1st with highest score, Mrs Jane Owen


2nd with lowest score, Mrs Gwen Gray



Keeping it simple this Christmas

We've slipped an owl into our Christmas tree. Not a real one of course. That would be too much work... and cruel. But it looks cute, peeping out between the fairy lights and the baubles. Owls don't have anything to do with Christmas, needless to say. But thinking about it, neither do robins, doves nor pigeons. And to be strictly honest we must acknowledge that camels and donkeys don't appear in the Bible accounts either. In fact the list goes on. You will find no mention of fir trees, holly, ivy, mistletoe, turkeys, snowmen, crackers, cards or tinsel. Most of that was invented in fairly recent times. Indeed, if you go back to medieval days you'll discover that Christmas was a short festival with special food, plenty to drink, catchy music and a special church service or two. "Ah, if it could only be that simple again!" I hear you say. I sympathise. It's all pretty overwhelming and could be much easier. It is, after all, supposed to be a celebration centred on Jesus himself.

The Bible seems to agree. Even in the New Testament the accounts of the circumstances surrounding his amazing and rather strange birth don't occupy much space. The four writers who tell us the story of Jesus' life in the gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke and John spend little time on the birth of Christ. They seem keen to get down to business with their story-telling and focus on Jesus' adult life, his miracles and teaching, as well as explaining how he came to save us by dying on the cross and rising from the dead. In fact Mark and John's gospels leave out the story of Jesus' birth entirely, beginning their accounts when Jesus was around 30 years of age. You might be surprised to know that the early Christians didn't celebrate Christmas at all. Easter was the big annual event for them.

That's why many Christians try to keep things simple at this time of year. We organise church services where we recall the events of the first Christmas in song and stories. We make sure that at some point around December 25th we walk into church with expectation and gratitude to give thanks to God for the gift of his son, Jesus. The churches of Leeswood, including Bethania will have open doors several times over the coming weeks for you to come and join us. You will be very welcome.



Following the Church service a short service was held at the Lychgate and wreathes were laid by C'llr Ray Hughes and Joe Roberts, on behalf of the Leeswood Branch of the Royal British Legion. At the service the Last Post and Reveille was sounded by Mr. Clive Venables, C'llr Joseph Caruana raised and lowered the Standard and also compiled and read Poems appropriate to the occasion both at Potblyddyn and at the Cenotaph in Leeswood.

The exhortation was taken at the Service by the Chairman Carlton Jones.

Following the Church Service at Pontblyddyn a .wreath laying ceremony was held at the Leeswood Cenotaph and a short service and prayers were led by our vicar the Rev. Carole Poolman. The Exhortation was read by the Branch Poppy Organiser, Cheryl Francis.

The Deputy Head Mel Drake read out the names of the fallen with an explanation as to how and what happened during the wars and how it is so important that we never forget those brave men and women who fought and are still fighting for our freedom to this day.

Children taking part in the service were Frankie Russell, Jasmine Kendrick, Nikitta Venables Hughes Megan Challinor and Hannah Roberts, to conclude the service each child placed a cross on the Cenotaph. In memory of those who had lost their lives.

On behalf of the Branch I extend my thanks and appreciation to Cheryl ,Gayle and Mike for organising the Armistice Tea on Saturday, and to Miss Marie Reynolds and members of the Leeswood and Pontblyddyn Community Council for the lovely Buffet they arranged on Sunday following the Cenotaph Service on also to Gayle and Brenda for the excellent food they provided.

To Marie for all the research and the preparation of so many crosses bearing the names of those who

The Nation's Thank You procession - by Tina Larcombe (previously Hoyle)

On 11 November 2018, 10,000 members of the public had the opportunity to form a procession past the Cenotaph in central London, to pay tribute to those that served during the First World War. This unique commemoration on the 100th anniversary of the signing of the Armistice recognised the significance of the end of the First World War and the sacrifice made by so many men and women during the war.

I entered the ballot for the procession which was drawn at random. Participants did not have to be a direct descendant to take part. I found out that I had a place in August. I had the option to order a specific wreath for the event, which I did. I dedicated the wreath to



my Great Uncle, Thomas Evans. Some of you may remember my Grandmother, Maggie Owens, and Thomas was her eldest brother. He died from wounds from a landmine. I also dedicated the wreath to others from the village who died in the Great War. The 10,000 participants had to arrive at Green Park at 9am to the form up area from the west end of the Mall avoiding Charing Cross and Embankment which were the main arrival points for the Royal British Legion's veterans parade participants. The King's Troop rode past us with the gun to be used to mark the start of the two minute silence. We observed the two minute silence and watched the National Service of Remembrance on large screens in the park. At 12.30 the procession started and lasted two hours, parading past the Cenotaph and ending in St James' Park. Due to the large number of participants, we were not able to lay our wreaths at the Cenotaph ourselves as we went past but were able to pass on to a dedicated wreath-laying team of Scouts as we approached.

