Joining with millions remembering 100 years since the end of World War I

As well as marking 150 years in the village, this year Bethania joins many others in the UK in marking the centenary of the end of World War 1. On

Remembrance Sunday, 11 November 2018, people around the Commonwealth will be reflecting on the lives that were changed irrevocably, and those that were lost. Here at Bethania we will be holding a service of thought, prayer and reflection at 10:15 and then joining others from the village at the Cenotaph at 12 noon.

Some 65 million men were mobilised across Europe during World War 1. Nearly a third of them – some 21 million – were wounded. Another 8.5 million were killed and some 7.7 million were taken prisoners of war. All of them had family and friends whose lives were changed forever by the events of 1914 –1918.

Bethania itself has a memorial, written in Welsh, to Robert Humphreys, who is remembered as one its *faithful members... who died serving his country in the Great War, August 27, 1918, aged 28 years.*' This year gives us the chance to remember, but also to pray and work for peace, looking forward with hope.

Often we use set words at remembrance events as we think about those who have given their lives in war. There is the Kohima Epitaph: 'When you go home tell them of us and say, for your tomorrow we gave our today.' There is the Ode of Remembrance: 'They shall not grow old as we that are left grow old; age shall not weary them nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning we will remember them.'

There is also this Prayer of Remembrance: Almighty and eternal God, from whose love in Christ we cannot be parted, either by death or life: hear our prayers and thanksgivings for all who we remember this day

fulfil in them the purpose of your love; and bring us all with them, to your eternal joy; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

This year let us use the two minutes silence at 11am on 11.11.18 to look back with gratitude for the sacrifice made by so many in war, to reflect on our own lives and to look forward with hope.

REMEMBRANCE

The Students Union in Cambridge have caused quite a kafuffle this year as they discussed a motion about Remembrance Sunday, originally the motion was meant to ensure that Remembrance Sunday would be more widely accepted but instead it ended with several students speaking about it being a glorification of war. Those of us who gather in Church and at the Cenotaph each year would, obviously, disagree with that.

For me, Remembrance Sunday is a time when I remember the thousands of young men and women who left their homes to fight for our freedom. Many of them went out of duty, rather than desire, and many of them knew the kind of fear that most of us will never know. There was nothing glorious about it!

My father was in the RAF, my mother nursed in a hospital which catered for German prisoners of war, my uncles served in the army in Burma. Several of my husbands' family were among the first soldiers to enter the concentration camps. None of these people spoke of their experiences very often afterwards but without men, and women like these we would not have the freedom we have today. At a time when all kinds of hate crime is rising again, the right kind of "**Remembrance**" is more important than ever. For if we forget the cost of Peace and Freedom we will find that we have to pay it all over again.

Technical Corner

Joseph Caruana

A manufactured item starts its life as a conceptual idea in someone's brain. Then it is communicated to those concerned by way of engineering drawings, verbal explanation, text and script. At this stage, all information communicated between those concerned is probably done on confidential terms until intellectual property protection is established. Intellectual property protection comes in different forms. Intellectual property could be protected by a patent, a copyright, a registered design or a trade mark. Protection by a patent or a registered design only lasts for a limited period of time, while a copyright lasts forever. Patents are normally applies to inventions of machinery that have moving item, electric generation, composition of materials, chemical mixtures and so on. A registered design offers protection to prevent anybody from copying the appearance of an object, while a copyright applies to books, logos etc.

When intellectual protection is established, an invention can be discussed without the need of confidentiality, a prototype can be made and tests can be conducted openly. If the invention is not the property of a manufacturer, the inventor can initiate discussions with prospective manufacturers, knowing that his or her invention cannot be copied. When all this is established, and a market research proves that there is a market for the product in question, followed by a decision to manufacture the invention commercially, a progressive plan is normally put into action. The plan will consist of a financial budget, raw materials allocation, production processes, marketing strategy, after sales support, and product recycling at the end of its life. This is a complete cycle and should include all aspects of the life of a manufactured product.

With this in mind, it is clear that a product normally starts as an idea in the head of an inventor. We all know that this country has produced great inventors, who developed great ideas by which they created enormous wealth both in this country and overseas. By creating a situation where one can have joint ventures overseas, will give this country more influence on decision making on a global level. With this in mind, one should feel positive that the future can be shaped by those who develop new ideas, and that the level of global influence depends upon the strength of what we manufacture in this country and sell abroad. These conditions have encouraged great inventers and industrialist to develop new ideas together, as they realised that developments does not happen by being an introvert, but to the contrary, ideas are turned into wealth by visionaries who can coordinate all elements for a collective success.

