

PONTYBODKYN LADIES GUILD

The President, Mrs. Lucille Ingman opened the meeting, at the Community Centre, on the 23rd February 2017, and introduced Sam Eastwood from Nightingale House. We had a nice informal chat as to the day to day running of the hospice and how, in the future, they hope to build an extension to accommodate more people who need help. Sam told us how they desperately need donations to keep things running and praised the Leeswood Hospice Group for their help over the years.

Refreshments were served by Mrs. Flora Roberts. The raffle was drawn and Mrs. Jenny Webb was the winner. Mrs. Lucille Ingman won the special raffle.

On the 9th March our speaker was Mr. Bryan Webb, husband of Guild member Jenny, he came to talk to us about the Air Transport Auxiliary. Bryan trained as an Industrial Chemist in London and worked as a research scientist in Berkshire and Newcastle-upon-Tyne and in manufacturing in Wrexham and Hertfordshire. He has given talks all over the country in museums, universities, colleges and Historical Societies so we were very lucky to be able to listen to him. We had a most interesting evening as Bryan also had slides to show and heard many stories of people who were in the Air Transport Auxiliary. It began in 1939 and in 1941 a woman was asked to set up a Women's Auxiliary (very unusual and not at all popular with men). Eventually it began with 8 ladies and at its height there were 1500 men and 166 woman involved transporting all kinds of aeroplanes to where they were needed, a very important part of the war. It was disbanded in 1945.

Refreshments were provided and served by Mrs. Jane Lucy, with help from Mrs. Margaret Roberts. The raffle was drawn and a visitor, who had been invited to listen to the talk, Mrs. Jan Burton, was the winner. Mrs. Jenny Webb won the special raffle.

Contrary to what has been printed in the Leeswood News for the last two editions the Guild are celebrating their 49th birthday, we have to wait another year for our fiftieth anniversary.

Mrs Lucille Ingman, MBE, had thought that in 2016, that she had been President of the Guild for 49 years. She now remembers celebrating the Guild's 30th Anniversary on 24th April 1998, which means that the Guild is not 50 until 2018.

Of First Importance

The Apostle Paul writes:

For what I received I passed on to you as of first importance: that Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures, that he was buried, that he was raised on the third day according to the Scriptures...

(1 Corinthians 15:3-4)

Some years ago, Mary and I were able to enjoy a holiday in Israel. That holiday reminded me that the events of the life, death and resurrection of Jesus are rooted in space and time. We saw the garden of Gethsemane where he suffered in anticipation of his great sacrifice for us. We walked the Via Dolorosa, the way of suffering that led to Calvary. We saw where the mount of crucifixion might have been and the place of the garden tomb.

Personally, I felt closest to Christ not in the great city of Jerusalem but in Galilee where he grew up, where he taught in the synagogues and on the hillsides, and where he appeared to his disciples following the resurrection.

On that Israel trip, my most profound sense of the presence of God was in the Church of the Annunciation in Nazareth. That great place of worship marks the occasion when the angel announced to the Virgin Mary that she would give birth to a son, Jesus (Luke 1:26-38)

In a Peanuts cartoon, Charlie Brown and Linus are standing next to each other, staring at a star-filled sky. "Would you like to see a falling star?" Charlie Brown asks Linus. "Sure..." Linus responds. "Then again, I don't know," he adds, after some thought. "I'd hate to have it fall just on my account."

In the book *Parables of Peanuts*, Robert L. Short reminds us a star did fall on our account. God came down to us as Jesus: like a lamb led to slaughter, He died on our account. He died so that we might know God's love and forgiveness, and he rose again to conquer death forever.

I am more amazed than ever at the grace of Jesus, who gave himself for us on the cross. And I am more convinced than ever of the truth of his resurrection and its life-changing power.

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
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Carnival News

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

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Savings Using Personal Pensions

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Memories of an oilfield man

Evicted in Cairo

Before I talk about Carols experiences of more house hunting in Old Maadi, In the last issue I promised to include a few pictures etc from Cairo museum here is a couple, I have far too many to include in one issue but if its ok with the LDN, I will slip a couple in each issue some readers may find them interesting.

