



CELEBRATING 150 YEARS IN LEESWOOD

CYMUNED EGLWYSIG Bethania CHURCH COMMUNITY

Bethania Church Community, County Road, Leeswood, Flintshire CH7 4RF www.bethanialeeswood.org

In 2018 Bethania Chapel celebrates 150 years in Leeswood, but its earliest origins go back to the 1850s. The work of itinerant Baptist preachers travelling throughout Wales and preaching the gospel resulted in many powerful and life changing experiences. Hardened men like the miners from Leeswood and Treuddyn, found their lives changed by the power and the good news of Jesus during the many Welsh revivals. It was transformed people like these that wanted to take the good news that they had heard into the surrounding villages.

By 1861 a small Baptist fellowship had been established in Treuddyn and Berea Chapel, which still stands, but is now a private home, was built at the

Ffordd-y-Llan turning for Treuddyn. At this time, Leeswood was a small, Welsh speaking, mining community. A few people from Leeswood who were members at Berea began to hold house meetings in the village. In 1868 the Leeswood Baptists were able to buy a piece of land for $\pounds 44-10-0d$, and Bethania opened as a Welsh Baptist Chapel in 1870.

Precisely why a group of Welsh miners dug into their own pockets to do such an ambitious thing 150 years ago can only be speculated upon. Evidently their encounter with the Jesus they had read about in the Gospels and heard about from preachers, had been a significant and life changing experience for them.

Bethania Church Community is still a place where lives are changed by the same message of good







Technical Corner

Joseph Caruana

I have recently come across an old piece of machinery, and I was pleased to see that it was still in good working order. What I was really pleased about was that the machine in question was totally made in this country. This goes to show that when things were made in this country they were made to last. In those days people use to put their inspirations into practice and they were probably motivated by identifying a need which did lead them to produce an industrial solution to meet that need. What probably gave that generation a competitive edge, was that they had a more practical hand-on approach, and therefore understood the behaviour of the machines they developed. With this in mind, they applied the necessary precaution for the smooth running of the machine, which they designed to last forever. By making these machines to last so long, they carved a place in history, which will forever belong to them.

By having such a strong industrial past, it is possible that we can analyse the ways and systems which they applied in the development of their machines, and further develop the results from the analysis to achieve even greater results. However, to do this one needs to have an incentive, and the incentive is normally in the form of a reward in terms of financial well being. There are allot of individuals, who possess the talent to develop industrial projects to a level which would compete with excellence on the word market. If there are these individuals, with these abilities at their disposal, why are we not seeing more industrial developments? Could it be because they do not have the initial financial resources to start the ball rolling? Could it be because they do not have the expertise to market the final product, or could it be a combination of both? Whichever it is, it could be said that someone needs to address the situation and tap into these human resources to create wealth and prosperity within the industrial sector.

In many cases, inventors are not properly appreciated. A fine example of this is when the Wright brothers come up with the idea of making an aeroplane. The powers that be of that time, could not understand that a machine which was heavier then air could fly. The Wright brothers did their best to persuade investor to invest in the invention, but for some reason no one shown an interest. Unfortunately the Wright brothers pursued their invention else were. Nevertheless, the Wright brothers were from this country and they were inspired when they were in this country, therefore the invention was a British invention.

There could be another issue which could cause a problem with inventors. As an invention could be rather complex, an inventor could find it difficult to explain the invention to other people, because although an idea could look easy as a vision, it may prove difficult to either explain it verbally or put it on paper. It would therefore be a good idea to develop means to aid people with new ideas to be able to convey their intellectuality in a manner that could be easily understood and translated into industrial terms. With this in mind, one could open a number of opportunities which could be developed in a profitable industrial success.

It might be right to say, that we have a great opportunity to shape the future, and it is up to us to further develop of industrial heritage which has been left to us by our predecessors. It is good to feel proud that we carried on building on what we inherited, rather than relying on cheap imports made on the other side of the world.

Some inventions are taken for granted, and some of our great inventors have sadly been forgotten, nevertheless, forgotten or not, this country has produced its share of inventors. One such inventor was Sir Joseph Whitworth, who invented the Whitworth tread.

Joseph Whitworth was born on the 21st December 1803 in Stockport Cheshire. Although being the son of a headmaster, Whitworth did not distinguish himself as a young man, and he only received elementary education. Upon leaving school he served a four year apprenticeship with one of his uncles who were a cotton spinner in Derbyshire. On completion of his apprenticeship, he worked for four years as a mechanic in a factory in Manchester, from where he moved to work for Henry Maudsley at his factory in Westminster Bridge in London.

