People look at the church and think will I really fit in there. Is it worth the effort of walking through the door? It seems too hard, too big a challenge for me to even attempt.

I pushed a pram past Durham City Baptist Church again and again but I never went in. I knew I should do but never did until I moved to a village a few miles away. By then God had found another way of getting me into the church. He would not let me escape.

Do you know something? I am so pleased He did not let me escape. I would not face the challenge of going in but God took me round another way. He wanted me in His family and He chased after me until I was adopted into it. Today I would be lost without the Family of God around me. I can highly recommend coming through the door.

### **Gone Fishing**

First of all, although I still like fishing, nowadays I will not kill a fish that I am not prepared to eat, but again I have eaten many a shark steak, the only way is to cook it within fifteen to thirty minutes of taking it out of the water then it's really fresh.

I have mentioned that the expats had no form of entertainment on board unless sitting in a circle with my crew on the helideck with a hookah (hubble bubble pipe) loaded with cannabis counted or sitting with the yanks drinking Jack Daniels, (sorry Carol these are my memories ) and having to start work next morning with a stinking hangover, (in a later issue I will talk about the home made still used for making Sediki (that means my friend in Arabic - 150 proof alcohol) and this is why I started fishing from the Tender.

I had always liked fishing with my dad, but that was coarse fishing; roach, perch, eels and various other fish, when dad returned from the 2nd world war all he wanted to do was sit on the side of a river bank or pond with a woodbine ciggy in his mouth, but as sad as it sounds the fish that we caught all went home and into the pot regardless, some readers may still remember the ration books for all food etc, so we were taught not to waste food of any kind,

Any way I keep meandering away from the tale of my first shark, I was still a novice then but I improved as the years passed. Brian had brought a sea rod and a good sea reel with a list of tackle that had been given him to bring back from the uk, years later I had various hooks and heavy tracer lines made for me. After a fourteen hour day I had finished work and thought that I would try out my fishing rod so I went down to the galley and asked the cook for some fish that I could use for bait.

I had previously asked the welder if he could weld a chair to the deck for me (wouldn't happen today) even then I should have asked permission but I didn't, any way I baited up my line and cast out within minutes the bait was taken, I caught the first of many Red snapper for readers who have not seen a red snapper, they are sold in the fish market and they look like gold fish if you imagine a ten or fifteen kilo gold fish and they do come a lot bigger, I will add some photos in later issues.

I could not believe it within half an hour I had four huge Red snappers they went down to the galley and they taste sweeter than cod, I was reeling my fifth one in when my line went very slack but I continued to reel in imagine my surprise when there was only a snappers head on, a huge Barracuda had sliced the body of my snapper, by this time my adrenaline was high, this same thing happened for the next

half dozen fish I had hit a school of Barracuda so I decided I would try and catch a barracuda. So the next time that I caught a fish I would leave the head on the hook and cast my line again - within minutes the line took off like a rocket and it was me that was hooked. I Had never known the thrill and excitement of fighting a good fish, I had hooked into a twenty pound barracuda it took me longer to land that one than all of the other red snappers put together. I felt a little guilty eating that one (but it tasted good). Anyway back to my first shark, I didn't realise how late it was and I had to get some sleep and be ready for work the next morning, I decided to bait my line and leave my rod over the side during the night and see what was on it in the morning I tied my rod to the hand rail and told one of my crew to sit and watch it and for him to wake me up if needed. This suited him because I excused him of any work that night, I must have been sleeping for three hours when Ali the roustabout was shaking me awake he was all excited "Mr Tom, Mr Tom Tahalahena Tahalalahen" (come quickly) I forget how to spell it now, so there I was following him dressed only in my under pants (not a bad sight then but not a good sight now) my fishing rod was bent nearly in two it was a good job I had tied it to the hand rail, What the hell do I do now? I had never experienced anything like this before, first things first, grab the rod and play out whatever was on it I decided to let it run, this was a shark and the first of many, it took me over an hour, before it was exhausted and I brought it to the side. Every muscle in my body was aching and I still did not know what do with it the hand rail of the tender was level with the water and I was face to face with the shark that I sent a photo in the last issue and boy was I glad that there was a hand rail between us, I think if the same thing happened today I would cut the line and let it go he deserved it, but then I was a macho man (sad to say) "shakush, shakush" I shouted to the roustabout, (Sorry I still cannot spell it) but it meant hammer, when he returned he handed me a ball pen hammer (not much bigger than a toffee hammer). I had been told that the sharks brain was between the snout and eyes so I decided to hit there and boy did it get mad, the hammer was dropped over the side into the sea, and I was determined to bring the Shark on board. "Fetch me a bigger hammer" I shouted, with that he returned with a seven pound sledge hammer this done the trick. Now what I thought was how do I get this two hundred pound plus on board? "use the b\*\*\*\*y crane" -this voice came from behind me - when I turned around I had a audience of expats who were rolling around holding their sides with laughter. I did not know that they had witnessed the whole episode, I will not go into the method of lifting the shark on board but seeing it hanging from the crane made me feel a little sad to think that a couple of hours ago this lovely large fish was swimming around in its own environment.