I'm not sure another opportunity like this will come around again. I feel very lucky to have obtained a place in the ballot for the procession and to have the opportunity to lay a wreath which named my Great Uncle and others from Leeswood at the Cenotaph.





Technical Corner

Joseph Caruana

Industry has always played a very important part in creating wealth and prosperity. Nevertheless, the amount of prosperity which is created depends on how the whole affair is managed. Industry is like a tree, and the better it is cultivated the better is the yield it gives. Industrial cultivation starts on the shop floor, where the better the workforce is treated, the more productive they are. The captains of industry are normally referred to as industrialist, but sometimes these personalities are often mistaken as business men. Anybody can be involved in industry, but all those who are involved in industry are not necessarily industrialist, nevertheless, a group of individuals with different commercial skills could make a success of an industrial venture.

The input into an industrial venture can come from all directions, and from all kind of individuals or groups. It is when the input from every angle is put together, that an industrial venture could be turned into a success. The first step of an industrial venture is normally the conceptual stages of a product or a service. In the case of a product it starts with an invention or a further development of an existing product. At these early stages, the main input into the venture is likely to be of an intellectual nature. Intellectuals will either come up with an idea which they try to push onto the market, or identify a need within the market and produce a solution to fill that need. In this case, one is called a technological push, while the other one is call a market pull.

The industrial history of this country shows that British industry has produced many products which served their purpose with distinction. This was definitely the result of careful analysis of what is available in terms of raw material and expertise, which was then compare to what the market wants. If one strikes a good balance, the whole venture will be a great success. One can build on past successes, learn from mistakes, and develop further industrial products. However, if you do not acknowledge the mistakes as much as you celebrate your success, you might isolate yourself from reality and therefore impede further development.

In this country we are very lucky to have so many inventors and industrialists from the past that we can study. Obviously, like in all walks of life, some industrial developments have not been as successful as others, nevertheless, these are the developments that could analyse to see if it is possible to take corrective action and reintroduce them in a different way. These ideas can also be adjusted to current demands and fulfil a new purpose within an industrial programme.

There have been several times when errors were made and products where not selected for mass production, or abandoned along the line at the detriment of wealth creation. One such case that we might refer to could be the tilting train project. This was a project that this country pioneered and took the lead from the beginning, however, the project was shelved along the line, and as a consequence, others other competitive entities took the lead and form a commercial competitive edge. These are issues from which we might learn, and if we analyse the events that took place along the course of this project we will be able to implement procedures to deliver a successful outcome if and when similar projects are undertaken.

With all the above taken into consideration, we must not forget that finances play an important part in these matters, and if the financial backers do not feel that their investment is viable they might either seek alteration to the way the venture is being run, or pull out altogether. However, when a project reaches this stage, any financial backers might feel that if more finances are pumped into the project some kind of return might be possible, but it must be kept in mind that if corners are cut, the final product might be weakened and might fall apart when performing its proper duty.

I remember on one occasion in my early days in industry, a manufacturer was manufacturing a machine which was selling very well. The main selling features were its robust construction and durability. Then all of a sudden the price of raw material went up unexpectedly. As a quick fix, in order to maintain the same price the manufacturer decided to cut down on amount of material that went into the construction of the machine. This action immediately took away the two strong selling points that the machine possessed. Gradually the customers started to experience problems with the machines. Sales started to drop, profits declined and at the end the product was taken out of production. However, the most damaging aspect was the loss of reputation, because the decision to take beef out of the machine rippled into taking the machine out of production.

MEMORIES OF AN OILFIELD MAN

The Liverpool cowboy.....???

