



Margaret was an active member of her local chapel where she had been a Sunday school teacher and organist. She was also an active member of the WI, the local craft club and the 'Shadows' – the wives of the Cymau Male Voice Choir who raise funds to support local charities. She enjoyed meeting friends at the Leeswood lunch club.

Margaret was the figurehead of the family, and was a wise and caring person .She will be greatly missed by family and friends.

Dewi, Gareth and Eirwen would like to thank everyone for their care, thoughts and prayers and for the donations of £720.00 received in memory of Margaret which was shared between Hope Medical practice and the Stroke Association of Wales.

The electoral map of Wales will be completely redrawn, with the number of constituencies reduced from 40 to 29. This cuts the number of Welsh MPs by a quarter. Wales will see the biggest proportional cut of all the four nations. Delyn will disappear to be shared with Alyn & Deeside and Flint & Rhuddlan.



PROPOSED CHANGES TO WELSH ELECTORAL BOUNDARIES

BOUNDARY COMMISSION FOR WALES

5. Alyn and Deeside (Alyn a Glannau Dyfryd wy)

- 5.1 It is proposed that a county constituency is created from:
 - 1. The whole of the existing Alyn and Deeside CC consisting of the County of Flintshire electoral wards of Aston (2,440), Broughton North East (1,660), Broughton South (2,808), Buckley Bistre East (2,596), Buckley Bistre West (3,139), Buckley Mountain (2,436), Buckley Pentrobin (3,956), Caergwrle (1,157), Ewloe (4,171), Connah's Quay Central (2,232), Connah's Quay Golftyn (3,662), Connah's Quay South (4,357), Connah's Quay Wepre (1,591), Hawarden (1,549), Higher Kinnerton (1,283), Hope (2,008), Llanfynydd (1,391), Mancot (2,582), Penyffordd (3,283), Queensferry (1,236), Saltney Mold Junction (878), Saltney Stonebridge (2,583), Sealand (1,917), Shotton East (1,267), Shotton Higher (1,678), Shotton West (1,409), and Treuddyn (1,281); and,
 - the electoral wards within the existing Delyn CC and County of Flintshire of Argoed (2,130), Gwernymynydd (1,371), Leeswood (1,543), Mold Broncoed (1,878), Mold East (1,491), Mold South (2,155), Mold West (1,965), New Brighton (2,347) and Northop Hall (1,248).
- 5.2 This constituency would have 76,678 electors which is 2.6% above the UKEQ of 74,769 electors per constituency. The suggested name for the constituency is Alγn and Deeside. The suggested alternative name is Alγn a Glannau Dyfrd wy.
- 5.3 The Commission proposes to create a constituency from the existing Alyn and Deeside constituency and electoral wards from the County of Flintshire. It is proposed that the electoral wards from the existing constituency of Delyn not included in the proposal for 'Flint and Rhuddlarr' should be included in a new 'Alyn and Deeside' proposal. These would include the areas of Mold, New Brighton and Northop Hall and would create a constituency which would be within the statutory electorate range and it would contain electoral wards which are all within the County of Flintshire.
- 5.4 As the existing constituency of Alyn and Deeside is included wholly within the constituency the commission considered it appropriate to continue to use that name as the proposed name.
- 5.5 The remainder of the electoral wards of the existing Delyn can be found at page 21.





What I was really pleased about was that the machine in question was totally made in this country. This goes to show that when things were made in this country they were made to last. In those days people use to put their inspirations into practice and they were probably motivated by identifying a need which did lead them to produce an industrial solution to meet that need. What probably gave that generation a competitive edge, was that they had a more practical hand-on approach, and therefore understood the behaviour of the machines they developed. With this in mind, they applied the necessary precaution for the smooth running of the machine, which they designed to last forever. By making these machines to last so long, they carved a place in history, which will forever belong to them.

By having such a strong industrial past, it is possible that we can analyse the ways and systems which they applied in the development of their machines, and further develop the results from the analysis to achieve even greater results. However, to do this one needs to have an incentive, and the incentive is normally in the form of a reward in terms of financial well being. There are allot of individuals, who possess the talent to develop industrial projects to a level which would compete with excellence on the word market. If there are these individuals, with these abilities at their disposal, why are we not seeing more industrial developments? Could it be because they do not have the initial financial resources to start the ball rolling? Could it be because they do not have the expertise to market the final product, or could it be a combination of both? Whichever it is, it could be said that someone needs to address the situation and tap into these human resources to create wealth and prosperity within the industrial sector.

In many cases, inventors are not properly appreciated. A fine example of this is when the Wright brothers come up with the idea of making an aeroplane. The powers that be of that time, could not understand that a machine which was heavier then air could fly. The Wright brothers did their best to persuade investor to invest in the invention, but for some reason no one shown an interest. Unfortunately the Wright brothers pursued their invention else were. Nevertheless, the Wright brothers were from

this country and they were inspired when they were in this country, therefore the invention was a British invention.

