So every day we have a guide, a brother, a friend and a Saviour.



Moving House Again

Carol moved to a new house three or four times while we lived in Egypt. Gordons wife and family had finally decided to come over, Marge his wife did not have an adventures spirit and expected everybody else to run around after her and she hated Egypt and their way of life with a passion; as it proved to be when we moved to Cyprus later, anyway the hunt for a apartment was on, (luckily enough I was on the rig again).

The word soon spread by word of mouth via the cleaners etc, this is what Carol and the boy's told me when I came off the rig, "We were all sitting around having coffee when Toweda the cleaner told me(Carol) that there was a man at the door who knew where there was a lovely modern flat available and she was to come and follow him immediately (yala yala) quickly quickly. With that Carol and Paul went out the door and started to walk behind this local dressed in his dishdasha (white bed sheet) and riding his bike when he began to pedal a little faster they had to start jogging, the expats who was watching thought it was hilarious this Egyptian riding his bike with a white woman and her young son following, it looked like they were chasing him, all they needed was a couple of truncheons and it would have looked like an old black and white movie with Laurel and Hardy. Anyway when he finally stopped outside of this two storey house Carol thought it didn't looked too bad". "Madame, come quickly follow me" He said, with that he began to descend down the steps below the house into the cellar of the house, the entrance was no higher than five foot. Carol was five seven and Paul about the same height at the time, "so there they were, the Egyptian was smaller than them so he could stand up and walk around with no problem but Paul and Carol with heads bent down, the Egyptian thought they liked it because they both started laughing" Yes madame follow me and look at the washing machine" so with heads down and knees slightly bent they followed him to a small room. "Cannot get any smaller surely" She whispered to Paul, and there it was in the centre of this small cave like room, I think the older readers will know what I am talking about when I say it was a very old Dolly Tub with the hand operated agitator handle for the younger readers this is a very large galvanised barrel with a handle on top to stir the water with the washing in add soap as required, By this time they were nearly on the floor with laughing. Carol said to Paul; "I have a good mind to send this address to your Dad and tell him come here from the rig and get my own back" needless to say they did not take that one and he did not understand why. We did manage to rent a nice place in New Maadi, we stayed in that one until we decided to move over to Cyprus sheer luxury although Tommy was quite content in Cairo, the only

problem that I had living in the new apartment was that it was close to a military base and there were soldiers

travelling to and fro and like most of these middle eastern males they have no respect for western women they liked to touch and feel more so if she was fair skinned and blonde. I remember picking up Carols handbag it was so heavy "what on earth are you carrying in this" I said, "open it and have a look" when I did I noticed half a house brick "what on earth is this for" I asked, "I was so fed up with all those soldiers touching and shouting after me so if one did that while he was on his bicycle I would swing my bag at him and he didn't know what hit him". "Great stuff keep it in your bag then".

There was one occasion when Dennis had to go into hospital with a hernia he had this since he was very young but as was so young then it was decided to leave it for a while but a problem arose during a weight lifting exercise and he was rushed into the Anglo American hospital. Do not let the fancy title fool you, the hospital was a very old one and had been used for the British army during world war 2 and it hadn't changed but it was the best one there at the time. I remember coming off the rig and we went to see him he was fourteen years of age at the time, we decided to take a box of chocolates, these were very hard to come by there I picked them up in the government store (this store was a joke): before I carry on with Dennis I will explain about this store, this was a large warehouse that received all donations from charities and supposed to be distributed among the needy but unless the needy had the money to purchase any of these gifts they did not get it. So most of us expats had to pay for the donations that the donors from the uk sent, funny old life isn't it! Anyway, back to Dennis in hospital armed with a large box of chocolates that the nurse immediately confiscated saying she would give them to him later but never did (hope she and the doctors enjoyed them). The doctor who performed his operation came in to speak with us, believe it or not he weighed around twenty stone and was smoking a huge cigar looking like Groucho Marx (don't ask who he was). After he left Carol gave Dennis some cake, that we had brought with us, "before I eat the cake there is something I would like you to see just watch this" with that he broke a piece of cake and threw it near the big old fire place "wait a minute and watch this" he said, no sooner had he threw the piece of cake when mouse came from the fire place grabbed the piece of cake and ran back with it. "It's no problem Dad it has become like a pet for me I call it Mickey, its great fun watching some of the antics it gets up to". Everyone to his own I suppose. After a couple of day's Dennis came home and could only perform light duties he told me but it never stopped him from going into the desert and riding horses while he was off school though, and talking of his school that was something else......