I know, I am supposed to be writing an article about my working life in the oil field but these memories are all part and parcel of those days, including my time away from the oil rigs, and looking for a new contract wherever that may be. As mentioned previously I have photographs of my first offshore rig and the last, using them in place of a border around the walls of my man cave (escape from normality) and as I look at each one, I cannot believe this was my life. At that time; did I really do these things? and yes, I did. Rounding half wild cows, dehorning those bad tempered ones with dangerous horns, (talk about that later) and castrating the yearlings - they told me this would help to put extra beef on them; I don't know it appeared a bit harsh to me but who am I to argue with a cowboys logic, I was along to help,

When the meeting and introductions of friends and relatives were over which took a couple of interesting days, I must say we met some great people many of whom had never travelled further than their home state of Immokalee. We felt like celebrities the way we were paraded around, embarrassing to say the least,

It was time to take to the saddle, Jimmy and Pat's cattle had been free ranging for a while. Pats dad helped to keep an eye on them during the time we lived in Egypt but he had his own work responsibilities, being a banker, also with his own ranch to run. Carol and myself decided to have a little time on our own so we saddled a couple of horses and had a couple of hours chilling out by riding around safe areas of the ranch before I was to start helping with the cattle. So many interesting things happened during our time in Immokolee, I don't know where to begin. I will start with the third day of being there,

It was decided that we drive to the nearest western outfitters store, which turned out to be over an hours drive away, where we would each need new Stetson style cowboy hats. 30yrs later I still wear one much to Carols annovance! Then of course we had to have boots, belt and buckles, I still have them in a cupboard somewhere. After a lot of good natured fun with the sales staff we were kitted out western style. Pat had told me it was Jim's birthday soon and she wanted to buy him a new rifle she had asked me to go to the gun store and pick one up for her, she gave me the details, make and model, I asked Pat if it was legal for me to buy a fire arm over the counter. She was surprised that I had asked, "why not, just produce your UK driving licence / passport and our address where you are staying and you will have no problem. While we were in this gun shop the dealer produced a variety of weapons then tried to sell Carol a Saturday night special - what the hell is that" I asked him, "it's a small snub nosed pistol that ladies carry in their purse for personnel protection" he replied, "no thanks I will give that one a miss" I picked up Jim's rifle and left. Guns were that easy to obtain, The plan for today was breakfast at 6am (full American) Carol was to stay behind in the house (this was her choice) the rest of us Jimmy, Pat, her Dad, Lynne, and even Barbie, Thumper (photo included) the youngest stayed in with Carol, although he could ride a horse better than I could he was a little young yet for chasing semi wild cows. Jimmy explained the plan of action, The cattle had mainly been left to fend for themselves in parts of the reclaimed Everglades, these were purchased from the government for a ridiculous fee with the condition that for every acre purchased two would have to be cleared of swamp plantation such as swamp cabbage palms. The heart of these palm cabbage were edible and used at many of the barbecues we attended.

MEMORIES OF AN OILFIELD MAN

The experienced riders would round up the cows that were in the undergrowth while myself and Barbie would bring in the strays, as I mentioned it was not a big ranch I think they had about a hundred or so cattle but among these were a number of yearlings, and some had to be separated for gelding, something that had been explained to me but I was not looking forward to. During this round up I lost sight of the others (in other words I was lost) "where the hell am" I asked myself, I could hear the noise of the cattle and shouting of voices but could not place the direction they were coming from, I decided to dismount and climb on top of this six or seven foot mound of soil or something for a better view. This done the trick I could see the rest of them a short distance away then I began to feel itchy and biting on my legs and working up inside my jeans, "what the hell is this?" after a couple of minutes I was in agony, I climbed down the mound as quick as possible and headed towards the rest of them. By this time I was nearly screaming and scratching, it appeared that the hill I had stood on was some type of ant or termite hill, I was covered in them "the best thing to do is go into that pond fully dressed have a swim around to get rid of them" "What with my new jeans and boots on and you telling about the alligator that ate your dog, no thanks" I replied" your choice" he said. I asked Barbie to guide me back to the ranch where I stripped down, gave Carol my clothes to wash and I jumped in the shower to treat the bites and stings luckily they never reached my upper body, That happened the same evening when Jimmy asked me to climb onto the roof and adjust the TV antenna, it was early evening and the mosquitoes were out in force.

It's true everything in the states is bigger that includes those mosquitoes the size of sparrows! By the time I ran back down the ladder it was too late I felt like a leper full of lumps/bumps and itching like hell, to every ones amusement. It was not a good day for me, I hoped the next one would be better, I had been bitten by ants stung to death by mosquitoes - I was saddle sore from spending hours on the horse, it must get better as we have another month or so......



APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE

These were received from Councillor R. Hughes, Vice-Chairman and Councillors C. Coleman, L.T. Coleman, D. Foster, T. Hughes, R. Williams.

DECLARATION OF INTEREST - MEMBERS CODE OF CONDUCT There were no

declarations of interest.

