

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YOUR LOCAL MP LISTENING TO LEESWOOD



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Steering a safe and steady course through life's stormy waters It's a sobering thought that some of our more wilful

It's a sobering thought that some of our more wilful and self-centred life choices can often end disastrously, not only for ourselves, but also for those around us. If we look back with humility at those times when we've chosen unwisely, we can see how God — wanting the best for us — was working on our conscience, trying to get us to change our minds, or to steer us towards a better way.

With God there is always forgiveness for what is past... but how willing are we TODAY to heed God's warnings – be that through the Bible, a preacher, our circumstances or the people around us – when He points us towards the direction of safety? You may have read this transcript of a radio conversation between a US Naval vessel and Canadian authorities off the coast of Newfoundland that supposedly took place in 1995.

US Naval vessel: Please divert your course 15 degrees to the North to avoid a Collision.

Canadians: Recommend you divert YOUR course 15 degrees to the South to avoid a collision.

US Naval vessel: This is the Captain of a US Navy ship.

I say again, divert YOUR course.

Canadians: No. I say again, you divert YOUR course.

US Naval vessel: This is the aircraft carrier USS Lincoln, the second largest ship in the United States' Atlantic fleet. We are accompanied by three destroyers, three cruisers and numerous support vessels. I demand that YOU change your course 15 degrees north, that's one five degrees north, or counter-measures will be undertaken to ensure the safety of this ship.

Canadians: This is a lighthouse. Your call.

The US Navy has since debunked this conversation as an urban legend, so in all likelihood it never really happened, but the illustration is still a powerful one. The Bible urges us to "submit our lives to God", or in other words – "take on board God's advice and get his help". God has the bigger picture and when He acts as the lighthouse of our soul, we do well to heed His timely and helpful warnings and adjust our direction – at the earliest opportunity!

An Easter Thought

The Cross. You can hardly turn around without seeing one? Perched on top of a church or chapel building. Carved into a graveyard headstone. Engraved in a ring or suspended on a chain or even placed at the top of an article in a local magazine! The cross is the universal symbol of Christianity. An odd choice? It is strange that a means of torture would come to embody a movement of hope. The symbols of other faiths are a bit more upbeat: the six-pointed star of David, the crescent moon of Islam, a lotus blossom for Buddhism. Yet a cross for Christianity? An instrument of torture and execution!

Would you wear a tiny electric chair around your neck? Suspend a gold-plated hangman's noose on the wall? Would you print a picture of a firing squad on a business card? Yet we do so with the cross. Many even make the sign of the cross as they pray. Would we make the sign of, say, a guillotine blade falling during the French Revolution? Instead of the triangular touch on the forehead and shoulders, how about a karate chop on the palm? Doesn't quite have the same feel, does it?

Why is the cross the symbol of the Christian faith? To find the answer you need look no further than the cross itself. Its design couldn't be simpler. One beam of wood horizontal—the other vertical. One reaches across—like God's love. The other reaches up—as does God's holiness. One represents the width of his love; the other reflects the height of his holiness. The cross is the intersection. The cross is where God forgave his sinful children, you and me, without lowering his holy standards.

How could he do this? In a sentence: "Christ never sinned! But God treated him as a sinner, so that Christ could make us acceptable to God." 2 Corinthians chapter 5 verse 21- Contemporary English Version of the Bible.

Rivers are fascinating. Those of us who live round here are lucky to have two rivers running through the parish, the River Terrig and the larger River Alun, though the Alun is more BORDER



often out of sight than in full view. You can see it best at the back of the Bridge Inn in Pontblyddyn. Also if you follow a good footpath from the Church towards Coppa, you gain a rewarding view from the reconstructed bridge crossing its fast-flowing waters. But walks alongside the river are more difficult to find.

There are proposals to create a riverside walk along the river upstream from Mold, and I look forward to that. The best Alun riverside walk is at Loggerheads, where it can often be seen disappearing underground in dry summers. The River Alyn begins life in a marshy area south of Llandegla [see Riverside River by Pete Evans

flowing north to make a circuitous route round Mold



In my search to follow the border between England and Wales I set off from the elephant at Chester Cathedral, along the Roman walls to find the Dee at Handbridge where it cascades over the weir and becomes tidal. The Weir, I discovered recently, is an ancient manmade device, built by the Normans, to create a millrace for the flour Mills there.

[A fascinating book is "Miller of Dee" by Roy Wilding, the story of Chester's Mills and Millers including the Weir]

Continuing upstream, cross the river by the suspension bridge, and from here you can walk for miles by the riverside, to stopping points like Eccleston, where there used to be a ferry crossing point up to 1940. Further on it's possible to cross the river via a splendid blue and white iron bridge to reach Aldford. [See THE DEE WAY by David Berry published by Kittiwake] Once on this other side of the river, the walk takes you across fields, the Dee never very far away, as you make for your first boundary post, the ancient bridge spanning the river and linking the twin villages of Holt [Wales] and Farndon [England]. For the first time, the administrative national boundary joins the natural geographical boundary. Interesting to stand here on the bridge joining the two countries. Then it's time to set off through Cheshire, as the border follows its deviant route round Flint [Detached], to reach the northern edges of another county: Shropshire.