It is important to keep in mind that the concept of a successful project starts with the inventor, then the industrialist, and finally marketing. Every step of the way is important, and one cannot be successful without the other, that is why all those concerned need to apply a positive collective effort with mutual success as their main objective.

Anything can inspire an inventor, and some cases the slightest of inspiration can lead to an invention. In that case, if an inventor is inspired, and the inspiration is turned an invention it is advisable to protect the invention by a patent which will transform it into intellectual property. If one becomes the owner of an intellectual property, then it is up to that individual to decide what happens with the invention in guestion, and how it is put into practical use. At this stage an inventor may decide use the invention both as a humanitarian development and a commercial development. For example, if one develops a particular devise which has a use in the developed world where people can afford to pay for it, and a use in an under developed country where people may not be able pay for it. Then if the intellectual property holder decides to weaver the royalties when an item is sold in an underdeveloped country, while retaining royalties when sold in the developed world, the actual development becomes both humanitarian and commercial at the same time.

We talk about industrial revolutions as if they are a thing of the past, however, industrial revolutions are happening all over the developing countries and we can help utilise commercial developments to be applied as humanitarian assistance. On the long run, such humanitarian action can have a positive effect on our economy, because it could create a bond between the two countries and when the developing countries become economically stronger and they are in a position to purchase industrial machinery they might consider buying products from countries that helped them when they were in need.

It is therefore imperative to combine commercial development with humanitarian projects in order to establish a friendly atmosphere, which could create wealth for all concerned. One could also say that by conducting business in this manner, one could feel honourable that humanitarian issues have been made to be part of daily industrial achievements.

MEMORIES OF AN OILFIELD MAN

Field break on a Ranch...

What was it like working on a horse and cattle ranch with real cowboys? The Triple Fish ranch was not the wide-open range type of ranch, that most people associate with the tv series Dallas; for those readers who remember it. I knew it would be a hard way of life, but nothing prepared me spending hours riding on a western saddle, in the middle of the Everglades with the acres of grazing fields in the middle of the swamps, home to many, many Alligators, Wild pigs, and huge clouds of Mosquitoes and believe it or not also huge Python snakes. These had either escaped or released years ago by private owners and the habitat proved to be ideal breeding grounds for them and not welcome by the Seminole government, this was nearly forty years ago. They may be under control now I don't know, (I must remember to ask Jimmy King).

I will begin with our arrival at the ranch, Jimmy was still in bed when we arrived in Immokalee. It was still early in the morning and their two kids Lynne and Barbie were getting ready for school. I thought I would wake him with a cold glass of water (over his head) it took him a couple of hours to see the funny side of it, we had an odd sense of humour in the oil field. "Morning Jim, surprise surprise we are here" I said, even though Carol and I were absolutely dead tired, I will not repeat word for word, but we decided that we would chill out while Pat took the kids to school that was a few miles away, normally they would get the school bus but Pat thought it would be good for me and Jimmy to have an hour or two catching up, with a couple of early morning beers (old habits die hard), and it tasted a lot better than a Jack Daniels that early in the morning.

That sounds like a good idea, I think I will have a glass of Morgans spiced rum while I continue writing this article, anyway catch up time, and rest period was over: - Jimmy decided to take us on a meet and greet the neighbours, most of these were blood relatives, kissing cousins/ aunts /uncles. But that introduction was easier than our introduction at the local Rodeo that we attended a couple of weeks later.