In the next installment I will write about this school - where the teachers and some pupils sat around feet propped on the desk smoking pot, (what a life)



Technical Corner

Joseph Caruana

Industrial development has always been the result of successful intellectual thinking by people who have a vision for the future. An intellectual inspiration can develop into a major industrial project, and produce wealth and prosperity. In order to develop an intellectual inspiration into a successful industrial development, there need to be a structural progression of positive events. In order to create a positive atmosphere, one needs to understand what future market demands might be. If one is expected to meet future market demands, it might be advisable to direct intellectual thinking to a position, from where it can produce futuristic solution to anticipated consumers need.

If we look at the past, we guickly realise that this country has produced a good number of intellectuals, who progressed with their intellectual ideas, and developed them into realistic wealth creation industrial ventures. As an example I would like to mention Sir Joseph Whitworth who developed a system to produce precision bolts and nuts which could be easily interchangeable with one another. Before Sir Whitworth developed what is known as the Whitworth tread, each and every bolt and nut were made in pairs and therefore could not be interchanged. Although the Whitworth tread is not a popular as it use to be, it needs to be mentioned that its' inventor gave a huge technical contribution to industry as a whole. Joseph Whitworth was born on the 21st December 1803 in Stockport Cheshire. Although being the son of a headmaster, Whitworth did not distinguish himself as a young man, and he only received elementary education. Upon leaving school he served a four

year apprenticeship with one of his uncles who were a cotton spinner in Derbyshire. On completion of his apprenticeship, he worked for four years as a mechanic in a factory in Manchester, from where he moved to work for Henry Maudsley at his factory in Westminster Bridge in London.

In 1841, Whitworth recommended the introduction of standard system of threads which would feature a fixed angle and a standard pitch for a given diameter. After his work was exhibited at the Great Exhibition of 1851 the Whitworth screw-thread system earned him critical acclaim both at home and abroad. Sir Joseph Whitworth strongly believed in educating young people in engineering disciplines and offered several engineering scholarships. He also wrote to the priminister of that time, and expressed his views about the importance of making students aware of how to use engineering tools to combine their theoretical knowledge with hands on practical approach.



The above diagram shows the characteristics of the Whitworth tread as developed by Sir Joseph Whitworth. The Whitworth tread was also known as British Standard Whitworth or BSW for short, and due to its' popularity with British manufacturers it was used on a large number of machinery which was exported to the four corners of the globe, thus making its' mark as a world leader of its' time.

Times might have changed, but the desire to develop new ideas is still the same. With this in mind, it might be recommended that we need to encourage young intellectual thinking to produce original solutions to identified markets.

Take extra care in the kitchen - accidents while cooking account for over half of fires in homes. Never leave young children alone in the kitchen.

Take extra care when cooking with hot oil. Consider buying a deep-fat fryer which is controlled by a thermostat (if you don't already have one).

Never leave lit candles in rooms that nobody is in or in rooms where children are on their own. Make sure candles are in secure holders on a surface that doesn't burn and are away from any materials that could burn.

Get into the habit of closing doors at night. If you want to keep a child's bedroom door open, close the doors to the lounge and kitchen. This may well help save their life if there is a fire.


Don't overload electrical sockets. Remember one plug for one socket.




New Series FOOTPATHS IN LEEESWOOD & DISTRICT No 2 NEXT COMMUNITY WALK
Walk from Leeswood to
Pontblyddyn [and back!]
SUNDAY OCTOBER 29th
Meet Leeswood Community
Centre 10 am