In 1841, Whitworth recommended the introduction of standard system of threads which would feature a fixed angle and a standard pitch for a given diameter. After his work was exhibited at the Great Exhibition of 1851 the Whitworth screw-thread system earned him critical acclaim both at home and abroad. Sir Joseph Whitworth strongly believed in educating young people in engineering disciplines and offered several engineering scholarships. He also wrote to the priminister of that time, and expressed his views about the importance of making students aware of how to use engineering tools to combine their theoretical knowledge with hands on practical approach.



The above diagram shows the characteristics of the Whitworth tread as developed by Sir Joseph Whitworth. The Whitworth tread was also known as British Standard Whitworth or BSW for short, and due to its' popularity with British manufacturers it was used on a large number of machinery which was exported to the four corners of the globe, thus making its' mark as a world leader of its' time.

Times might have changed, but the desire to develop new ideas is still the same. With this in mind, it might be recommended that we need to encourage young intellectual thinking to produce original solutions to identified markets.



This enterprise is aimed at all ages of the Community and it was hoped that it might target the mothers going home after taking their children to School or people going to the Doctor's Surgery.

New blinds had been fitted in the Community Centre Committee Room, these were a donation. <u>COMMUNITY TRANSPORT</u>

Flintshire County Council had been running three-hour workshops regarding subsidised Bus Services. At present the Mold to Wrexham/ Wrexham to Mold service that runs through Leeswood is a commercial bus service that is operated by Arriva. Councillor R Hughes reported that the double yellow lines would not be put on just the corners but had to be a certain distance on either side of the affected area. They also had to be put directly across the road from the affected areas for a certain distance. Flintshire County Council is now preparing the scheme and will be in contact once this has been done.

CADWYN CLWYD - IBEACON PROJECT

ONE VOICE WALES, THE VOICE OF COMMUNITY AND TOWN COUNCILS IN WALES - RESPONSE TO THE REVIEW OF COMMUNITY AND TOWN COUNCIL SECTOR IN WALES

In regard to the Review of the Community and Town Council Sector in Wales, the formal response made by One Voice Wales to the consultation invitation by the Independent Review Panel had been circulated to all members. This was accepted.

AGE CYMRU - REPORT ON SHOWCASING DIFFERENT APPROACHES TO TACKLING LONELINESS ACROSS WALES

Members had been circulated with a copy of the Age Cymru report which has been collated based on responses received from Stakeholders who have provided an update on their work to tackle loneliness. This report was accepted.

FLINTSHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL - CONSULTATION ON THE BUS NETWORK REVIEW 2018

Correspondence had been received from Ruth Cartwright, Programme Manager, Streetscene and Transportation, Flintshire County Council subsidises 24 bus routes through either standalone contracts or agreements with commercial operators to provide services that are not commercially viable, such as early morning, evening, via certain villages etc. While some Local Authorities have stopped subsidising bus travel altogether, Flintshire has not taken that approach. However, there is a need to ensure an effective and integrated bus network into the future, and services must be sustainable, affordable and meet the changing and prioritised needs of our residents.

A full review of the current bus network is being undertaken to establish current and future demands on the network and create a sustainable, equitable and stable transport system which fits the needs of local communities and the wider employment and social sector demand. Four proposed options are given to analyse what best suits the needs of our community: a) Stop subsidising bus services altogether b) Continue to support the services currently subsidised c)

Support services on the core bus network and implement Local Travel arrangements for the non-core network

d) Support services on the core bus network and implement a demand responsive 'ring and ride' service

FOOTPATHS IN **BLACK MEADOWS** LEESWOOD & AND THE OLD DISTRICT RAILWAY LINE New Series No.6

1.

Leave Leeswood Community Centre, turning R. on King Street and R. again after

the old School House to follow the broad path, with Phoenix Park on your right. Continue over the cattle grid, where the track narrows, and downhill to Black Meadows.

You will find a gate across the track, which may be marked "PRIVATE", but there is a public right of way 2. here, so continue as if towards the house. Signs of wildlife and fishing on the Pool to your left.

Keep a sharp lookout for an overgrown footpath going off to the R. before the 3.

entrance to the house, which will which take you over a footbridge and stile into more open country. Although the path may not be clear, you aim to walk for a short distance until you can gain access onto the old railway line, over to you left. Here you turn R.

4. This pleasant walk continues for some distance in a W. or NW direction, with the

old railway line forming a level surface, now overgrown, so keep a wary eye on low-flying brambles and fallen trees [this must have been a branch line] Eventually you come to the end of this wooded stretch and reach a gate which crosses the path and needs to be climbed. The reason for this would seem to be that the old railway line is not the official footpath, although it has come to be adopted as such. There is a sterner obstacle ahead!