During the time, we lived in Egypt, we moved house four times and I always happened to be on the rig at the time (thank god) I didn't know she had moved into any of them until I came off the rig then I would have to start asking around does anybody know where Carol and the boys had moved to this time. We first stayed in the flat belonging to Gordon flat for a couple of months until his family were ready to move over, and we were in limbo and did not know exactly if and when she would come, so when Eric Whitfield the chief electrician arrived on the rig after his field break and informed me that Carol had moved into his brother Jeff's flat: due to marital problems, his family would not be moving over and his apartment was available. He had spoken to Carol and asked if she was interested in it (which she was), then he introduced Carol to the owner landlord who then insisted that if she wanted the apartment she would have to be ready to move in during the night otherwise he would rent the apartment to somebody else, she thought this was unusual at the time but seeing that the flat was only next door it was no big problem so Carol and the boys moved in at midnight, (the real reason for this odd behaviour will be explained later).

As I mentioned previously all of the expats had house cleaners and (boabs) I think that's how to spell boab his job was gardener laundry man and chasing kids and dogs away, we paid them a weekly wage of £3.00 each, this was a pittance but the Egyptian government recommended this rate of pay.

We made up for this in other ways, these were local people usually recommended by other expats, with the exception of, one English lady cleaner who was looking for any work. She had a sad story. Apparently she fell for a Egyptian doctor in England and she moved to Cairo with him, but for some reason he tired of her and passed her on to his brothers and so on, she had no passport and the Embassy did not want to interfere so

she was eking out a living amongst the expat community,

Anyway Toweda was the name of the cleaner that we had she stayed with us the whole time we lived in Cairo I know that this will sound like exploitation but we really did not need or require cleaners or Boabs, I remember Carol waiting for "Toweda" the cleaner to finish then Carol would go around the flat again cleaning, We remember one time Toweda inviting her friends in to demonstrate on how to use our hoover showing them how it picked up the dirt through the tube, I know it sounds strange in this day and age but she had never seen or used a vac before, from then on it was hers.

I remember coming home after a really rough month on the rig and this was my first field break in the apartment, I had been inside it I must say it was a lovely place as I remembered it,

"What on earth is wrong with you" I asked Carol, she was sitting on the entrance steps to the apartment with her head in her hands, this was not like Carol at all, "what the hell have you got me into this time" she said, I didn't have a clue what she was talking about, "I am not going to tell you now but wait and see for yourself in the morning" and she would not tell me.

She must have told the boy's not to tell me either, so I waited, after a good breakfast they just sat and looked me not speaking the three of them just grinning, they must have heard something that I didn't, the three of them stood up and pulled me to the bathroom door "one two three" they counted then opened the door "I don't believe it" in real Victor Meldrew fashion.

Our toilet and Bidet completely over flowed and all the sewerage contents of the toilet belonging to flat above came gushing out all over our floor, the boy's ran out "we are not cleaning that up" and went out. "Toweda will not clean it so that left me, now it's your turn", Carol said and she too went out. After cleaning the mess up I set out looking for the owner, "Malesh" said the owner (this meant never mind it does not matter), "I will fix it Bukra (tomorrow or badibukra (day after tomorrow) or something like that.

Carol had been trying to get it sorted out before I came home but to no avail, to the Egyptian Male females are second class citizens so not much notice was taken of them, (sometimes I envy them) it was amazing soon after I had a word with him the plumbing was sorted out pretty quickly.

Anyway, we had only been living there for couple of months and I while working on the rig Eric returned from his field break and informed me that Carol and the boys were temporary in his house with Marjory his wife as Carol had been evicted from the apartment, "Its a long story Carol will explain when you get home" he said, "but I have another week to go before my relief gets out here" "No problem she's ok until then" he said. With that he carried on with his work, I had no Idea what was happening back in Cairo as there was no way that I could contact Carol, no such thing as mobile phones even the land line was crap even when it worked, the only communication we had was on the rig was ship to shore radio but that was for rig use only, so for the month I was on the rig we had no Idea what was happening with each other (when we were involved in the conflict with the Israeli gun boat Carol was watching the whole thing on TV, we were living in Cyprus at the time) but that's for a later issue.

coming from the door, I went down in my dressing gown only to be faced by military or police I don't know which, but they were all armed with guns thev demanded that we vacate the flat immediately and we had two hours to do so", this was all in very broken English and Carol could not speak Arabic so it must have been terrifying for them to be thrown out into the street at that time of night with what personal belongings she could manage and not knowing the reason why, with all this commotion going on Eric and his wife came over

to comfort Carol and the boy's then took them into their home.

