The Berwyn prison has four categories ranging from very serious A to less serious D with B and C in between. There are three house blocks, Alwen, Bala and Ceiriog housing 750 men which is a third of the capacity when it is full. All religions are catered for and James is head of the Free Church. The prison's aim is to rehabilitate and with this in mind there are workshops and an educational college. It was a most interesting evening.

Mrs Jane Lucy served refreshments on behalf of the President, the raffle was drawn, the winners being Mrs Margaret Roberts and Mrs Gill Burton.

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
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MISSION STATEMENT:



Technical Corner

In industry we very frequently hear comments regarding the attitude of some individuals, and two most commonly heard comments are with reference to whether someone is adopting a positive or a negative attitude. Nevertheless, one could be seen to be positive in order to manipulate a situation for his or her advantage alone. When this happens, it might be a case where a subordinate agrees positively with a decision made by his superiors so as to gain favour. On the other hand, if someone puts up an intelligent critical opinion of a decision he might find him or herself branded as being negative. This could be a complicated situation which could be manipulated, and would probably produce a negative result over time.

In this day and age, one might realise that a dialogue between all parties involved in an industrial organisation, could be beneficial and fruitful. If one feels, that he or she are being continuously suppressed by their superior, one could develop a negative attitude, could become an introvert, and might keep good ideas to him or herself, rather than sharing them. There are several reasons why someone in charge might try to keep his or her subordinates suppressed, and might be due to degree of fear that those who are under his control might one day know as much as him and pose a threat to his or her position.

Another situation where one could find friction between those who are in charge and those who carry out the actual task, is when those who are carrying the actual task know more about the operation carried out than those who are in charge. A situation like this could also cause resentment and

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ill feeling because those in charge might be paid allot more than those who are actually doing the grafting. It is perfectly understood, that nobody knows everything about everything, therefore, it should also be perfectly understood that those doing the actual operation might have valuable ideas that might improve an industrial operation which could give an organisation a competitive edge or profitable advantages.

It is clearly understood, that an industrial organisation is as good as its workforce, and the workforce is as strong as the talents or skills they have to offer. Now, if those in charge keeps a keen eye for talent, and implement that talent for the benefit of the organisation, than one could develop a strong industrial base right through the organisation. If on the other hand, people with talent feel that their ideas are consciously being suppressed, and months later they see their ideas being implemented at the glorification of someone who might hold a higher position, those with talent might feel that the position that one might hold can manipulate intellectual talent to the advantage of rank and position.

To this end, it might be recommended that it could be a good idea to look positively at how to integrate intellectuality and position with mutual respect. Respect is something that one earns over a period of time, and it is normally earned by how we behave with others. One of the best ingredients that might contribute to a respectable position within an organisation is to be humble and ready to listen to those who are willing to contribute. With this in mind, it is the duty of everybody to recognise progressive talent, and try to contribute to develop a procedure within which these talents can be processed and turned into industrial success.

As a nation, this country have always developed good talent, and translated that talent into a strong industrial wealth. With the kind of wealth that the nation has created in the past, one can say that we can definitely develop the present, and shape the future.

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New Series: FOOTPATHS IN LEESWOOD & DISTRICT No 3. To Heaven and Hell (and back)

This is a circular walk from the village of Leeswood to the Black Gates and the White Gates of Leeswood Hall. Allow 2½ hours for the complete walk. Some stretches may well be muddy. Start at the Community Centre in Leeswood.