5. Once over the gate you can continue for a short distance, but it soon becomes

obvious you have to cross the "swamp" over to your left to reach higher ground. This marshy area can be wet, or very wet, depending on recent rainfall, but pick your way through to reach the field edge, where you can turn R. onto the "proper" footpath and eventually reach a field gate which, at the present time [Summer 2018] is impossible to open, and has to be climbed. You will be surprised to discover a walkers' sign on a post the other side, confirming this as the official route. But there should have a proper stile here.

6. Now on the other side you will see you have reached a road, where you turn R. and go steeply uphill to Celyn Cottages on your L. Just opposite the entrance way here, you will see a walkers' signpost and stile, to the R. Cross the stile into the field. Orientation is slightly awkward from this point. Aim for the highest point in the field, in fact crossing the field on the diagonal, to find an exit point into a muddy lane, where you turn R.

Shortly you will come to a stile, in the corner, L., where you can cross into a field. Keep the hedge on your 7. L. to find another stile into the adjacent field. In this field again keep close to the field edge on your L., climbing gently upwards. Good views here. This brings you to a well-maintained stile in a corner, bristling with holly,

Once over the stile follow the field edge to you L. making for Leeswood Green Farm ahead. The stile you 8. need is in the corner, and this will take you round through a coppice to a kissing gate and a lane. Turn L. Follow the lane down to Stryt Cae Rhedyn, and at the main road turn R. and make your way back to Leeswood Community Centre.

Should have read:

Walk through the Car Park to reach the main road and turn left along it, but only **for a short distance**, **as you need to turn right along Mountain Road.** Look out for a walkers' sign on a post off to your right, taking you back into fields. You are aiming for a far corner of this field, which is at first hidden from view. As a start, make for the highest point ahead and survey your way ahead, if it's not too misty. The way out of this sloping field is in a corner marked by an ancient wall coming down from the left, and a bridle way running parallel to Mountain Road. Descend to this junction and turn left along the bridle way through a gate.

MEMORIES OF AN OILFIELD MAN

We had been living in Cyprus for a couple of months now the boys were settled in Foleys English grammar school making new friends of different nationalities, those friendships have lasted many years and they are still in close contact with each other. Carol was also making new friends associated with Foleys school, but I was not home long enough, there were a couple of work associates that had moved to Cyprus but they worked on different rigs to me so it worked out that our field breaks only came together every couple of months, Jimmy King/Pat/ Lynne the eldest/ Barbie/ and Thumper the youngest, we never knew him by any other name in all the years that we knew them but they came to stay with us a few times to give them a break from Egypt and a taste of normality for a week or two. I remember them staying with us during one Cypriot winter, there had been a very heavy snow fall on Mount Olympus in the Troodos mountains. The king family had never ever experienced snow before, we found that hard to believe but it was true, I thought it would be fun for all of us to go skiing I was the only one with any experience. We had a great time having snow ball fights and more often on their backsides than upright, I had warned them about snow burn but they ignored my advice and ended up looking like lobsters, Dennis had a friend who's father John Bierman worked for Reuters (news media) and Carol passed on information regarding our Israel incident, and when during a contract in the Persian Gulf I was staying in the Commadore Hotel in Tehran during a revolution when the Shah Mohammed Pahlavi was deposed and the exiled Ayatolla Khomeini returned from France where he had been in exile but I will save that for a later issue. Carol also gave him the update on that also, it seemed that where ever I worked political turmoil was not far away (I loved every minute of it) one week of excitement is worth one year of boredom,

Anyway, back to my memories. The rig was running as smooth as could be expected considering the antiquated age of it, I suggested to Luke that the Helideck required painting "that's your call, you order the paint and carry on as long as it does not interfere with the running of the rig but do not forget to order extra for trading" he added, I should mention what he meant by trading - I had an arrangement with the supply boat skipper, I would trade marine paint for crates of beer or a couple of bottles of Jack Daniels (wish it were rum though). Other times I would loan out the welders, no cash ever changed hands, that was the good old trading system and it worked well, and I must add we only had a drink after we had finished our twelve/fourteen hour shift, with the exception of my American mate Willie Johnson he would be working the brake on the rig floor with half bottle of Jack Daniels in the back pocket of his striped American railway bib and brace coveralls wearing no shirt no and no socks, he never appeared under the influence although he would never pass an alcohol test,(how times change).