The neighbour that we were first introduced to were Pat's, Mum and Dad, he was the President of Florida banking association they owned the Ranch adjoining Jim's place. To reach there we had to cross a small bridge, that had these trees either side and were covered with this grandfather moss, hanging down and often a home for various types of snakes. We were warned to take care when crossing this bridge then we walked a couple of hundred yards before we came to Bill's (Pat's Dad) swimming pool, and what a great couple they were, after the introductions were over the menfolk (us) retired to Bills man cave (we all have to have one don't we) only some are bigger than others. His happened to be a separate log cabin, with a huge solid rock stone fire place on the facing wall, fitted out with a full size pool table, full size bar and various guns on the wall all very collectable such as Winchester rifles, colt 45s, also guns that he had brought back home with him from his time in the army. He happened to be in the landing force on Omaha beach landing, ww2. In another glass case his many medals were on display, this was a man who held my respect and he did not want to talk about this period in his life until I told him that my dad was on the Dunkirk landings and he also would never talk about it. This seemed to open a door with him he asked the others to leave and find something to do while we had a chat, he asked me to promise not to speak of this conversation to any of his family then he told me what he and others witnessed during this terrible period and I then understood why my dad never ever spoke of it. Strange as it sounds, Bill had a great bar and well stocked (but no Morgan's rum) he never drank alcohol but never objected to anyone else enjoying a drink or two, a true gentleman. Bill offered the use of the swimming pool as and when we wanted, but with all that wild life around; snakes /alligators, etc we would give it a miss, especially when they told us of incident that happened a couple of weeks previously. Before I explain, always after a hard day's work on the horses both the riders and horses needed cooling down so the rider, mainly Lynne and young Barbie, would strip the saddles from the horses and swim while riding bare back in a fairly large wild pool near the ranch.

There were huge lily type pads maybe three or four feet in diameter and very thick and strong, also there was a huge alligator living in in this pool and had a cave below the water, this gator was absolutely harmless they told us..."I'm not going in any way" I thought, " that's no problem now" Jimmy said, "why is that" I asked "because I shot it" was the reply. I asked him to explain, this is what he told me, "Old red that was name we gave that old gator, never once gave us any reason for concern even when we swam the horses with him swimming close behind us. But a couple of weeks ago when swimming the horses the dogs had been with us and were jumping from lily pad to lily pad, when they were both on the same lily pad, old red snapped them both in one single bite, the gator was trying to drag them both down to his cave while Lynne was hitting it with some kind of wooden stake: for a fifteen year old that took a lot of courage but she was more concerned for her dogs, a Labrador and a Spaniel. The lab managed to break free with some injuries that required vet treatment but sadly the spaniel was taken to the cave below water where it would stay for a week or two". Jimmy carried on with the story "we knew that we could not trust that gator again so I decided to shoot it (this was illegal at the time) anyway I waited near the edge of the pool I had a torch and my rifle it took me three nights but I did shoot it, and we have some alligator tail steaks in the freezer for a later barbie" I will carry on with this memory in the next issue, but here are a couple of photos of Lynne and myself near that pond and yes they are real revolvers we are wearing and are fully loaded.....





MINUTES

The minutes of the monthly meeting held on Tuesday 10th July 2018 had been circulated to all members. It was proposed by Councillor J. Caruana and seconded by Councillor R. Williams that these be accepted as a true record of proceedings. All Councillors in agreement.

POLICE LIAISON

PCSO 3684 Peter Jones was unable to attend. He had sent a report in his absence.

Crime Issues / Trends

Individuals using rented fishing equipment and making off without payment. Victim did not want to make a complaint, so the matter was not pursued. <u>Theft of a</u> large amount of wooden boards from a garden on

<u>Maes-y-Meillion, Leeswood</u>. House to house enquiries were completed with all lines of enquiry investigated. Unfortunately, no suspects had been identified.

<u>Criminal damage on Station Lane, Padeswood</u>. Gates were broken on a property. There was no CCTV or independent witnesses. All enquiries investigated with no suspect identified. <u>Shoplifting on Queen Street, Leeswood</u>. Enquiries are ongoing.

Approximately seven reports of hate related (racist incidents) or anti-social behaviour involving young children in the village and the same individuals. Very difficult for the Police to deal with as there is never any evidence. PCSO Jones is intending to host an event at the Community Centre for children and adults to attend. This is to promote the seriousness of hate related incidents along with the consequences of committing such an offence. PCSO Jones is hoping to get some funding for the event which if successful will take place on HATE CRIME AWARENESS WEEK, 13th to 30th October 2018. The Community Council agreed that they would offer to fund this event.

ASB Issues

<u>Off road bikes, Leeswood area</u>. Numerous reports of off-road bikes being used illegally in the Leeswood area. PCSO Jones has spoken to the riders and given them advice. Since then an individual involved has been arrested and their bike seized.