- 1. Leave the Community Centre and turn left on King Street, following the pavement past the Surgery, then over the road to the pavement on the other side. Cross Ffordd Derw, coming in from the right, as you walk along out of the village. When you reach the bus stop cross over to the other side to find the lane up to the farm, indicated by the right-hand of two waymark signs on a post.
- 2. Continue up the lane, allotments on the right, to reach the farm entrance. Opposite, on the right, is a kissing gate taking you into a coppice. Waymarks point in two directions. Follow the one taking you half-right between trees and down to a hidden kissing gate. Once in the field beyond, keep close to the field edge on your right to another gate already visible, just ahead. A waymark here would be useful. Go through the gate.
- 3 As you approach the pool used by anglers bear left to a stile. The whole of this section, by the way, is pretty muddy. Once over the stile you need to negotiate a way through marshy territory. At first, keep close to the pool fence on your right and this will help you cross an obscure stream which feeds into the pool. Keep some temporary fence work on your left at a point where the stream is covered over, then bear left. Make for a stile in the hedgerow ahead, at first not easily spotted, hidden beneath a splendid oak
- 4. Once over this excellent stile you are in a field. Keep close to the hedge on the right as you walk uphill. Approaching the brow, the footpath moves away from the hedge to find a prominent stile in the hedgerow facing you. Once over this good new stile, complete with waymark, keep the well-groomed hedge close by on the right to a stile in the corner and a waymark on a post. This takes you to the edge of a road, Stryt Cae Rhedyn. Turn right, but cross the road immediately to a kissing gate and a waymark on a post on the opposite side.
- 5. Follow the field edge on your right and go downhill towards the wood, Coed Llai, "Lees Wood". In the field corner you reach a stile needing a waymark. Once over, you are in a rectangular-shaped field and need to reach the opposite corner. To do this, take the short route straight across the field and turn left as you reach the wood. Or you could follow two sides of the field to avoid damaging any crops. Whatever the route you reach the far field corner.
- 6. Here you plunge into undergrowth, between two marked posts, into woodland, where you may have to make your own path. Keep the ever-deepening ditch to your left and look out for hidden roots and fallen branches. You will then reach a waymarked stile taking you into the field beyond. Once over, turn sharp left and, keeping the field edge close by on the left, go downhill. You are looking for an open gateway to the left, some way down. When you get there, turn left through the gateway and immediately right, so that you now have a hedge close by on the right.
- When this hedge starts to veer away to the right, you need to leave it. Continue downhill, in the same direction you have been following, across the centre of the field, aiming for the corner of woodland. After a short distance you will begin to see the stile you need in a hedge at the bottom of the field.
- 7. Cross this good, waymarked stile into the next field. Keep going in the same direction as before, aiming for a road. You may be able to see traffic on this the B5444. Don't wander off to the left. You need to cross the river Terrig first, and should soon see the green fences of the bridge. Cross over the river and make for a good, waymarked stile in the hedge beyond. Once over, you find yourself standing on the edge of a busy road. Turn left. 8. Look out for very fast, possibly intense traffic behind you, but stay on the left-hand side of the road to be able to admire the Black Gates of Leeswood

Hall and the twin lodges, Heaven and Hell. Once past, follow the stone wall on the left to reach a merciful cart track taking you off the road. Here there is an interesting stone stile, waymarked, taking you into the parkland of Leeswood Hall. Keep the fence to your right and newly planted trees to your left. You will begin to see the River Terrig again, over to the left. You are really making for a corner where the fence on your right comes down to the river. Here, to your right, you will find a stile helping you into the field beyond.

- 9. Once over, turn left. The river is over to your left, with interesting birdlife [I saw an egret on my last visit] as you make your way to a field corner and a stile onto a road once more, narrow but busy with farm vehicles and buses. Once over the stile turn left and follow the road to the narrow bridge ahead, past White Gates Cottage and cross the river again over the old stone bridge. You are now very close to the stunning White Gates of Leeswood Hall, on the left. After admiring the gates at close hand, take the sharp left-hand bend and follow the road uphill.
- 10. As you toil up the road, past the entrance to the Hall on the left, a sharp right-hand bend takes you beyond a field on the right containing the 18th Century Pigeon House [now a ruin] to reach a sharp left-hand bend in the road. Here look out for an access lane going off to the right, marked by a waymark on a post. Leave the road and follow the tree-lined lane, known locally as the Horse Walk. The lane bends right and trees on the left give way to a field. Here a waymarked stile, on the left, enables you to cross into a field. 8. Look out for very fast, possibly intense traffic behind you, but stay on the left-hand side of the road to be able to admire the Black Gates of Leeswood Hall and the twin lodges, Heaven and Hell. Once past, follow the stone wall on the left to reach a merciful cart track taking you off the road. Here there is an interesting stone stile, waymarked, taking you into the parkland of Leeswood Hall. Keep the fence to your right and newly planted trees to your left. You will begin to see the River Terrig again, over to the left. You are really making for a corner where the fence on your right comes down to the river. You are now very close to the stunning White Gates of Leeswood Hall, on the left. After admiring the gates at close hand, take the sharp left-hand bend and follow the road uphill.

