summer Playscheme would be of five weeks' duration. Flintshire County Council had been informed.

FLINTSHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL - FLINTSHIRE LOCAL DEVELOPMENT PLAN

Correspondence from Andrew Farrow, Chief Planning Officer, Flintshire County Council, informing that there will be consultation on the document 'Key Messages: Setting the future direction for the Plan - Tell us what you think'. The consultation period was to commence on 18th March and end on 29th April.

MATTERS OF AN IMPORTANT NATURE

a) Main Road, Pontblyddyn - it was brought to the Council's attention that heavy vehicles are travelling at speed through the night along the A541 Pontblyddyn village.

b) Mr Vince Roberts, ex-Headmaster Ysgol Derwenfa - sad news received that Mr Vince Roberts had passed away. It was agreed that the Clerk would try and obtain an address to write to his widow expressing the Council's condolences.