IAN WILLIAMS, AREA CO-ORDINATOR, STREETSCENE, FLINTSHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL

Councillor D. Rule, Chairman, welcomed Ian Williams from Streetscene, Flintshire County Council. Mr Williams was appointed the Area 8 Co-Ordinator, responsible for the Communities of Penyffordd, Higher Kinnerton, Hope, Caergwrle, Leeswood, Treuddyn and Llanfynydd at the beginning of August 2018. This is a very similar rural area to where he was previously. Mr Williams explained that he thought it was easier to meet with Community Councils face to face to discuss any issues in their area. Reference was made to the 30mph signs on Stryt Cae Rhedyn, Leeswood, which are situated just around a blind bend and gives insufficient notice of a change in the speed limit. It is understood that the moving of these signs to the approach up to the bend has been requested but nothing has yet been done about it because of complications involving the staggering of the reduction in speed to 40mph then 30mph. Comment was also made that the hedging is growing over these signs and needs to be cut back. Mr Williams advised that he would look into this. Observation was made to the pot holes on the Chester Road, Pontblyddyn, in the area of Bank Farm.

It was believed that these could cause damage to smaller vehicles.

Mr Williams advised that he had picked up on these and they would be attended to. Further in Pontblyddyn, the 'Give Way' sign by the old bridge was obscured by ivy growing over. This would be looked at.

A general issue about gulleys in the Community that required clearing due to the build up of soil and foliage. It was acknowledged that this is not always possible as vehicles were parked close to or over them. Comment was made that the gulleys in Pontblyddyn are cleared regularly. Road signs in the County in general were referred to. Some of these are misleading, in particular those on the approach to roundabouts and indicate exits which are not accurate. Hedgerows are also covering the signs. Query was also made as to why the speed limit signs near Schools are 20mph in a black circle, rather than in a red circle. It was pointed out in other Counties these signs are in a red circle. The Clerk informed that she had e-mailed Steve Jones of Streetscene requesting that the signs by Ysgol Derwenfa be changed but the reply had been somewhat confusing as it appeared to indicate that it was believed these signs were in a red circle. Reference was made to the sink hole on the roadside near to the entrance of the Bridge Inn car park, Pontblyddyn. Mr Williams would look into this.

The Chairman, Councillor D. Rule, thanked Mr Williams for his attendance.

MINUTES

The minutes of the monthly meeting held on Tuesday 4th September 2018 had been circulated to all members. It was proposed by Councillor J. Caruana and seconded by Councillor G. Sherwood that these be accepted as a true record of proceedings. All Councillors in agreement.

ANY MATTERS ARISING FROM THE MINUTES (NOT INCLUDED ON THE AGENDA)

<u>One Voice Wales, AGM - Saturday 29th September,</u> 2018

Councillor G. Sherwood reported that he had attended the One Voice Wales AGM, on Saturday 29th September 2018, held at the Royal Welsh Showground, Llanelwedd, Builth Wells. There were many interesting exhibitors present. Unfortunately, the Speaker was unable to attend so a presentation was given by the Chair of the Welsh Government Association.

LEESWOOD AND PONTBLYDDYN COMMUNITY COUNCIL CYNGOR CYMUNED COEDLLAI A PONTBLYDDYN

02/10/2018

An independent panel has been reviewing changes to Town and Community Councils, the final report is to be given to the Welsh Government Cabinet Secretary. What is quite clear is that with austerity County Councils have less money but more obligations. Education and Social Care are statutory provisions from Local Authorities. The number of people requiring Education and Social Care are going up but there is less money to provide it. Optional services, such as street lighting and the maintenance of Parks/Recreation Areas may possibly come under the remit of Town/ Community Councils as they are able to obtain funds to pay for them through the Council Tax.

Town/Community Councils are expected to have more accountability. Any Councillor co-opted should be only for one term. They are then to stand in elections. Regular reports should be issued and an annual Public Meeting should be held. There will be compulsory training for Councillors and Town/Community Councils are to ensure that their Clerks are trained.

The services provided by County/Town/ Community Councils are random. Some Community Councils such as ours are in charge of their Cemeteries, others may be responsible for their street lighting. We pay for the maintenance and energy for some of the street lighting in the Community.

Summer Playscheme 2018

The Clerk advised that a response to the query raised about the issues at the Playscheme in Leeswood this summer had been sent by Janet Roberts, Play Officer, Flintshire County Council to County Councillor Carolyn Thomas. In this email Janet Roberts explained that she was aware of incidents relating to the scheme at Leeswood but not at Pontybodkin? Reports were being prepared for the Council. Darryl Peers, the Area Supervisor for the scheme, was to be contacted for his comments with regard to this. It was known that Darryl had spent time supporting the teams, visiting both teams on a daily basis. With regard to Leeswood, there were some nasty incidents with incidents of racist remarks directed at children.

