The clue is obviously in the name. Evensong is a sung service, Evening Prayer is said. For the past few years all the Evening Services in Pontblyddyn have been said because we haven't had an organist to help us with the service. This is about to change! We have accepted an offer from Mr Christopher Enston to play for a service of Evensong once every 2 months in Pontblyddyn.

Our Evening service will be part of a pattern of worship which will be set up across the Pontblyddyn and Nercwys Churches. Each month there will be an Evensong Service at 5.00p.m. in one of the churches. See below for service dates. When the service is in our church, it will be the only Service in Christ Church that (there will not be a Morning Prayer Service).

Anyone who enjoys Evensong is very welcome to join us for any of the Evening Services in any of our Churches. The same chants will always be used at all of them, we will have traditional hymns and traditional prayers.

WHEN IS A MOUNTAIN NOT A MOUNTAIN?

If you have been to Flint Mountain, for instance, you'll come to the conclusion it hardly merits the title. But in terms of names, local custom wins the day, and a mynydd can be a hill or a mountain. So Hope Mountain is a mountain is a mountain.

There are several ways up Hope Mountain [1083 feet] and the views from there are spectacular. Pathfinders will be blazing a trail from Leeswood via Pontblyddyn on Bank Holiday **Sunday, May 6th**, leaving the Community Centre at 10 am. So, if you want to locate footpaths to the top, come along and join us. As you might imagine, with even a small mountain, there is a significant climb involved, and I plan to come back a different way, via Llanfynydd and the old railway line to Coed Talon, so be prepared for that distance too

There is an extensive County park at the top, Waun-y-Llyn, open all the year round, with a convenient Car Park too, if you plan to visit another time using your own transport.

Incidentally Pathfinders have a monthly Sunday walk, so look out for the notices in the village and find out where we shall be off to next.

Technical Corner

Joseph Caruana

I have always admired Sir Isaac Newton for his contribution to science, physics and engineering. These subjects have contributed to allot of our intellectual achievements, which paved the way to created wealth and prosperity for the general public at large. Those of us, who study physics, science, or engineering, will come across the term Newton on many occasions. Newton (N) is the term used to measure force, and it is sometimes referred to as Newton force. Although Sir Isaac Newton lived between 1642 and 1727 his name is still very popular among the intellectual fraternity, and his principles do apply to other subjects rather than just those mentioned above.

Sir Isaac Newton is widely remembered for his law of physics that what goes up must come down. He is also remembered for understanding that for every force or action there is an equal and opposite force or action. This applies to a comprehensive range of disciplines within our daily lives. If these laws of physics were not true, then we will have objects moving about in perpetual motion for eternity. What keeps things steady and in place within our planet, is the gravitational pull exerted by the earth. An aeroplane flies because the force created by the engines and the wings is equal or more to that exerted by the forces of gravity. However, as soon as the forces exerted by the engines and the wings are eased off, the flying object will dissent back to earth. Again, it proves that Sir Isaac Newton was right when he said that what goes up must come down, and this proves that he was light years ahead of his

In an engineering project, the opposite forces are taken into consideration prior to the initial forces. Again this can be explained by the principles within a flying object. The initial force of a flying object will make it airborne. The equal and opposite forces will try to pull it back to earth again. In this case, if the opposite forces are not controlled, a flying object will come back down to earth with such a force that it will crush, causing considerable damage. In this case, the prior considerations which are put in place are the application of a smooth easing of power, and the shock absorption equipment, which will minimise the impact. These shows how equal and opposite forces can be used to our advantage, if applied properly, and if taken into consideration prior to the initial action.

Nature in itself operates on the same principle, and if we take into consideration the cycle of rain water, we can observe Newton's law of physics in action. Water in essence goes down to the lowest point available to it, this is because gravity pulls it downwards. At the

beginning of the cycle, water (due to hot conditions) is evaporated from the sea, leaving salt and other Impurities (which are heavier than vaporised water) behind. When the vaporised water reaches a certain height it will come in contact with colder weather and it will start to condense. When condensation takes place, the air molecules and the water molecules separate, and as water on its own cannot stay airborne, it will come down in the form of droplets. Here we have a case, where nature transformed water into vapour, lifted it into the air against the forces of gravity, and then condensed it back into water, which gravity pulled back down to earth.