It was pointed out that this has had an impact on the Communities of Broughton and Penyffordd where large parcels of land have been given Planning Permission because the Local Development Plan has been out of date. <u>COMMUNITY HEALTH COUNCIL - NEWS RE-</u> <u>LEASE 'PATIENTS ASKED FOR 'ONE SIMPLE</u> THING' TO IMPROVE NHS COMMUNICATION IN

WALES' Members had been circulated with a copy of the Community Health Council News Release, 'Patients asked for 'One Simple Thing' to improve NHS Communication in Wales'. Patients in Wales are being asked for their views on the NHS, as part of a drive to develop better communication between healthcare professionals and those using the health service. The One Simple Thing campaign is being led by the Board of Community Health Councils on behalf of the seven Community Health Councils in Wales and is looking for patients from across Wales to give a simple suggestion for improving the way the NHS communicates. Concerns from people across Wales has prompted the campaign. Poor communication can increase the risk of potential harm from misunderstandings, lead to a lack of confidence on the part of patients and waste valuable NHS resources. Speaking about the issues surrounding communication in the NHS, Mark Thornton, Chair of the North Wales Community Health Council (NWCHC) said:

'Misunderstandings in patient and provider communications arise from many factors, but particularly from the use of jargon or complex medical terms, or when information is given at inappropriate times, for example when a patient is in pain, is tired or feeling unwell and unable to concentrate.' 'We also know that patients can find messages from health professionals providing their care to be ambiguous or unclear. Sensory issues or cultural, language and social issues can all also impact on communication in a health setting.'

The CHC survey is running throughout the summer. Suggestions will then be collated to form a

report to be sent to the Welsh Government as well as NHS Local Health Boards and Trusts in Wales, asking them for their response and looking for their plans to improve communication. Responses can be completed via: e-mail; SMS (text); Smartphone App; Social Media – Twitter, Facebook, Instagram; Postal Survey; Face to Face discussion and a dedicated Answerphone service. Observation was made that the Hospital is very poor in communicating with changes to appointments. Two letters can be received at the same time with different information. It was also pointed out that many older people are not in a position to complain as there is no-one to help them.

ONE VOICE WALES - NOTICE OF AGM ON SAT-URDAY 29TH SEPTEMBER 2018 AND MOTIONS FOR THE AGM

Information from One Voice Wales about their AGM to be held on Saturday 29th September 2018 at the Royal Welsh Showground, Llanelwedd, Builth Wales, also the motions for the AGM.

It was agreed by all Councillors that this Community Council's representative should attend the AGM if he wishes. The Community Council to cover the cost of attendance.

spondence had been received from Ian Bancroft, Chief Officer, Strategic Programmes, Flintshire County Council, advising that Flintshire County Council have allocated £105,000 from its 2018/2019 budget for improvement works to Children's Play Areas. It was by accident that we discovered our youth club would be celebrating its 50th anniversary this year. A plaque on our youth club wall remembers the tragic death of one of our members in 1975 and we have records going back 7 years before this...so to be completely honest it could be older, but we stuck our flag in where our paper trail stopped. We weren't looking for it, we were just giving the office a clean when one of our young people noticed, 'Wait, does this mean our youth club is fifty years old!?'

This is amazing for a number of reasons; Youth clubs in their traditional form are a dying entity and we all know that local services have taken a huge financial hit in the last 8 years. Many youth clubs around Flintshire have been closed, their face to face services diluted and resources reduced. To find one open and continually providing this service two nights per week for fifty years is something Leeswood village as a community should be very, very proud of. There are large towns in the shire that do not enjoy the same opportunities this provides for young people, and it is something that we should all hold dear...and celebrate!

A separate place other than the home where young people are free to express themselves, learn new skills, make friends, engage in positive relationships and further discover themselves through informal education has become, strangely, a unique service. Unlike school young people do not have to attend, they do not *have* to achieve anything and parents don't get fined if they don't go! In short it's all about choice. Young people choose to come...or not. They are there because they want to be there, enjoy the freedom this gives them and the fellowship it provides within a members club. We are still a thriving club. Membership is at 60+ with attendance hitting the mid 20's on most evenings.

To celebrate the 50th anniversary of Leeswood Youth Club we would like to invite you down for a little celebration on Wednesday 19th December @ 7pm. There, old and new members, parents and community organisers can come and share stories, experiences and celebrate the anniversary with a light buffet and refreshments. 