Apparently what had happened was the previous Egyptian tenants who rented Jeff's apartment usually spent six months of the year living in Alexandria on the Nile and the other six in Cairo, at a very low rent. So when this family were away the owner thought he would rent it to the Oil company for ten times the amount, The owner moved all of their belongings into the garage and rented it to Jeff then the owner arranged for Carol to move in during the evening as I mentioned, unbeknown to us the legal Tenants had arrived back in Cairo and quite rightly demanded their house back. As luck had it Gordon had a new flat ready for his wife and family but she was having second thoughts again, so Gordon let us move into his new one and he stayed in his old one again, so that was the tale of the eviction, I n the next issue we are on the move again house hunting moving from Old Maadi to New Maadi. Technical Corner

Joseph Caruana

I have recently stumbled over an old engine while visiting a friend of mine, and immediately the conversation centred on the good old days when we manufactured everything we needed without having to import anything. The conversation also touched on the subject that we exported British made products to countries all over the world, and these products were so well made that they are still in good use to this day.

With an industrial history as rich as ours, we are in a strong position to utilise our experience and implement our technical abilities to take a commanding lead in industrial affairs as a world class industrial nation. Things have obviously changed, and one might argue that the products we manufactured in the past, are in the past. However, it could be counter argued that we could use the reputation of the products that we manufactured in the past, to demonstrate our ability to meet the demands of the market of today, and invent new ideas to make our approach as unique as possible.

It is understood that at the present time we live in a global economy and therefore things could be made anywhere in the world and shipped to anywhere. This should not stop us from venturing into the unknown and explore new ways of doing business as a joint venture with developing countries. One of the many ways that we can develop a business relationship with other countries on a world scale is to develop a core product which could be adapted to different uses in different climates. The core product will obviously be manufactured in Britain while the adaptation for use in different countries would be carried out in the country of final use. A system like this could create a global industrial network which could produce a final product at a competitive price to compete with products coming out of the Far East. A good thing that could come out from such a system is that countries where the product is finally used will feel the satisfaction of being involved in producing the product itself, rather than just buying it from maker in the

However, to maintain a healthy spirit within the infrastructure, one does need to have a vision for the future and develop new procedures


to implement new systems to meet anticipated future market demands.

APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE

These were received from Councillors J. Atkinson, K. McCallum JP and J. Phoenix.

<u>DECLARATION OF INTEREST – MEMBERS CODE OF</u> CONDUCT

There were no declarations of interest.

AGE FRIENDLY COMMUNITIES

Mrs Helen Jones and Ms Ella Jackson of the Age Friendly Communities Team at Flintshire County Council were in attendance, along with Ms Natasha John, Business Development Manager at Volunteering Matters.

Mrs Jones explained that Volunteering Matters had been awarded funding from the Big Lottery 'Accelerating Ideas Programme'. The funding is for a five-year period to explore the impact of Community based activities that are led by the older people living in rural areas of Wales and Scotland. In Wales, an Age Friendly Community approach will be used which recognises the importance of effective engagement with older people but the need for an intergenerational approach. The Programme will work in four pilot areas in Wales; one area each in the counties of Flintshire (the Community of Leeswood and Pontblyddyn) and Pembrokeshire (Milford Haven) in the first two years and two further areas selected for years 3 and 4.

This funding would be able to provide a Project Co-Ordinator working with the Community for two years for 21 hours per week. Mrs Jones and Ms Jackson had met with the Youth Club and the Senior Citizens, also arrangements were being made to visit with the Primary School. However, they had other work within their job roles and were not able to just focus on the Age Friendly Communities process, having a Project Co-Ordinator would mean that this person could liaise with the Community groups and organisations. Ms John advised that the timetable for appointing a Project Co-Ordinator would be March 2017.

At present an Age Friendly Communities programme had been rolled out in larger urban areas. The Community of Leeswood and Pontblyddyn would be the first small Community to participate. Query was raised as to whether the cities or urban areas who already had experience of the programme would have models or be able to give advice or pointers? It was agreed that seeing what works well in other areas may be beneficial.