THE LION, THE PITCH AND THE WARDROBE

- 1. Leave the Community Centre and turn right into King Street. Just past the old School House turn right again, [WM on post] and walk up the broad lane towards the playing fields.
- 2. Ignore the signed footpath to the left, and as the lane narrows, look out for a kissing gate up the bank to your left, where they are currently building houses. Once through this gate you are in a small field. Keeping bungalows close by on the left, make for the hedge ahead.
- 3. As you pass the last bungalow, turn left as the path takes you to the road. Turn right into Heol y Goron. Follow this road with houses on either side until it veers left. Here turn off right, after No 20, into another building site. An improvised pathway to the right of the building work takes you to a gap in a chain link fence.
- 4. Once through the gap bear left in this narrow field. Cross the field and almost at once turn left to find another gap into Jenny Parry's Lane. Turn left. Who was Jenny Parry? And why does she have a lane named after her? you may ask. The hedge-lined lane passes a children's playground, left, before winding round the back of houses on Eaton Place, right and then left to emerge at the top of Pontybodkin Hill. [WM]
- 5. Cross the road and turn left. Follow the road now, and at the next junction, Bell's Corner, with the War Memorial on your left, go down County Road. A pavement emerges on the left. On the right is the site of one of Leeswood's many former pubs, **THE LION**, followed by Bethania Chapel. The footpath comes to an end, but continue down County Road, noting a thatched cottage on the left, Cefn-y-Wern. The road descends steeply taking in a sharp bend, right, where it becomes Constitution Hill [or "The Consty"], crossing the bridge over the former railway line. The road now embarks on a very sharp descent to reach the main road, the A5104. Cross the road, with care, to Nant Lodge and the safety of a pavement. Turn left.
- 6. Walk a little way towards Pontblyddyn, but soon look out, right, for an elegant stile [WM on a post] into a steep field leading down to a bridge over the Nant brook.
- 7. Here you will find an old gateway and a stile taking you onto the pavement. Cross the thundering road, and on the other side find the entrance to The Fferm. Walk down here. On the left is the old Toll gate. You will reach the ancient Jacobean house on the right. [The date over the doorway, by the way, is misleading]. Retrace your steps to the main road and turn right. Walkers in search of the **PITCH** will find Pontblyddyn Cricket Club and its delightful ground here on the right. Cross the road into the lay-by. Just before the bus stop there is a cunning tunnel of a path up, left, [WM on a post] which leads steeply back up to Corwen Road. This path is known as "The Old Brake", maybe a reference to the fact that this was the site of the colliery railway bringing tubs of coal down to the wharf. Perhaps this was where they applied the brake. Or not. "Brake" also means wood, so there may be another origin. Follow the path up The Old Brake to the road and cross over.
- 8. Here find a good signpost directing you on a path uphill, with another playground to the right. Here you cross the old railway line by means of two stiles and follow the field edge on your left, with a stream, uphill. You reach a field corner and pass through a gap in the old hedgerow. [WM on a post] Keep the field edge to your left making for power lines. Walk under power lines, keeping the field edge to your left, to another field corner and WM on a post to the right of a gateway.

9. The path crosses the last field diagonally [keep just to the left of the mound] and you will reach a good stile in the projecting corner. [WM] You are now in a narrow lane

DECLARATION OF INTEREST – MEMBERS CODE OF

CONDUCT There were no declarations of interest.

MINUTES

The minutes of the monthly meeting held on Tuesday 13th June 2017 had been circulated to all members. It was proposed by Councillor R. Hughes and seconded by Councillor R. Williams that these minutes be accepted as a true record of proceedings. All Councillors in agreement.

MATTERS ARISING NOT INCLUDED IN THE MINUTES

a) Community parking issues – Bell's Corner and junction of King Street/Bryn Clyd – Query was raised as to whether it would be feasible to install either fencing or railings on the stretch of pavement in front of the Cenotaph on Bell's Corner. It was reported that double yellow lines on Bell's Corner was being looked into by Flintshire County Council. Observation made that four cars had been seen parked on Bell's Corner at one time. It was agreed that this was very dangerous, in particular when vehicles were travelling on the highway in both directions.

b) <u>Footpath to the rear of numbers 24 to 42 Heol-y-Goron,</u>
<u>Leeswood</u> – a request had been made to the Footpath Officer at Flintshire County Council to re-open the section of footpath that was currently obstructed.

POLICE LIAISON

Apologies were received from PCSO Andrea Ellis who was unable to attend the meeting this evening. A report of recent incidences had been forwarded.

Incident update – Leeswood

There were no reports of anti-social behaviour or crime in Leeswood in the period 13th June to 2nd July 2017.

Incident update - Pontblyddyn

A theft of a vehicle from the A541 near Pontblyddyn had been reported.

PCSO Ellis advised that she was awaiting the return of the laser speed gun. Once it had been returned she would be conducting speed checks in the problem areas. Traffic division had been requested to consider Leeswood for monitoring when available. PCSO Ellis would be attending the Leeswood Carnival and had attended meetings with the Carnival Committee regarding routes.

CO-OPTION OF MEMBERS DUE TO VACANT SEATS FOLLOWING THE ELECTION

The Clerk reported that the standard process to fill the vacancies must now be followed. This would entail advertising the notice for ten electors of the Leeswood ward to request an election. If no election was requested then the co-option procedure would be undertaken.

Should the three vacancies not be filled after this then the process would be started over again.

CEMETERY

Comment was made that the Cemetery was very tidy and looked well. It was agreed that Mr Davies and his team were doing a good job.

The Clerk reported that she had still not received an invoice for the work on the Cemetery gates.

PLANNING DECISIONS

Application reference number 056601 – 7 no dwellings. **Ivy Cottage, Queen Street, Leeswood, CH7 4RQ.**

It was reported that this planning application had been passed at Flintshire County Council Planning Committee level. A site visit had been made. The development would bring some financial benefit to the community through a Section 106 agreement and this money would be going to Castell Alun High School and the Ffordd Siarl playing area.

AGE FRIENDLY COMMUNITIES

A meeting of the representatives of community organisations had been held with a view to forming a Steering Group on Thursday 29th June 2017. It had not been particularly well attended with a small but useful turnout. Draft questions for a questionnaire to be circulated through the Community had been compiled on the evening. Observation was made that there had been very short notice about this meeting.