Gravity also plays an important part in the energy contained within a mass of matter, and if a mass of matter is elevated to a certain level above a surface, it will contain an amount of energy equals to mass of the object multiplied by the gravity pull multiplied be the height. With this in mind, if rain falls on high ground it will contain a certain amount of energy, and if that water is collected in reservoir it will contain a huge amount of energy which could be harnessed to our advantage. That is where hydro-electric generation comes into play. Here, the amount of energy contained within the mass of water by virtue of its position is transformed in mechanical energy when it passes through the water turbines, which will then drive the electric generators to generate electricity. In this case, nature is working with us by lifting the water to a high position in the first place. Earlier on, I have mention the part played be the engines and the wings to lift an aircraft into the air. In this case we apply mechanical means to fight against the forces of nature and lift a mass into the air. In the case of a hydro-electric plant we harness the forces of gravity and work with nature to our advantage. With this in mind, it is clearly seen that there is to sides two everything and that for every force there is an equal and opposite force irrespective of how big it is.

Equals and opposites come from walks of life. In engineering we have seen practices that were the bee's knees at a certain time and made obsolete by another practice at a certain other time that followed. We have seen great names of car manufacturers, engine manufacturers, and home appliances manufacturers, disappear or replaced by others names over a period of time. One should take nothing for granted, because due to opposite forces nothing will last forever and everything comes to an end. It is proper to conclude, that as long as we understand that there is an equal and opposite action to every action we take, we will be better prepared to adjust ourselves to the new order. We need to be progressive, we need to move forward, we need to be innovative, and we need to look for new ideas all the time, nevertheless, whether they come from different people is another matter.

Memories of an oilfield man


Israeli Dispute

Tom Nicholson

The title makes this article sound worse than what it was, as stated in previous issues, the six day war between Israel and Egypt had not long ended with Egypt coming second best. We had been drilling in the Gulf of Suez for over twelve months with no incidents, if you do not count the normal personnel injuries, hardly a week passed without one of these or equipment failures, of the two, equipment failure was taken more seriously than personnel injuries, the reason being with equipment failure the rig was on downtime and the contract stated that our company IDC was responsible for downtime so GUPCO would not pay the rig while it was not drilling. In the seventies the cost of hiring our old rig was in the region of \$20,000 per day. In 2007 The Polaris was the last ultra-modern drill ship that I had worked on and that cost around £400,000 per day to hire, (mega bucks). In the last year or so we had successfully drilled a number of gas and oil wells and burnt off excess gas via a flare boom*, (see attached photo). I really enjoyed flaring off especially in the evening time, if you can imagine an immense bonfire with numerous shooting stars in a starlit sky above what more could I ask for. During these burn offs there was little work that we could do other than keep a close observation on the flame and the wind direction; if the wind changed then the burn off would have to be shut down (valves closed etc) while we changed over to the opposite flare boom, there were two booms one on the Starboard side and the other on the Port side. During these burn offs the heat was unbearable, more often than not the paint on the side of the rig would peel and blister, one of our jobs would be to fit water cooling hoses (fire hoses) on the rig side, even though there were cooling spray rings fitted to the end of the boom, It was an amazing sight, the heat and the flames always attracted fish of all types and the smaller fish attracted bigger fish then came the sharks. Many a time I have and caught Tiger/Sand/ Hammerhead/ barracuda/and even Giant Manta Ray in the Indian ocean. I have seen huge turtles, and all of these were attracted by the light of the flare coming from the boom, it was always an amazing sight that I never tired off. One time I remember standing by the hand rail watching a group of Dolphins playing around, apparently this was a dolphin breeding ground, I thought this was unusual due to the number of sharks around, I watched as the young dolphins leapt into the air twisting and playing reminding me of baby lambs in the fields, all this they done as though they were trying to out jump each other, but it was not this sight that remains in my memory it was what happened with the six or seven adult dolphins that amazed me. They left the young ones playing which I thought was unusual, until I realised what was happening the adults must have known that a shark was in the vicinity, and that the young dolphins were on the menu; but I was absolutely amazed what happened next, I could not believe what I saw, if only camcorders were available in those days.