Sad to say that was the first of the many, and I do regret some of them. So what do I do with it now I thought, I decided to open it up and find what kind of diet it was on then I asked the medic for a scalpel so that I could remove the sharks jaw bone (sorry, I apologise if this may upset some readers). I don't know if people realise that a shark has roughly six rows of teeth and as they loose one tooth another stands up to replace it. This particular shark that I caught was a small Tiger and measured just over eight foot and over two hundred pounds, I decided to save a couple of teeth and take them to a gold smith in Cairo and have them made into a pair of earrings and a pendant mounted in gold. If anybody knows Carol just ask her about them, I must say they looked great I still have that pendant but the earrings were sold a couple of years ago. I cannot part with the pendant in the photo, I have many stories of shark, Manta rays, ect to tell.

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### **Technical Corner**

I have recently come across an old piece of machinery, and I was pleased to see that it was still in good working order. What I was really pleased about was that the machine in question was totally made in this country. This goes to show that when things were made in this country they were made to last. In those days people use to put their inspirations into practice and they were probably motivated by identifying a need which did lead them to produce an industrial solution to meet that need. What probably gave that generation a competitive edge, was that they had a more practical handon approach, and therefore understood the behaviour of the machines they developed. With this in mind, they applied the necessary precaution for the smooth running of the machine, which they designed to last forever. By making these machines to last so long, they carved a place in history, which will forever belong to them.

By having such a strong industrial past, it is possible that we can analyse the ways and systems which they applied in the development of their machines, and further develop the results from the analysis to achieve even greater results. 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### **CPR and Defibrillator Training**

Dear Readers, You may recall, a couple of months ago, I wrote in to the LDN talking about undertaking various fundraisers to enable the village of Leeswood to have defibrillator machines installed both at the School and the Community Centre.

My first challenge was to take on the world's fastest and Europe's longest zipwire in Snowdonia. So, on Sunday 25th June 2017, I donned my red suit and helmet and zipped along the wire. The wind was completely against me and not behind me, and it actually felt like I was slowing down over the quarry's lake not speeding up. The guy on the wire next to me surged ahead but perhaps that was because he was much taller and much heavier than me. Who isn't though! I doubt very much that I reached the speed of 100mph either, but my husband assured me that I wasn't that far behind. Admittedly I am a little bit of a thrill seeker and a bit of danger doesn't usually bother me, but I have to say I was slightly relieved when I went past the viewing point where hubby and son were standing waving at me, only to then fall ten or so metres short from the end and left with no choice but to dangle mid-air over a road and some trees. As I waited patiently for a pulley and strap to be sent out to me to reel me in someone did offer me a cup of tea, but I declined due to the fact that there was no waitress service! I knew they should have put a few more weights in my suit to help me along! Never mind. Challenge completed.

I thought some might like to see a couple of pictures taken, the first being me with my "Zipping for Ysgol Derwenfa & Leeswood Community Centre" sign (with two random blokes - very nice gentlemen they were too) and the other I took as I was standing waiting to zip down. If you cast your eyes past the lake and head a little bit up, that was where I was heading to. It's a good way down I can tell you!





What you will be pleased to hear though is that I will not have to take on any more fundraisers as, not only did I reach my set target for my first challenge, I have been fortunate enough to secure well over the amount required for the two machines. So I'm sorry that there won't be a forthcoming Bingo. I hope this won't cause a riot! 🛽

There have been so many people who have donated and I am truly thankful to each and every one of them. They are all heroes in my eyes and the world is a better place with them in it. An anonymous Donor also made an astonishing pledge of £1,500 online and this most definitely has secured the fact that the School and the Centre can have these lifesaving machines installed sooner rather than later, which is really good news for us all as a community.