The Clerk explained that she and the previous Age Friendly Communities Co-Ordinator had planned to circulate the invitations to the meeting on the 8th June 2017, but Ms Rogers had resigned the post.

This had resulted in the invitations eventually being sent to the Clerk with a very short window of time to get them out. Councillor G. Sherwood advised that the new Project Co-Ordinator, Ms Shereen Devine would be assuming her role on 24th July 2017.

RISK ASSESSMENT 2017/2018

Councillors had been circulated with a copy of the Risk Assessment for 2017/2018. Following a brief discussion, it was proposed by Councillor R. Hughes and seconded by Councillor G. Sherwood that this be adopted. All Councillors were in agreement.

COMMUNITY TRANSPORT

Councillor R. Hughes advised that through a combined effort of local County Councillors, it was hoped that a twice weekly bus service from the communities of Leeswood, Treuddyn, Llanfynydd and Nercwys to Broughton and Chester would be established. The days of the proposed service had yet to be decided, but it was unlikely that it would be on a Wednesday or Saturday as this would clash with the market in Mold.

HANSON HEIDELBERG CEMENT

Members had been circulated with correspondence from David Quick, Operational Support Manager, Hanson Heidelberg Cement in relation to the planned upgrade to the cement milling facilities at Padeswood. The letter advised that the web page linked to the Padeswood Community website where all of the statutory pre-application documentation can be viewed and downloaded is now live.

CADWYN CLWYD - iBEACON PROJECT

A number of Councillors and the Clerk had attended the workshop with Jo Danson on Tuesday 20th June 2017. The plan is for approximately eight iBeacons to be sited in Leeswood and two in Pontblyddyn. Users would download an app and access to this would be via Bluetooth. Content on the app would be both audio and visual and the intention was to link it to the Community Council website. The next meeting with Jo Danson was to take place on Tuesday 12th September 2017.

FLINTSHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL – OPEN SPACE LAND WITHIN YOUR RESPONSIBILITY FOR INCLUSION IN A CONSULTATION ON THE IMPLEMENTING OF A DOG CONTROL PUBLIC SPACES PROTECTION ORDER (PSPO) IN FLINTSHIRE

Copy correspondence had been received from Mr Bob Pitts of Dingle Road, Leeswood who had forwarded a letter to Flintshire County Council about this matter.

Councillors agreed to accept this copy correspondence.

COMMUNITY HEALTH COUNCIL – NEWS RELEASE

E-mail correspondence received from the Community Health Council advising of a Press Release. On 28th June, the Welsh Government published a White Paper that proposed the most radical change to the patient's voice in the NHS in over 40 years. The proposals would introduce for the first time a body with a remit across health and social care. This would see the end of long standing arrangements set up to place power in the hands of local people to monitor how their NHS services are working. The Chair of North Wales CHC said stated that while CHCs welcome the intention to create a stronger citizen voice in health and social care, but are yet to be convinced that the proposals outlined do not dilute rather than strengthen this voice in some important areas. Comment was made that the Betsi Cadwaladr NHS Trust is in 'Special Measures' and medical staff are reluctant to work for what is a failing Trust. The Trust is too big.

JOINT MEETING WITH FLINTSHIRE STANDARDS COMMITTEE AND TOWN/COMMUNITY COUNCILS

Members had been circulated with e-mail correspondence from Amanda Haslam, PA to Chief Officers, (Governance) and (Planning & Environment), Flintshire County Council, advising that the guest speaker at the next joint meeting with Flintshire Standards Committee and Town/Community Councils to take place on Monday 2nd October 2017 is Mr Nick Bennett, the Public Services Ombudsman for Wales. This was accepted.

ONE VOICE WALES – NEXT NORTH WALES AREA COMMITTEE MEETING

Councillors had been circulated with e-mail correspondence from Luned Evans, North Wales Development Officer, One Voice Wales advising that the next meeting of the One Voice Wales Wales Area Committee will be at Gwersyllt Resource Centre on 21st September 2017. This was accepted.

VILLAGE PLAN AND COMMUNITY COUNCIL ANNUAL REPORT

Members had been circulated with the Statutory Guidance for the Well Being of Future Generations (Wales) Act 2015 SPSF4, Collective Role Community Councils, also with copies of the Mold Town Council draft annual report and the Gwernymynydd Community Council Community Development Plan. The Clerk advised that it was suggested at some point in the future an audit requirement would be to produce an annual report. This would be in connection with the Well Being Act. Councillors expressed interest in preparing a Community Development Plan and it was agreed that a meeting be arranged separate to the monthly Community Council meeting to discuss this.