Back to the painting of the helideck, it took me a full shift to stencil the name of our rig "Zarah Rig 22" then a circle with a large letter H in the centre of it, the following morning I gave my crew instructions of what needed doing gave them everything they needed for the job, then I was called onto the rig floor so I left them to it, after six hours I returned to check on the paint job only to find that there was dozens of footprints coming from the centre of the H and walking across the wet paint they had only started at the outer perimeter painted themselves in, we had to wait for the paint to dry before painting over their footprints. P.S: The letter H does not mean helicopter, it means Hazardous area

I remember when the Egyptian Government introduced a type of tax on cigarettes and other luxuries etc, there were riots on the streets (mostly students). The main incident that I will never forget happened after we had just came off the rig and in a taxicab heading for the office travelling along the Corniche, this was the road alongside the river Nile, just as we approached the tunnel taking us under the Nile we were stopped by the Militia in their olive green uniforms (these are very different to the local police or army)and nobody messes with them. They had stopped all of the traffic and let the protesters march into the tunnel while another group of militia were waiting at the opposite end with automatic guns they then opened fire on the leading protesters killing about a dozen, three army trucks went into the tunnel and retrieved the bodies, and we were told to proceed on our way as though nothing had happened. I never heard of any more protests after that. As I stated previously life is cheap out there still is it doesn't matter what we think of our own country, we are still a hundred times better off than in some of the places I have worked and lived. But they all build up my memories that do not mean much to anybody but me, so I will keep adding these for the Leeswood readers..... (to be truthful it's for me !)



Well, here we are Campers, July already. Can you actually believe it? We are now just days away from the big day itself and there is still so much to do!

The Committee will be making sure all their T's are crossed and those I's dotted so that everything goes according to plan, not to mention the time and effort going into the hard labour that is involved in the run up to and on the day itself, but we will come to that in a minute (cough cough - **volunteers required** - cough cough). First of all though, for the public to note, there are four posters in this edition for you to refer to and they are for the wristband sale outlets, decorating your house, the all important road closure details and of course for Carnival day itself. Just as a backup though, we will run through those details with you now.

We can tell you that the wristbands (in order for you to enter onto the Carnival field) are for sale at Leeswood Playgroup and the Co-op and also the Petrol Garage and The Bridge Inn in Pontblyddyn, and we are very grateful to them for kindly selling these on our behalf. Wristbands are £2 for an adult and for children of high-school age but children of primary age will gain entry for free. The wristbands will also be available to purchase on the gates/field on the day so it is pretty easy for everyone all round. We will not be commencing the parade from the old Laura Ashley Factory, as we have done the last three years, but this time from Ysgol Derwenfa. The decision however was for good reason and was not taken lightly, as are all our decisions. Nevertheless, the main road will be closed from 11.30am with the request that all vehicles be removed from the main road by that time and then the road will be back open at 1pm.

Please however pass this information on to anyone you know just in case they do not get to see the advert and they wonder why the 11.50am Arriva bus has not turned up to go to Wrexham or the 12.15pm to Mold! If you do have any queries concerning the road closure then please do not hesitate to contact Councillor Raymond Hughes as directed on the relevant poster which will be distributed in the usual way, i.e. notice boards, house-to-house leaflet drop, here in this edition... Lastly, in respect of the posters, the Carnival Day poster details times of the parade (i.e. 12 noon) and what attractions you can expect to see on the day. As it is, our RAF application is still pending and we have everything crossed for that Spitfire Flypast.

Please, please, please spread the word that there is a "NO DOGS ON THE FIELD" policy as each year we find that people are bringing their pet pooches along and then have to be refused entry, which is a real shame for them. This policy is in place for good reason and, although we appreciate that most dog owners are responsible, there are some that are sadly not and we do not wish to see the public being forced to leave because someone has let their dog poop on the field and they are too lazy to pick it up. Like we say, it is a minority who behave in that manner but it does happen and that is why we make this decision. Plus, we do not want the younger children being scared off as they sometimes are with dogs. Just to finish off, there is still time to register as a volunteer as "coughed" about at the beginning of the write-up. At the time of going to the Editor for publishing, we have not been able to provide you with a date for the yearly volunteers' meeting but we do hope you keep an eye out for those details so you get the chance to attend. It is usually around a week before the big day we have the volunteers' meeting and we will of course need more on board to assist with the heavy manual labour in the run up too and on the day and for things like marshalling on the roads or field etc so please get your names forward either by our social media's Facebook page or grab anyone of us to give us your names. Don't hurt us though when you're grabbing us as we need all the working arms and legs we can get!!