At a guess I would say It may have been around a hundred yards away, when I noticed a great deal of disturbance and turmoil in the water that could not have lasted longer than a couple of minutes or so, the dolphins then returned to their young who had never stopped playing around. I could not think of any reason for this behaviour until we spotted a very large dead shark floating on the water surface, what had happened was the dolphins had attacked the shark on both sides ramming it until it died, isn't nature wonderful (cruel but wonderful) anyway that was one of my more memorable memories.

Back to the Israel gun boat and I will relate what happened; we had just completed a well and the company man informed us of our next location this was a day's tow away. I had lowered one anchor Buoy* down to the New Orleans supply boat Gulf Tide, then passed and secured the towing bridles ready for the tow. During any rig move in the gulf there would always be an Israeli gun boat within a mile or two keeping us under close observation. Once we had reached the given location the boat dropped one fifteen-ton anchor with the two-ton location Buoy attached, via a four inch diameter wire cable. The buoy would be four hundred yards away from the rig, then the supply boat returned for the next anchor, this was when the Israeli gun boat decided to interfere via radio; we were in the radio room when the captain of the gun boat informed us that we had dropped our anchor in Israel waters and that we would have to retrieve it immediately or else, "Sorry sir we are working for GUPCO and this is an American vessel flying an United States flag" Luke said, The Israeli captain replied in perfect English "I understand your predicament sir but these are American guns trained on you and Washington is a long distance away" "I will have to ask for instructions from Gupco" Luke replied, -"By all means sir I will wait but you will move" by this time all of us expats were near the radio listening in, some were very alarmed but myself and Jimmy Danes took it in our stride Jimmy a Brummie and me being Scouse were trying to make light of the situation, that's my excuse anyway. "Stay where you are and do not pull the anchor up under any circumstances and we will send assistance out to you" was the reply from Gupco, Luke then spoke to the Israeli captain and informed him of our instructions, "very well sir you have been warned" then he gave orders for the anchor buoy to be blown out of the water which is what happened.

"This is now getting serious Jim" I said. Then Luke decided to have his say "Tom why don't you issue gloves around as the hand rails will get hot when the shell start to hit us" - we all had a weird sense of humour in those days.

We were still attached to a tow boat, The Israeli had sent a small fast landing craft with a group of armed soldiers to board us we had no option but to let them on board, we were then asked to gather every person on board and bring their passports or work permits then gather on the main deck. While Jimmy was in his cabin he changed into a T shirt with the Union Jack printed on, what good that would be I don't know. All us expats had no problem with our passports, but the local Egyptian labour was terrified with good reason. I wrote of my leading roustabout, the one that was in the seven day war and was wounded in the back. I managed to get an official work permit and that saved him from being taken away with two others with no paper work, and were never seen again, "if you are going to shoot anybody shoot that cook he has been trying to poison us for months" Luke tried without success to lighten mood,

The assistance that Gupco sent out to us came in the form of a very old Egyptian gun boat left over from WW11 it reminded me of the boat in that very old movie the African Queen. We were where still attached to the tow boat but having no anchor on the sea bed we were just slowly drifting around waiting for further orders, the Egyptian gun boat was terrified of the Israelis and kept hiding on the Starboard side of our rig while the Israelis were on the port side, this standoff went on for almost three days and ended only when the Egyptian gun boat broke down and began to drift towards the Israelis. I remember that the Gulf Tide supply boat offered to take the Egyptian boat in tow but was warned that if they did they would be blown out of the water, instead the Israelis called for a backup boat from the port of Tor to take the broken down boat away and that was the last we heard about it. Little did I know that the whole incident was being reported on the world news and Carol and the boys were watching it unfold on tv, we were finally given a new location for the rig. There was a lot more to that incident which I won't go into, I think that is enough for this issue readers may get bored.