- 10. As you toil up the road, past the entrance to the Hall on the left, a sharp right-hand bend takes you beyond a field on the right containing the 18th Century Pigeon House [now a ruin] to reach a sharp left-hand bend in the road. Here look out for an access lane going off to the right, marked by a waymark on a post. Leave the road and follow the tree-lined lane, known locally as the Horse Walk. The lane bends right and trees on the left give way to a field. Here a waymarked stile, on the left, enables you to cross into a field.
- 11. Keep close to the field edge, uphill, with a hedge on your immediate left, and follow it round. When you are almost at the top of the rise, look out on the left for a well-maintained stile, with a waymark, in the hedgerow, approached by a wooden bridge over the ditch. Once over the stile you are in another field which you need to cross directly. You cannot see the field gate you are aiming for. So take as your marker a prominent tree on the far side of the field. Not the rather pointed tree, but another one, to the left of it. You can see farm buildings ahead, too, but need to aim well left of these. Cross the field and reach the field gate, which leads you into another field, sloping down from the left.

New Series: FOOTPATHS IN LEESWOOD & DISTRICT No 3. To Heaven and Hell (and back) CONTINUED...


On your right is a pond, well stocked with wild life. Keep close to the hedge on your right with the pool beyond. After a short distance you reach another stile, taking you into a field often with horses. Leave the comfort of the hedge now, on the right, and strike across the field. Aim for a stile in the hedgerow facing you, possibly out of view. When you reach the stile, marked by a post with a waymark, cross over onto the road. Take an access drive, opposite, to Celyn Farm.

- 12. You now pass between farm buildings, one marked with a date, 1827 and continue towards a gate across the drive, with an attractive stone stile next to a dog kennel, on the left. Use the stile to gain access into more open territory. Bear left. You are faced with a choice of three field gates. Take the middle one which will allow you into a field with a hedge on the left. Access for walkers here could be improved. You are now in a field sloping away to the right with good views. Keep close to the hedge on the left to reach a field corner, where there is a stile with a waymark on a post, which at present gives a good indication of the way to walk, after crossing into the next field.
- 13. Once in this next field leave the security of hedgerows and cross directly to a somewhat distant field corner. Aim for a prominent ash tree on the skyline. You reach an impressive new galvanised gate which will take you into a field sloping away to your right. Hug the hedge to your left and after a short distance reach a new stile with two waymarks. Cross the stile and turn right, downhill now. Keep to the field edge on your right, as it bends left to a field corner with an inadequate stile which has lost its step. A sign indicates: "Leeswood Heritage Trail"
- 14. Once over, follow the right-hand hedgerow for a very short distance before striking out across the field, avoiding going uphill, aiming for the trees in the hedge ahead. You need to find, somewhat out of your vision, a galvanised stile, which will help you into yet another field. Keep the field edge to your right to gain access into the field beyond. Keep the next field edge to your right, passing a house, also on the right, then under power lines to avoid a muddy gateway entrance to reach a field corner and stile with stone steps.
- 15. This stile takes you into your last field. Once over, turn sharp left for a short stretch, the hedge on your left, to a good stile in the field corner, but without a waymark. Once over, take the left-hand downhill path, keeping the football pitch over to your right. Here you will find a well-used path taking you to the backs of Albert Street, the football pitch now quite high up on the right. A new kissing gate, in good order but short of a waymark, allows you through into an access drive, the green railings of the park on your right, with the houses of Albert Street on your left. Continue down to the road, the former chapel on your left, and then turn off right into the park. Instead of following the main pathway, keep left, close to splendid old trees and a new fence. Keep the mound to your right to find the steps down to the Community Centre by the side of the Bowling Green and you are home.

- The White Gates -

'Where are my Switzers? Let them guard the door'
Shakespeare

Many years ago in the 1700s there was a young boy who lived in Switzerland named Switzer. Switzer would play in the snow with his father and many brothers, then come home to hot cheese fondue. As a teenager he became a Swiss Guard. He fought in many battles and was involved with several peasant rebellions. Due to his talent he became the Head of the Swiss Guard. To him this was a great honour and his parents threw a party in celebration but a few years later their hearts were broken, he would be leaving home and travelling to Vatican City where he would guard the Pope.

He was getting ready to leave when he met Vetia and love had found him. Unfortunately for Switzer, Swiss Guards are required to be unmarried so Switzer had a hard decision to make between work and love. He chose to desert the Swiss Guard and he and Vetia had to leave Switzerland. They decided to escape to Britain, they were sure not to find them there. So Switzer and his loved one set off across the treacherous grounds of Switzerland and along the French border. After many weeks of travelling they finally reached a dock and boarded a mail boat to England. But sadly, Vetia died of a fever over night. 