My online donations reached £2,045.00 although JustGiving had to deduct a 5% fee from this as the School and Centre are not a Charity. This left an amount of £1,916.00 coming in from online donations. If anyone wishes to view the evidence for the JustGiving Page's fee, please do not hesitate to get in touch and I will be more than willing to provide the e-mail from them confirming this.

The sum of £100 has also come in from sponsorships at the school and, on my personal sponsorship form, there is another £330.00.

Overall, the total amount raised has been £2,346.00. From this, there will be the two machines purchased at £1,000 each and those fees will include the installation and relevant public training. There are also cabinets you can purchase for the machines which I feel are necessary, particularly in the case of the Community Centre with it being "open" to the public, and they come in at £120 plus VAT each. For the two cabinets the total cost would be £288.00 inclusive of VAT. Again, if anyone wants to view the evidence for the cost of these, I am more than willing to provide the e-mail from the Welsh Hearts Charity who supply the machines.

After payment of the above, this would then leave the surplus of £58.00 going to the Charity itself. However, if anyone else would still like to donate, then please do not hesitate to get in touch. I am more than sure the Charity would appreciate it.

To keep you up to speed, I have already made the relevant applications for both machines. I have been informed by the Welsh Hearts Charity that we are looking at September now for the installing and training due to their busy schedule.

Like I said in my last letter to the LDN, every week in the UK twelve young people die suddenly from an undiagnosed heart condition. There is just a 3% survival rate out of 8,000 sudden cardiac arrests that occur beyond hospitals in Wales alone.

You know, we all take for granted that there will be someone around somewhere who knows how to administer CPR should it be required. But even if they do know, who is to say that it would be enough to save someone's life. Don't forget, a shock from a defibrillator machine can increase the survival rate by 50%.

Like I say I will keep you all up to speed with progress, timescales and dates once those applications have been dealt with, but we are definitely looking at September at the earliest. What I do want to see though, more than anything, is the public attending a training session which, hopefully, will be held at the Community Centre. (The school will have their own training session). After all, what is the point of having these machines if you don't even know how to turn them on!

The Community Centre in particular as you know is used frequently for various clubs and activities, meetings, bingos

and discos, not to mention "funeral gatherings", so it is imperative the public attend the training session provided. I don't relish the thought of someone sitting at home with the mindset "It doesn't matter, I don't need to go, somebody else will know how to use it". What if we all thought like that and what if you were the person lying on the floor needing that life-saving assistance, your life slipping away?

Am I getting through? That ambulance still isn't!

once she is in place. Ms Rogers further expressed her gratitude for the warm welcome and support she had received from this Council. The Clerk stated that she was disappointed that Ms Rogers had given her notice as she had shown great interest in the Community and on a personal note as she and Ms Rogers were developing a good working relationship. Councillor G. Sherwood remarked that in the short time she had been the Project Co-Ordinator, Ms Rogers had met with a number of the Community organisations. All Councillors agreed that a letter of appreciation be sent to Ms Rogers, wishing her well in the future.

Further e-mail correspondence had been received from Natasha John of Volunteering Matters, advising that the Steering Group meeting and the NDTi session would be going ahead as planned. Rachel Evans the Senior Co-Ordinator based in Pembrokeshire will be the contact person, leading on making arrangements locally and attending both of these events. With regard to recruiting a replacement, as the recruitment process had been within the last six months it was acceptable to approach the second placed candidate. A meeting had been arranged and if all went well she would be offered the role of Project Co-Ordinator.

#### HANSON HEIDELBERG CEMENT

Members had been circulated with copies of the minutes and information slides from the Liaison Committee Briefing Session held on Monday 8<sup>th</sup> May 2017 about the planned upgrade to the cement milling facilities at Padeswood.

Further correspondence had been received from A.P. Bower, Land and Planning Manager, Land and Mineral Resources Department, Hanson Heidelberg Cement advising that there are plans for a £20 million upgrade project which will guarantee the long-term future of the Padeswood Works and its 96 employees. This project will include the installation of a new vertical roller mill for cement grinding which will improve efficiency and investment in new rail loading facilities to allow cement to be transported by train, reducing lorry movements. A formal pre-application consultation is being undertaken to provide an opportunity for the public, the community and specialist consultees to comment on the proposals before a formal application is submitted to Flintshire County Council. The consultation period will run from Monday 12<sup>th</sup> June until Tuesday 11<sup>th</sup> July 2017.