Observation was made that the community of Leeswood and Pontblyddyn has many clubs and societies that could be approached to see how they would want to broaden their membership. Further point was made that older members of the community may struggle to obtain their repeat prescriptions from the dispensary at the Leeswood Surgery, it would be useful if there was some way of helping residents out with this. Ms John explained that this type of issue would be something that was looked into.

The role of the Project Co-Ordinator would be to go out and meet with the Community groups. This would need a person with the right skills and all the better if they were fairly local to the Community. It was considered that the base for the Project Co-Ordinator could be the Leeswood Community Centre and it would be beneficial if there was internet access available. The Clerk advised that the provision of wireless internet was being looked into by the Community Centre Management Committee. Interviews would be arranged for March 2017 and these would take place at the Leeswood Community Centre. Mrs Jones was to confirm the arrangements with the Clerk.

Councillor G. Sherwood, Chairman, thanked the Age Friendly Communities team for attending the meeting.

A newsletter for January 2017 issued by Inspector Jonathan Bowcott and a list of the Flintshire South PC/ PCSO allocation had been circulated to all members. Also, further correspondence from Inspector Bowcott advising that there will be a change to South Flintshire District Inspector from 6th February 2017 as he will be away working on a project and Temporary Inspector Geraint Richards will be taking over in his absence. This information was accepted.

CEMETERY

Comment was made regarding the headstones at the Cemetery not being in line. The Clerk reminded Councillors that she had spoken to Mr Steve Blackwell, Stonemason in November 2016 and he had agreed to attend the Cemetery at the beginning of the new year to look at the headstones.

It was agreed by all Councillors that the Clerk should contact Mr Blackwell and ask him to attend a meeting on site at the Cemetery with Councillors R. Hughes and C.E. Jones JP.

All Councillors were in agreement that the Play Scheme be provided for a five-week period during the summer of 2017.

Documentation received from Lynn Phillips, Team Leader, Democratic Services, Flintshire County Council detailing the advice for candidates who wish to stand as Town and Community Councillors. This advice is for general guidance only and should not be accepted as a comprehensive statement of the law. Information about all vacancies – including Notice of Election, Statement of Persons Nominated, Notice of Poll and Declaration of Results – will be published on Flintshire County Council's website – www.flintshire.gov.uk. Town and Community Council Clerks will be distributing nomination packs to existing Councillors sometime in February. Councillors accepted receipt of this information.

CADWYN CLWYD – IBEACON PROJECT

E-mail correspondence from Sarah Jones of Cadwyn Clwyd. The iBeacon Project is near to starting and a first session workshop for volunteers is to be arranged with consultants. Also, Richard Jones, Business Development Officer at Flintshire County Council has found the match funding of £750 in his budget so there is no longer any cost to the Community Council for this project. Councillors accepted this information expressing their appreciation that the cost of the project had been covered by Flintshire County Council.

BUS STOP AT LLONG

From Mrs Sylvia Limb of Station House, Llong, e-mail correspondence requesting that the Community Council gives support to an official bus stop in Llong for the X1 bus which passes through several times a day. Councillor R. Hughes advised that a suitable site to position a bus stop was being looked into by Flintshire Council. All Councillors agreed that an e-mail should be sent to Katie Wilby of the Transportation Unit, Flintshire County Council, expressing this Council's support for a bus stop in Llong.

COUNTY COUNCIL MATTERS

- a) White lining on Chester Road, Pontblyddyn Councillor R. Hughes reported that the highway repairs on Chester Road, Pontblyddyn were now complete. The white lining will be done when the weather improves.
- b) Parking on Bell's Corner the proposed suggestion of putting parking spaces on part of Bell's Corner in the area of the Cenotaph is not possible for safety reasons. It was acknowledged that parking on Bell's Corner is a problem and the current practice of parking part on/part off the pavement is hazardous. All Councillors agreed that an application should be made for double yellow lines on the stretch of highway alongside the pavement around the Cenotaph. The Clerk was to write to Mr Steve Jones, Streetscene, Flintshire County Council.

c) <u>Council house rent increases</u> – it was remarked that there had been an increase in the Council house rent. Councillor R. Hughes pointed out that the part of Flintshire County Council dealing with housing is self-supporting. Over the past few years in Leeswood a programme of improvements had taken place with either kitchens or bathrooms being replaced in the Council houses. Rent increases were on a national level and not just County wide.