It is a community where older people are recognised and valued, and where older people are provided with opportunities to engage with all aspects of community life in a way that suits them. An agefriendly community recognises that the true experts in community planning are the members of that community themselves and works with them to co-produce community services and facilities. Age-friendly communities involve improving local transport services, housing, and public spaces to make sure they benefit everyone, regardless of their age. Age-friendly communities also encourage intergenerational working and the exchange of skills, knowledge and experience between generations. Ms Rochira is grateful for the work already achieved in Leeswood and Pontblyddyn and she congratulates those involved on their achievements to date.

These efforts contribute to the Strategic Action Plan, and the Flintshire Ageing Well Plan, and is a credit to what communities can achieve through dedication, commitment and passion.

Notification of an Age Friendly Communities open event at the Leeswood Community Centre on Wednesday 14th March 2018, 12.30pm till 2.30pm had also been received. This is an event to find out how Rural Wisdom in Leeswood and Pontblyddyn is working for the older people and the Community.

All Councillors are invited to attend a meeting with the Age Friendly Communities Steering Group to be held at the Community Centre on Thursday 15th March 2018, 6.15pm till 7.15pm. This will be a very informal gathering, just to have a chat about the action plan, discuss what has been achieved so far and identify how we can move forward, with a focus on the Age-Friendly accreditation, Community Café, developing new activities and Community Events. A copy of the action plan has been circulated to all Members.

COMMUNITY TRANSPORT

It was reported that the new community bus service to Broughton was getting very little use. Hopefully this will pick up when the weather improves. If the service is not used it will be withdrawn.

Concern was expressed at the lack of evening and Sunday bus services in the community. All Councillors agreed that an invitation be sent to representatives of Llanfynydd and Treuddyn Community Councils to attend a joint meeting to discuss this issue.

PARKING ISSUES - BELL'S CORNER AND JUNCTION OF BRYN CLYD/KING STREET

It was pointed out that more injury accidents are recorded at Stryt Cae Rhedyn than at Bell's Corner. Observation was made that the suggestion of putting yellow lines on Bell's Corner related to danger to pedestrians because of the cars parked part on and part off the pavement. There had been no reference to accidents occurring in the area.

The Clerk referred to the part on and part off the pavement that was now occurring on the front of numbers 9-14 Bryn Clyd, Leeswood.

It had been particularly difficult this morning because not only were cars parked on the pavement but the bins and recycling were out making it impossible to walk the pavement. Councillors agreed that this was dangerous especially for children walking to school.

Councillor R. Hughes is to arrange a meeting on these sites with officers of Flintshire County Council.

CADWYN CLWYD - IBEACON PROJECT

It was pointed out that time is running out for completion of this project. Any material such as old photographs that people may have to share on the iBeacons would be greatly appreciated. The Clerk is to contact Mrs Jo Danson to make progress.

TRAFFIC MANAGEMENT, PONTBLYDDYN CROSSROADS

As a meeting at Bell's Corner and Bryn Clyd is to be arranged with officers of Flintshire County Council, it was suggested that it may be convenient to include Pontblyddyn Crossroads at the same time. All Councillors in agreement.

FLINTSHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL - TOWN AND COMMUNITY COUNCILS SUMMER PLAY SCHEME PROGRAMME 2018

The Clerk reported that Janet Roberts, Play Development Officer, Flintshire County Council has requested that this Council provides an invoice for £911.00 for the Play Opportunities grant from Welsh Government, towards the county summer play scheme programme. This Council will then be invoiced for the total cost for of the play scheme in September 2018.

FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT AND GOVERNANCE IN LOCAL COUNCILS 2016-17

Members had been circulated with a copy of this report received from the Welsh Audit Office. This Community Council complies with the requirements of the Welsh Audit Office.