#### CADWYN CLWYD - iBEACON PROJECT

The Clerk reported that Jo Danson the Consultant involved with the iBeacon Project had been in contact. Members had been circulated with a copy of the Introductory Workshop which was scheduled to take place on Tuesday 20<sup>th</sup> June 2017 between 10am and 12 noon. It was observed that many Councillors would not be able to attend due to work commitments, an evening session would be preferred. The Clerk stated that she would request a change in the time. All Councillors in agreement.

### COMMUNITY PARKING ISSUES – BELL'S CORNER AND THE JUNCTION OF BRYN CLYD/KING STREET

Information was received that a request had been made for double yellow lines on Bell's Corner to be included in the Flintshire County Council's Highways Programme. The timing of such work if included is unknown. It was agreed by all Councillors that the parking problems on Bell's Corner were a more pressing issue than Bryn Clyd/King Street at the present time.

# FLINTSHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL – OPEN SPACE LAND WITHIN YOUR RESPONSIBILITY FOR INCLUSION IN A CONSULTATION ON THE IMPLEMENTING OF A DOG CONTROL PUBLIC SPACES PROTECTION ORDER (PSPO) IN FLINTSHIRE

Correspondence had been received from Andrew Farrow, Chief Officer, Planning and Environment, Flintshire County Council regarding the consultation on the implementation of a Dog Control Public Spaces Protection Order (PSPO) in Flintshire. This is to take place from 1st to 29th June 2017.

Public Space Protection Orders (PSPO's) are one of a number of new powers introduced by the Anti-Social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014. They are designed to stop individuals or groups committing anti-social behaviour in a public space which is having or is likely to have a detrimental effect on the quality of life of people in the area. The behaviour must be unreasonable and persistent or continuing in nature. Flintshire County Council are to consult on a proposed Dog control PSPO which is required to replace the current Dog Control Order.

The prohibitions proposed would require dog owners to:
a) remove dog waste immediately from the ground at all public locations,
b) put their dog on a lead when directed to do so by an authorised officer. This only applies to any public land where a dog is considered to be out of control or causing alarm and distress,

- c) keep dogs on leads within cemeteries,
- d) have a means on their person to collect dog waste from the ground if asked by an authorised officer.

Dogs would also be excluded from entering:

- i) enclosed children's play areas,
- ii) the playing areas of marked sports pitches,
- iii) the playing area of specific sporting or recreational facilities. A survey can be found on the following web page: www.flintshire.gov.uk/dogcontrolpspo which includes a list of potential sites where the prohibitions would be enforced.

The Clerk advised that for Leeswood, the Phoenix Park in its entirety, that is the two football pitches, the MUGA and Skate Park, children's play area had been included, and the play area at the rear of Ffordd Siarl. In Pontblyddyn the play area at the rear of Bro Alun was included.

#### **COMMUNITY HEALTH COUNCIL – NEWS RELEASE**

E-mail correspondence received from the Community Health Council advising that between January and March 2017 the seven Community Health Councils (CHCs) in Wales asked people across the country to share their ideas on improving NHS services for people with dementia and their carers'.

They asked one question; 'What can the NHS do better to improve the lives of people living with dementia?'

Over 500 people whose lives had been touched by dementia in all its forms responded. A wide range of ideas for improving services were shared. Some could be taken forward by the NHS alone, while others would need to see agencies working better and more closely together.

To coincide with Dementia Awareness Week a report has been published setting out in more detail what people had told them. The report includes ideas and suggestions from the public to make assessment easier and more accessible; calls for better access to information following diagnosis; suggests a one stop shop for advice and guidance, and identifies a need for 24-hour crisis support. It also highlights the need to get the basics right; dignity, better communication between agencies and with families, greater support and recognition for the role played by carers, and simple changes to the environment across NHS services.

### 'BATTLE'S OVER – A NATION'S TRIBUTE & WWI BEACONS OF LIGHT – $11^{TH}$ NOVEMBER 2018'

Correspondence received via One Voice Wales about taking part in 'Battle's Over – A Nation's Tribute & WW1 Beacons of Light 11<sup>th</sup> November 2018'.

The tribute would be for as many beacons as possible to be lit across the nation at 7pm on Sunday 11<sup>th</sup> November 2018 to commemorate the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the end of World War One. Comment was made that there was no suitable place in the community to site a beacon. The ideal place in our area would be Hope Mountain because of its height. It was proposed by Councillor R. Hughes and seconded by Councillor G. Sherwood that a letter be sent to the Hope and Llanfynydd Community Councils asking if they would be prepared to co-sponsor a beacon. All Councillors in agreement.