On Wednesday November 15th, 2017, the new School Council had a service. The Chairman of the School Council, Daniel Robertson, put together an assembly and that is what we are going to talk to you about today.

First the School Council introduced themselves including the Chairman and Secretary, Daniel Robertson and Ellen Waddell. Each member held up a piece of paper. There were letters on the paper they were holding up and when you read what they were holding up as a word it read COUNCIL. Each letter stood for a sentence beginning with a letter of the word like, C stood for Care for our school. When they'd gone through that the Chairman and Secretary went along explaining how you could care for our school and things like that.

Remembrance Day

On Remembrance day we had a thoughtful service at the cenotaph at Leeswood. We had readers, Sam Tudor, Rhys White, Callum Kendrick, Steven Rogers, Daniel Robertson, Nell Hardy, Neve Robins and Abi Smith. Reading Poems, Prayers and Bible Readings, it was very respectful. Mr. Jones read out all names on the cenotaph and we had some pupils who had relatives on it. We even had some information about the men on the cenotaph. We had some adults watching as they went by in their cars and some of them even stopped and got out of their cars and watched the service as it progressed.





If you think things are bad now – it's going to get worse...

The financial situation facing Flintshire and all Councils is dire. We have had to endure ten years of budget cuts throughout an era of austerity. Next year will be the toughest yet and we are far away from being able to balance the Council's budgets, at this stage of planning the budget, now that we have seen the detail of the Welsh budget planned for 2018/19.

Flintshire County Council has an annual Council Fund Budget (for most services but excluding Council housing, housing benefits payments and other specific budgets) of around £250M. Since austerity began, following the world-wide economic collapse, we have made nearly £80M of savings to balance the books and protect front line services. At the same time we have continued to be a high performer in Wales across all services, and have been ambitious and innovative in building new schools, extra care housing schemes and now council housing as shining examples. We have worked with communities to transfer facilities such as Holywell Leisure Centre to community ownership.

We could now be stopped in our tracks. We had forecast a budget gap of around £12M for next year. The situation has worsened knowing that we will lose another £1.6M-£3.0M or more of Welsh Government funding on top of this to come in April. To put this in perspective – as an illustration of the scale of the challenge – we could close all of our leisure centres and libraries, end our subsidy to Theatr Clwyd, and raise Council Tax by 5%, and

we would still have a funding gap to bridge. This is because over 3/5ths of our budget goes straight into schools and social services to which people are entitled; meaning that the cuts largely fall on all of the other services from leisure to culture, to roads and the environment, to environmental health and trading standards. People ask why it is that we have to find such large sums if we are facing budget cuts of 'only' £1.6 – 0.9% of our core Government grant which, at around 75% of our budget, is topped up by local Council Tax income. The answer is that we have to absorb the costs of normal inflation such as pay and prices, high cost of inflation such as rising energy and fuel prices for buildings and vehicles, the spiralling costs of extra demands for services such as older people and social care in an ageing population, new UK Government taxes on employers, and new Government schemes and initiatives for which we are not properly funded. These all add up.

Over the next two months we will be announcing how we plan to cope. We would appreciate you tracking the position and offering your support.

Our hope — across the political groups on the Council — is that the UK Government will relent on its policy of austerity and release much needed funding for social services and education particularly. If it does not, and the Welsh Government has no more money to pass on, we might see the closure of services and facilities which our communities rely on and, until now, we have been able to protect. FLINTSHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL – OPEN SPACE LAND WITHIN YOUR RESPONSIBILITY FOR INCLUSION IN A CONSULTATION ON THE IMPLEMENTING OF A DOG CONTROL PUBLIC SPACES PROTECTION ORDER (PSPO) IN FLINTSHIRE

The Clerk reported that following the consultation period the results of the online survey and comments had been collated and presented to the County Council's Environment Overview and Scrutiny Committee for discussion and the Cabinet Committee of Flintshire County Council for final determination. From 20th October 2017, the Public Spaces Protection Order will be enforceable countywide. This replaces the out of date Dog Control Order.

FLINTSHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL - BEST KEPT COMMUNITIES COMPETITION 2018

Following the encouraging remarks and awards from this year's Best Kept Communities Competition it was suggested that consideration be given to build on this for preparation of next year's entry. Observation was made that perhaps this would be something the Age Friendly Communities Steering Group could get involved in and hopefully encourage residents to join in. All Councillors agreed that this matter remain on the Agenda and that the Steering Group be invited to help out.

SOUTH FLINTSHIRE POLICE CONSULTATION EVENING

Councillor D.K. Crowther provided a report from the South Flintshire Police Consultation Evening held at Mold Town Hall on Thursday 21st September 2017. This had been circulated to all Councillors.

The main points of the report are as follows: -

- i) It is important that we are report any issues straight away to our local PCSO. Or call 101.
- ii) We must as a community be vigilant at all times. Especially where there are vulnerable people who might be bullied into using their homes to distribute drugs or stolen property. These people are being used by criminal gangs. iii) By reporting suspicious activity, we can all help to reduce crime and drug use. The police can gather vital information that is used in helping to arrest the person(s) higher up the link in the criminal gangs from the bigger cities like Liverpool
- iv) The Police are struggling to wear all the hats they have been given. For example: two police officers attend to a person who has mental health problems.

and Manchester.

The officers are asked to take the person to Wrexham Hospital. Wrexham have no medical team to assess the individual, so they are asked to go to Bangor Hospital. The police have to wait until the person has been admitted into the care of medical staff. (This can take many hours). The two police officers are then told that there is now a place available in Wrexham Maelor Hospital. 6/8/10 hours. This has taken many hours of police time and resources. It could be a medical (RTA waiting for an ambulance), mental health (waiting for a mental health professional) or a problem with a child (waiting for someone from Social Services) There has to be **TWO** police officers in attendance.

Inspector Whibberley will be the first to admit that they need to engage more with the media and public. Maybe we as a council could help more by getting the message out to the people of Leeswood & Pontblyddyn that we NEED to be more vigilant in our communities. Would the people of Leeswood & Pontblyddyn feel more protected if they spoke to a local councillor, rather than the police?

Councillors expressed gratitude at the report sent by Councillor Crowther. It was agreed by all that these issues be discussed with PCSO 3684 Peter Jones.

MATCH FUNDING SCHEME – IMPROVEMENTS TO CHILDREN'S PLAY AREAS

Correspondence had been received from Ian Bancroft, Chief Officer Organisational Change, Aura Leisure and Libraries relating to provision of match funding for play area equipment 2017/2018. The playing area at Ffordd Siarl is highlighted as amber and in need of upgrading. Comment was made that the financial position needs to be looked at before a decision could be made. NORTH WALES CHC – RESPONSE TO WELSH GOVERNMENT WHITE PAPER 'SERVICES FIT FOR THE FUTURE'

E-mail correspondence had been received from Geoff Ryall-Harvey, Chief Officer, North Wales Community Health Council. Members had been circulated with this document and the response to the Welsh Government White Paper 'Services Fit for the Future'. Councillors agreed to accept this correspondence.

COUNCILLOR C.E. JONES JP – RESIGNATION FROM LEESWOOD AND PONTBLYDDYN COMMUNITY COUNCIL

The Clerk reported that correspondence has been received from Councillor C.E. Jones JP stating his intention to resign as a Community Councillor. Councillors expressed their regret at this, Councillor C.E. Jones JP had been the longest serving Community Councillor to date and his knowledge, also support would be greatly missed. It was agreed by all Councillors that this item be put on the Agenda for the November meeting.

MATTERS OF AN IMPORTANT NATURE

- a) <u>Chairman's Civic Service</u> Councillors agreed that the Civic Service held on Sunday 24th September 2017 had been a lovely day. Particular comment was made about the buffet provided by the Guides and Brownies leaders. Reverend Pat Christopher conducted a very nice Service and Mr Raymond Bryan was thanked for playing the organ. The Chairman stated that he had very much enjoyed the Civic Service and he thanked the Councillors for their support.
- b) Wall/Posts at New Inn, Pontblyddyn It was brought to the Council's attention that a wall and posts was being erected at the New Inn, Pontblyddyn. The structure was considered to resemble a boundary for a car park. Concern was expressed as it had been noted that the structure did not appear to have sufficient strength to hold back the soil. All Councillors agreed that this matter should be reported to the Planning Department at Flintshire County Council.
- c) <u>Traffic Lights at the Crossroads, Pontblyddyn</u> The speed of traffic through Pontblyddyn village was believed to be a cause for concern.