TOWN AND COMMUNITY COUNCILLOR TRAINING

E-mail correspondence received from Matt Georgiou, Deputy Monitoring Officer, Flintshire County Council, advising that the Standards Committee are reviewing training needs for all Town/Community Councillors and their Clerks. The Committee wishes to establish the number of Councillors who have received training and how recently it was received. Also received was a copy of some slides that were used to deliver training to Town/Community Councillors following the last elections.

It was pointed out that Community Councillors will now be expected to receive training when available and it is likely that their progress will be monitored.

<u>PLANNING AID WALES - FREE PLANNING TRAINING</u>

Notification had been received from Gayle Wootton, Chair, Planning Aid Wales of free Planning Training to take place at the Beaufort Park Hotel on Monday 19th March 2018, 5.30pm till 8.45pm. From the Independent Remuneration Panel, correspondence regarding Regional Events being held across Wales to discuss the Panel's current remuneration framework in respect of Town/ Community Councils. The North Wales event will be held on 9th May 2018, 10.30am to 12.30pm at the Conwy Business Centre, Llandudno. This was accepted.

PLANNING AID WALES - PRE-APPLICATION COMMUNITY CONSULTATION: GOING BEYOND THE REQUIREMENTS

Planning Aid Wales are holding an event on 21st March 2018, 11.45am till 4pm at the Catrin Finch Building, Wrexham Glyndwr University. Welsh Government has introduced minimum requirements for pre-application Community consultation for all significant planning applications. Good developments are those that work well with their local areas, which means working with local Communities. However, some convincing is still required from each perspective to develop a positive and beneficial process. For Communities, faced with limited resources, meaningful consultation should involve early discussions with developers about 'options' rather than draft planning applications and a clear understanding about how comments are taken forward in shaping outcomes. This event will explain the requirements for pre-application consultation and other useful guidance for Communities. The cost per Councillor is £20. Councillor J.E. Saul is to attend.

WELSH AUDIT OFFICE - SURVEY OF TOWN AND COMMUNITY COUNCILS

E-mail correspondence from Nick Selwyn, Welsh Audit Office, advising that the Community Council is expected to take part in a national survey. This survey is to hear the perspective of Town/Community Councils in order to gain an understanding of the issues in Communities across Wales. They are particularly interested in the Community Council's relations and dealings with the local authority; services or amenities delivered by our Community Council and any assets that have been transferred from local authorities to Town/Community Councils.

Members had been circulated with a copy of the survey. It was agreed by all Councillors that the Clerk should undertake the survey on this Council's behalf.

COUNTY COUNCIL MATTERS

- a) New Council Houses on old garage site to rear of Heol-y-Goron five of these houses had now been let. There is a new system at Flintshire County Council called a Local Lettings Policy. Officers picked Leeswood residents from the Housing list to occupy these new houses.
- b) <u>Street Lights out</u> observation was made that street lights were still out. Councillor R. Hughes confirmed that this is no longer just a County Council issue as there is a problem underground which has to be dealt with by Scottish Power. This can take between 28 and 35 days to resolve.
- c) <u>County road improvements</u> Councillor R. Hughes reported that £1.4million had been made available for road improvements in the County.
- d) <u>Drainage issues in the Community</u> it was noted that there are issues in Pontblyddyn near the Vicarage and in Leeswood on Stryt Cae Rhedyn and by the Prince of Wales Public House. These are being dealt with.

MATTERS OF AN IMPORTANT NATURE

- a) <u>Dual Carriageway Pontblyddyn to Hope</u> query was raised as to why this was still named as a dual carriageway because it is a single lane from Pontblyddyn to Hope. It was pointed out that the road is deemed to be a dual carriageway as there is an island in between separating the roads
- b) Public Footpath to the rear of 26 to 42 Heol-y-Goron, Leeswood comment was made that although the footpath was now open, it had narrowed considerably due to the new development on the old Garage site at Heol-y-Goron. It was pointed out that the footpath would not be the same as before, but it was hoped that remedial work would be carried out to widen it a little.