There could be another issue which could cause a problem with inventors. As an invention could be rather complex, an inventor could find it difficult to explain the invention to other people, because although an idea could look easy as a vision, it may prove difficult to either explain it verbally or put it on paper. It would therefore be a good idea to develop means to aid people with new ideas to be able to convey their intellectuality in a manner that could be easily understood and translated into industrial terms. With this in mind, one could open a number of opportunities which could be developed in a profitable industrial success.

It might be right to say, that we have a great opportunity to shape the future, and it is up to us to further develop of industrial heritage which has been left to us by our predecessors. It is good to feel proud that we carried on building on what we inherited, rather than relying on cheap imports made on the other side of the world.


October in the Garden

Once the autumn tints start to appear on the trees and shrubs, we will be spoilt with the array of colours in the garden, and not forgetting all the delicious fruit on offer also!







Memories of an oilfield man

Looking for a Home in Cairo

After living on board an old tender ship and working in the dunes, sand blasting then painting the rig derrick sections, loading them and the crane onto the supply boat and sail them out to the barge 'Zarah' then assisted in rebuilding the derrick onto the barge and return to the beach and start the operation all over again, it was like a great big meccano set, I would be with my crew of seven and only Mohammed could speak English, after an eighty four hour week for four weeks I was more than ready for a field break, there was only one small problem, where the hell was we going to live?, "Hey Melvin who is my relief and when does he arrive" I asked the boss, "We have a slight problem with your relief, you have not got one" was his reply, I thought he was winding me up because of our differences, "your relief was Jeff Whitfield the chief mechanics brother but he never turned up at the airport, I believe he is having marital problems" "That's not my problem and it does not help me in any way, I have done my month out here and I have to look for a place to live for when Carol and the boys come over, now get me back to Cairo" I was not a happy chappie, I was twelve stone when I arrived at Ras Shukeir my weight was now down to eleven stone within the month (in the next couple of months I would to lose another stone), "I will have a word with Gus Henderson the divisional manager and see what he comes up with but you may have to wait for a relief" he said this with a smirk on his face (I did not like this guy one little bit). Eric Whitfield who was in the porta cabin office with the rest of the expats spoke "seeing as it is Jeff my brother I will cover for you until he gets here if he gets here" which was no problem for me as Eric could handle the big crane "ok, just make sure you give Eric a progress report before you leave, and line up that raghead of yours, he can help Eric with your crew until you come back" needless to say I had a few choice words with him, (cannot them down on paper) but it went something like this, "by this raghead you must mean Mohammed one of the very few locals who can speak English, you and all of the other Expats use him, but I will explain to him what

is required while I am away and that there will be a small pay rise for him" I was in a position to recommend small pay increases if warranted "if you remember he is still casual labour" (this was before I sent him to Cairo for a permanent job), "ok whatever it takes" was his reply then walked out,

I was a little apprehensive about going on field break, I had very little money left, my first pay check was not due for another month, and I had to find somewhere to live, even though I still had the company room in the Hilton, then there was the schooling to sort out for the boys, Carol was not due out for another six weeks, she must have been demented because she had not heard from me since I left the UK although I did send letters via Brian Kay chief electrician he commuted to and fro from the uk because his wife refused to live in Egypt and the Egyptian phone and post system was crap, Carol was amazing she had a lot more to do than I did, the company arranged for the packing shipment of all our personal Items, clothes, electrical goods bedding etc all the things that we would require, and help her father to take over the house, thinking back it was just another paying adventure for me but it was a life changing decision for Carol and the boys, I was near the landing strip sitting in the truck waiting for the DC 3 airplane to land, It was the same pilot that had brought me out, he asked me how had I managed and if I had been to the commix bar and met the crazy chopper pilots also the divers he then asked If I would be coming back "yep I am in to deep now so I will see you in two weeks" then began to plan my Itinerary for the next two weeks,

First thing to do was to stop by the office. If anybody who has driven in Cairo during the 70s will know what a nightmare it was, good job Mahmoud the taxi was there waiting for me, "right Mahmoud take me to the palace" he knew where I meant,

Salah greeted me like a long lost brother then directed me upstairs to Gus, where we shook hands and he called for to Salah to fetch some cold beer, this was more like it I thought civilisation at last ,the first thing he asked "will

you be going back out there Tom" strange he was the second person to ask the same question," of course I am why do you ask" first of all how did you get on with Melvin Whitmire he is only one of the reasons why you guys don't stay, the other is the culture shock" "let's say that there was no love lost between us and leave it at that" I replied, "as you know every morning I receive an update and work report by the head of departments on the work progress, and your name came up all favourable, so welcome on board, right what can I do for you?" , "first of all I need an advance on my pay check because I have run out of cash", "that's no problem but you know local law require expats to spend \$1000 per month in local currency and the remainder of your pay check gets paid into your account, so I will arrange for Salah to give it to you on the way out and you are still booked in the hotel tomorrow Salah will take you to Maadi and introduce you to the other expats they will help to find you a place". We shook hands then I asked Salah to pick me up at the hotel the next morning,

"Right Mahmoud take me to the Hilton, tonight I chill out tomorrow I face reality" I forgot to mention that all the bar tabs were booked to the company so when Salah called for me the following morning I had the mother of all hangovers, it took over an hour sitting in the breakfast room wearing my sunshades drinking plenty of water before I was ready to face our new neighbours in Maadi,

COUNTY FORUM MEETING - THURSDAY 30th JUNE 2016

Councillor J.E. Saul had attended the County Forum meeting held at FLVC, Corlan, Mold on Thursday 30th June 2016.