The County Council worked with the family affected by this and the police, to support the children to continue attend playscheme, which they did. Darryl's view on all of the matters was to be obtained. Comment was made that when the issues at the Playscheme were brought up at the meeting with Inspector Whibberley at Mold Police Station, indication was given that they were unaware of the problems.

POLICE LIAISON

PCSO 3684 Peter Jones was unable to attend. He had sent a report in his absence.

Crime Issues / Trends

<u>2x Shoplifting – Queen Street, Leeswood</u> – suspect was identified, not a local. They have been dealt with.

ASB Issues

None to report.

Other News/PCSO activities:

Unfortunately, PCSO Jones did not get accepted for the funding in relation to the Hate Crime Event he wanted to set up. He had applied for £425 but due to the amount of applications that they had received he was un-successful. The Clerk reported that along with Councillors R. Hughes, Vice-Chairman and Councillor L.C. Richardson, she had met with Inspector Darren Whibberley at the Mold Police Station on Monday 24th September 2018 at 6pm. Inspector Whibberley explained that compared to other Communities in the South Flintshire Policing area, Leeswood did not have a very high crime rate. Concern was expressed that there was Hate Crime in the Community and this was causing distress for the families involved. It was acknowledged that there was an element of this in the Community and steps were being taken to deal with it. The Inspector further explained that there would be some crime within the Community that PCSO Jones is unable to report on due to the sensitive nature of it.

It is important that the Community help the Police when incidences of crime take place and report it. If the Police are unaware of what is going on they cannot take steps to address the problems. Comment was made that incidences are being reported but it seems that nothing is being done. Inspector Whibberley informed that there is insufficient manpower and time available to keep complainants up to date. Complainants can contact the Police for a progress report.

AGE FRIENDLY COMMUNITIES

Councillor G. Sherwood informed that the Steering Group have met. An interim Committee has been established, which consists of Mrs Shereen Devine, Age Friendly Communities Project Leader; Mrs Helen Jones, Older People's Strategy Co-Ordinator, Flintshire County Council and Mr Rob Jackson. This Committee has adopted a Constitution and set up a bank account. The Community Café sited in the Clinic Area of the Community Centre is doing very well and most weeks spills out into the Main Hall. Those residents that use the Café stay awhile. Rent is paid to the Community Centre for the hire of the Clinic Area as a Café. It is hoped that the Café will keep going once Mrs Devine is no longer the Project Co-Ordinator. People are very happy to help but they do not seem to want to lead.

<u>PARKING ISSUES - BELL'S CORNER AND JUNC-</u> <u>TION OF BRYN CLYD/KING STREET</u>

The Clerk reported that she had e-mailed Lee Shone of the Highways Department, Flintshire County Council to obtain a progress report. In his response, Mr Shone had stated that he was going to a meeting and would give an update following this. No further information had been received.

CADWYN CLWYD - iBEACON PROJECT

Councillor J.E. Saul advised that Mrs Jo Danson had met with the Headteacher, teachers and pupils at Ysgol Derwenfa. The project has now been extended to go live in March 2019. All Councillors agreed that the iBeacons will be a great asset to the Community once the project has been completed.

FLINTSHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL - BEST KEPT COMMUNITIES COMPETITION 2018

Councillors agreed that improvements could be made to the Community following the comments of the Judges of the Best Kept Communities Competition 2018.

Councillor D. Rule, Chairman, informed that he had attended the Presentation Evening on Friday 21st September 2018, along with Councillor R Hughes and Mrs G Hughes. Also, in attendance representing the residents of Heol-y-Dderwen, Leeswood were Mrs Dorothy Davies and Mrs Elizabeth Williams. The Chairman stated that it had been a very interesting and pleasant evening.

This item was to be put on the Agenda for the next monthly meeting.

TRAFFIC MANAGEMENT, PONTBLYDDYN CROSSROADS

Observation was made that a van had been attempting to turn from the main Wrexham/Mold Road up the Chester Road when a car came from the Mold direction and could have potentially caused an accident. The car was not travelling at excess speed, but it was considered that because visibility is restricted, this is causing problems for drivers. It was agreed by all Councillors that a site meeting needs to be held in Pontblyddyn soon.