MATTERS OF AN IMPORTANT NATURE

a) Mandatory 20 mph speed limit outside Schools -Councillor R. Williams brought it to Council's attention that some schools in Gwynedd and Meirionethshire had mandatory 20mph speed limits outside them. The limits were on a timer and the 20mph was enforceable for a period at the start of school in the morning, at lunchtime then again in the afternoon at the close of school. It is a flashing sign indicating the 20mph speed limit and these are set on a timer. Councillor R. Hughes pointed out that in 2014 following permission from the Welsh Assembly Government, Flintshire County Council had started rolling out a programme of 20mph speed zones outside all Flintshire schools. These are marked by advisory black circular signs. At present, there is no plan to convert these into compulsory speed limits. b) Community Council report in the Leeswood & District Newsletter – it was brought to the Council's attention that there was no Community Council report in this month's copy of the Leeswood & District Newsletter. The Clerk expressed surprise at this and explained that she had sent the usual monthly report to Mrs June Lincoln, the Editor of the Newsletter. Observation was made that the Community Council had an arrangement with the Leeswood & District Newsletter where the insertions were paid for and because of this it was expected that the report would be included in the printed copy of the Newsletter. All Councillors agreed that the Clerk should contact the Editor and request that the Community Council report be once again

included in the Newsletter.

c) <u>Bus Shelter</u>, <u>OAP bungalows</u>, <u>Maes-Y-Meillion</u>, <u>Leeswood</u> – a request was made for the Community Council to give consideration for the provision of a bus shelter at the OAP bungalows on Maes-Y-Meillion, Leeswood. Councillors pointed out that most bus stops in the village did not have a bus shelter. Further remark was made that bus shelters also provided a gathering place for the younger members of the Community to congregate. All Councillors agreed that the opinion of the residents in the area be sought.

April in the Garden

Hopefully spring is finally here and we can all get out and enjoy our gardens! It is important to still be aware of the weather forecast, as we could easily get some late frosts and cold weather, that could put back seedlings, new plants and blossom. It is my favourite time of year when I start being able to sit in the garden and enjoy a brew before the day's work.

Jobs for April

- Keep an eye on weather and plant out your summer bedding and vegetable plants when chance of frost clears
- Keep sowing your sweet peas and vegetables every 2-3 weeks to ensure regular crops throughout the season
- Keep on top of weeds in your beds and borders
- Deadhead the spring flowering bulbs as they go over, this prevents seed production and allows the plant to store energy back into the bulb
- Now is a great time to apply mulch to your beds and borders

Mulching – What, why and how?

What is mulching? - mulching is the application of a material to the surface of the soil.

Why do it? – there are several reasons that mulch is applied. Firstly, it is a great way to reduce weeds growing. By applying a thick layer of mulch, you restrict sunlight to the soil surface and therefore stop the weed seeds germinating. Secondly, a good layer of mulch can keep moisture in the soil, by trapping it and keeping the sun off the surface, therefore reducing the need for watering the garden. The layer of mulch can also help to trap warmth and this helps plants establish and grow stronger. Finally, a border covered in a mulch looks tidy and improves the appearance.

How to mulch – it is important to ensure that there is a good thickness of mulch, otherwise it is just not effective, usually it should be between 2-4 inches deep to be fully useful. If you want to use it to keep the border moist and warm, apply the mulch after rainfall and when the soil is warm. Otherwise you are just trapping in cold and dry conditions. Where possible try to remove as many weeds before mulching, particularly stronger growing, perennials weeds that might break through the layer.

Types of Mulch

There are several mulch types, but the four main ones

- **Bark** bark chips come in various sizes so ensure that you apply a good thick layer to block out the light to the soil surface
- **Gravel** there is a wide range of colours and sizes of gravel available. The smaller the gravel size the thinner the layer needed as they 'fit' together better. Consider the size depending on the location in the garden, you may want smaller size on smaller beds but larger on big areas.
- **Slate** similar to gravel, but can provide a lovely Welsh feel to a garden. Less choice of colours but the purple/grey colour is great for showing off light coloured plants.
- Compost/Manure if using any sort of manure, ensure that it has chance to rot down for at least six months before applying to prevent damage to plants. These types of mulch will rot down quicker and will need replacing annually.


