MEMORIES OF AN OILFIELD MAN—"Boys and their toys"...

I had a couple of months left on the Zarah (rig 22) in Egypt before my contract ended,

when I reminisce back to that first day when I disembarked from that ww2 old D C 3 aeroplane and onto that strip of sand in the desert, and such a drastic culture shock along with the blood sweat and sometimes tears, I never thought would I be so sad to see the end of my contract, and all the characters and oddballs(myself included) of different nationalities.


During my contract we successfully brought in twenty-two gas and oil wells, but I still had a couple of months to go yet before I collected my end of contract bonus, not many of my co-workers completed their contract for various reasons, so I guess I must have done something right.

My field breaks in Egypt were not without the various incidents that I have previously mentioned, but in Cyprus I was involved a fair number of events of a different nature. There was the high jacking of a plane on the air strip and the pilot was a friend of ours, his son was staying with us at time of the high jack, but more of that one in a later issue.

During our stay in Cyprus we had a friend that was a Barge engineer on a rig, he also owned a beautiful very large and fast boat; mostly it was used for pleasure but other times it was used for profit, he always claimed it was for humanitarian reasons, this was during the war in Beirut, when wealthy people were trying to reach Cyprus in any way that they could.

I have mentioned my work colleague Jimmy Danes, the guy from Birmingham, there were three people involved in bringing refugees across at the time they were charging fifty pounds per head, (to cover expenses) I must mention that I was not involved. They would take the boat across in the dark early hours of the morning where the people were waiting and sail them across to a cove on Ladies mile, at the time this was a very secluded little beach, not like it is today full of tourists, were they went from there we did not know. I suppose they had relatives who met them, this is me at the wheel of the boat. This operation came to an end when Jimmy in his wisdom decided to make the crossing on his own while under the influence, he grounded the boat a couple of hundred yards away from the normal pick up spot and the local patrol coast guard came out and arrested Jimmy who was not hurt when he run the boat aground, but suffered a few bruises while in custody, was very lucky that he had no passengers on board or he would still be in jail today he told them that he had a few drinks and decided to

take the boat for a sail when the accident happened, Jimmy was released but the boat was confiscated probably by one of the policemen for personnel use, I will continue with this story in the next issue,



Technical Corner

Joseph Caruana

When one analyses the attitude of people across the industrial spectrum, one might notice that there is a comprehensive range of both positive and negative attitudes. Positive attitudes normally leads to further progression, growth, and wealth creation, while negative attitudes normally leads to stagnation with the possibility of financial losses.

Progressive attitudes should be rewarded, and people with progressive attitudes should be encouraged to come forward express their ideas of how industrial ventures can be improved and made more successful. If people in industry feel that they are suppressed every time they come up with a new idea they are suppressed, they are most likely to lose interest, and stop expressing their positive views. This goes against the fundamental principle of democracy, and could lead to a regressive situation. If people feel that they are pushed into a corner from where they cannot be of any use to the order of the day, they might abandon any progressive ideas they might have, which would lead to a regressive chain of events.

An industrial establishment normally consist of three main bodies, the upper body, the middle body, and the base or the roots of the organisation. Now if we compare an industrial organisation with a tree, one could draw a comparison as follows: the upper section of an industrial organisation could be compared with the leaves which absorb oxygen from the air, the middle section could be compared with the trunk which connects the upper section to the roots, and the lower section could be compared to the roots which absorb the nutrition from the ground. If one deprives one section from what the other can produce, the whole three will fail to flourish. In direct comparison, the oxygen that the foliage supplies the roots with, can be compared with the wages paid to the workers, and the nutrition picked by the roots can be compared to the manual effort of the employees. The fruit the three produces is a direct comparison with the profits made.

The day to day running of an organisation incurs costs which could spiral out of control and eat away into the profits. It is therefore imperative to keep costs under control with a positive balance in favour of profits. Nevertheless, some people might become over-zealous and get carried away with excessive cost cutting. This might hinder further

development, and could trigger a regressive chain of events. It might be unwise to adopt an attitude that the only way to success is through cost cutting. Other aspects of an organisation does play a part in achieving success. One such aspect could be the ability to convert the cost input into a profitable output through an efficient process.