He presented a report as follows: -

Age

<u>Friendly Communities</u> – In February 2014, the Flintshire County Council signed the Dublin Declaration demonstrating its commitment to becoming age friendly. Alan Hatton-Yeo (national expert lead on Age-Friendly Communities) gave a presentation on what is meant by Age Friendly Communities, why it is important for communities to be age friendly and to discuss the next steps including how Town and Community Councils can become involved. Following Councillor Saul's recommendation, the Clerk had invited a representative from Flintshire County Council to attend the next Community Council meeting in order to discuss this Council becoming involved in the pilot scheme. All Councillors in agreement.

<u>Future of Local Government/Financial Future</u> – An overview of the current position on Local Government Reorganisation and Boundary Reviews. If the Local Government settlement is held at the 2016/2017 level, the combined 'gap' for 2017/2018 and 2018/2019 is beyond the County Council's means. It would seem that the Community Asset Transfers are on hold for now.

<u>Community Asset Transfers</u> – A report on the overall programme and to discuss with Town and Community Councils proposals for play area provision. The County Council estimates that it can sustain four play areas per community plus skate park and wheeled facilities. It would seem that this community will not be affected during this year.

HSBC BANK

The Clerk informed that the Bank had now made the name changes on the bank accounts and a new cheque book, also paying-in book had been received.

It was agreed that the changes to the mandate could now be made.

POND AREA ON PHOENIX PARK

Work on this had now been priced up. The water is to be piped into two sunk manholes on the pathway. It is likely that Flintshire County Council will be expecting a contribution towards the cost from this Council.

APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE

These were received from Councillors D.K. Crowther, Terry Hughes, K. McCallum JP and J. Phoenix.

DECLARATION OF INTEREST – MEMBERS CODE OF CONDUCT

There were no declarations of interest.

ACQUISITION OF LAND – CEMETERY REQUIREMENTS

The Clerk reported that she had spoken with Nesta Davies, Solicitor who was acting on behalf of Mr George Owens that afternoon. Ms Davies informed that she had met with Mr Owens on 15th August 2016 and she could confirm that progress was being made towards the sale of land to extend the Cemetery.

CEMETERY

The Clerk reported that she had made enquiries with the Bereavement Services Manager at Flintshire County Council regarding an inspection of the headstones at the Cemetery. This could be done at a cost of £4.00 per headstone. As there were 217 headstones at the Cemetery, the total cost would be £868.00. The Clerk explained that she had made a count of the headstones on Sunday 7^{th} August 2016 and had not seen any unstable. It was pointed out that there were some leaning headstones and although they were not loose, it was suggested that they could be straightened. Observation made that any remedial work to headstones may require permission from the families who owned them. The

Clerk was to look into this and also to contact Mr Blackwell of Blackwell's Stonemasons with regard to any works to be carried out. All Councillors agreed.

Various works requiring action at the Cemetery are as follows: -

- a) the tree behind the Cremated Remains needed cutting back and the hedges required trimming, also there is deadwood on the bank near the entrance that should be removed. The Clerk is to speak to Aled Davies concerning this. All Councillors in agreement.
- b) the noticeboard by the entrance to the Cemetery is in need of new backing and re-varnishing.
- c) the entrance gates are damaged and require repairing.
- d) there is a lot of clay behind the Cemetery shed which has been there for a considerable length of time, it would be almost impossible to move this. It was agreed by all Councillors that top soil should be put on this and an attempt be made to grow some plants.

MILLENNIUM CLOCK

A copy of the maintenance agreement had been received from Smith of Derby. This agreement was for an annual visit to inspect, clean, adjust and lubricate all normally accessible parts of the clock system and associated equipment. Where appropriate time side motors would be changed automatically at no additional cost. A call-out charge would be made for any notification of a breakdown or stoppage that resulted as normal wear and tear, misuse, neglect, failure of power supply, vandalism or other circumstances beyond the control of the maintenance company.

Following the clock running slow, the engineer from Smith of Derby attended the site and identified the problem to be with the controller. Smith's did not manufacture this and the engineer was unable to affect any repairs. The clock requires a Smith of Derby Auto Restart Unit to be manufactured, which will be fitted on site by the engineer, also two 300m round fluorescent tubes and starters to be replaced. It would cost £973.00 + VAT. Councillor R. Hughes proposed and Councillor J. Atkinson seconded that this quote be accepted with all Councillors in agreement.

PLANNING APPLICATIONS

Application Number – 055630 Erection of two storey extension Station House, Alyn Lane, Llong, Mold, Flintshire, CH7 4JR

Councillors observed that they hoped the extension would be sympathetic to the character of the building and that some of the old features would remain.