From time to time, I do quote Sir Isaac Newton on his saying that for every action there is an equal and opposite action. To this end, one does need to be careful not to cut back beyond the point of irreversible damage. There are different ways which we can adopt to achieve industrial success, and although cost cutting is one of them, it is not the only one. There are different actions that one could take, which could result in a successful outcome. One of these actions could be the implementation of a sustained development program, based on effective research and carful analyses of what the market pull is going to be in the future.

Changing direction half way through a development project could be very negative and counterproductive. The time it takes from the original idea to final product on the market is crucial, because market trends could change rapidly. As an example, if it takes car manufacturer seven years to execute a development project from idea to the actual car in the showroom, while another manufacturer takes only three years, the one which is capable to develop a product in the shortest time will have the competitive. Another factor which plays an important part in the success and failure of a product is the attitude with which a project is approached. If a company adopts an attitude where it produces products that just scrape past the minimum quality expectation, while another company produces goods with a higher level of quality at an equal price, the one that produces the higher quality, is more likely to sell more. Also, due to the higher quality the products will perform better and last longer, thus enhancing the company's reputation and security.

To this end, it is right to say that it is the responsibility of each and every one of us, to do what we can to improve industrial development. Then we can move forward within a positive framework, develop products which will meet what expected of them and beyond. These are the ingredients which will create a platform to further develop our industrial capabilities.

BLACK MEADOWS AND ON VIA THE OLD RAILWAY LINE TO PONTYBODKIN

- 1. Leave the Community Centre from the rear of the Car Park, up the steps into the park. Keep the play area on your left until you reach a path and then go in left through the yellow gate. Make for the houses ahead and leave through a second yellow gate before turning right.
- 2. Now follow the broad track taking you to Black Meadows, finally steeply downhill to reach the fishing pool on your left and a gate across the track. Although there are indications that this is private property, the public right of way continues almost to the edge of the house.
- 3. Just before you reach the entrance, turn sharp right along a narrow footpath, with a fence on your right and a brook on your left to reach a metal footbridge leading to a waymarked stile. Cross over the stile into an overgrown field, thick with nettles, brambles and rose bay willow herb [in season]. You now have 50 yards or so of difficult terrain. There could be the semblance of a path through this jungle, which continues for a short distance parallel to the wooded area on your left. Suddenly this "path" decides to take a sharp left turn in amongst the trees, where you reach the old railway line. Turn left.
- 4. You are now on a well-defined path, which winds its way along the course of the old railway line that once ran from Mold to Coed Talon. Look out for low-lying roots and low-flying branches. Your path follows a twisting route, past the house seen dimly on the left and a brook to the right. Where the path appears to divide, at a kind of pedestrian T-junction, take the route to the right. You pick up the stream now on your left and pass an old, somewhat redundant stile before entering a clearing. A brand-new stile on the right would take you away from Pontybodkin, so continue along the broad track en route to habitation. As you approach houses, note the [possibly temporary] electric fence on your left, before the path takes a well-used route between houses to a road, where you turn sharp left.
- 5. Follow the road now, over the secluded bridge crossing the Nant, and reach the main road at the bottom of Pontybodkin Hill which would take you back up to Leeswood. However, to continue the walk, bear left, by the Brooklands Cottage sign and go up towards the wide yellow gate across the roadway. There are many signs indicating that this is a PRIVATE land, but there is a public right of way through here, so by-pass the yellow gate and venture right along a concrete path and upwards into woodland.
- 6. Uphill now, you cross the old railway line once more before entering woodland along a broad, well-defined track [with tyre marks suggesting this would be good biking territory] Various paths cross and re-cross this broad track, but stay with it, past a redundant metal stile with a waymark, continuing steadily upwards. The path divides, and you could go off to the right, but instead continue on the broad path upwards.

7. The path now comes out of woodland into a field and divides. Take the left-hand fork, making for a point to the left of the electricity pole ahead. You will now come out onto the track you used earlier to go down to Black Meadows.