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

Technical Corner

Industry is on-going, and it is as much alive as you and I. This means that it needs to be cultivated and nourished for healthy further growth. We cannot say that because an industrial activity is going well today, it is going to be there forever unless incremental improvements are applied. We have seen many industries which were taken for granted and were expected to last forever, but because they were not improved as time went on, they fell behind the rest of the competition with disastrous consequences. Customer demand creates a vacuum in the market, and therefore creates a market pull. When this market pull is identified, it should be studied and accommodated.

In order to accommodate a market pull and move progressively forward ahead of the competition, an industrialist must take stock of what is required, in order to allocate resources. If resources are available, then, the next step is to identify how efficient these resources can be applied. Efficiency is the ratio between what is put into a process in the form of raw material together with manpower, and what is taken out of the process in the form of finished product. The better the quality of the raw-material, the better is the chance of producing a high quality product, however, if the work-force is not skilled enough to process the raw-material with the techniques it requires, the quality raw-material will be wasted, and will create a loss. It is due to these aspects, that the whole picture should be taken into view, and intellectually studied to avoid as many pit-falls as possible once the process is up and running.

Pit-falls can come in many forms, and one of the most common pit-falls is the number of defective products. All defective products do hinder efficiency in a big way, because when a product is rerun through the system, it does not only cost twice in manpower and energy, it will also occupy process time in which another fresh could have been produced. Therefore, the loss incurred in rerunning a defective product, can have effects on the well-being of an organisation. An important aspect which can help eradicate defective products could be the application of a system that monitors the process from start to finish. The monitoring system will collect data, which will then be processed to identify why defective products are produced.

One cannot turn a blind eye to defective products, and they should be monitored hour by hour, day by day, and so on. It could also be important that data be collected individually from each production line, to identify which production line is producing most defective items. The data collected can then be processed through a statistical process for further analysis.

When a set of data figures are collected, an individual might think that by working an average point of the figures, one can determine how the data points are spread out. An average point, does not give the section of the values where most of the data figures are concentrated. It is therefore possible, that the average point on its own, is not enough to work exact picture of how thing are.

There are other ways to process a set of data figures, with which one could compliment the value of an average point, and also determine where most of the figures are concentrated on both sides of the average. This is called 'standard deviation' and it will help you identify figures which are on the outer fringes both above and below the average point. This is a statistical process which I have used many times in the past when I processed sets of production figures within a manufacturing establishment. Nevertheless, please note that a standard deviation can be used with any kind of figures, irrespective of whether you are processing a set of data representing speed which is measured in miles per hour or a set of data representing the flow of water which is measured in cubic meters of water per hour. You can calculate the standard deviation for the whole set of data figure (called a whole population) or you can calculate the standard deviation for a section of the data figures (called a sample). It should be mentioned that the greater the number of data figures that you enter, the more accurate the standard deviation will be. Talking about accuracy, one must mention that the end result is as representative as the data figures which are entered in the formula. Like everything we do, the end result of any process or formula is as good as the ingredients or entries we put in it. If the entries are not accurate, the results are not going to be accurate. To enhance this, a direct computerised link from the data collection point to the processing system can be used. The technology is there and available for us to use, it is up to us to use it to create a better world.



What is Dementia?

Dementia is an illness caused by damage to a person's brain. Memory problems are one of a number of symptoms that people with dementia may experience. Others include difficulties with planning, thinking things through, struggling to keep up with a conversation and sometimes changes in mood or behaviour. Whilst it mostly affects older people, younger people can also get dementia.

Supporting people living with Dementia

Over 17,000 people affected by dementia live in rural Wales, yet they often face barriers and challenges to accessing the support they need to live meaningful lives and to remain part of their local community.

People affected by dementia often have to give up the things they love because of lack of awareness, stigma and unsupportive environments. With increased awareness, understanding and support from local communities, people affected by dementia can continue to live full and active lives.

It's been a very different start to the year on the allotments. Last year we struggled with the 'Beast From the East'; this year we were basking in temperatures in the high teens!

Growth started early (predominantly weeds on my allotment I'm sorry to say) and it is tempting to get things in the ground too early, particularly as the supermarkets and garden centres have a wide range of plants on display. However, as my plot was not ready (full of weeds as I said earlier), I was able to resist the temptation. The weather then turned colder and wetter. Up to the day of writing this we've had storms Freya and Gareth and by the time this issue of the Leeswood News comes out in April we could well have had storms named Hillary and Irene!!

Even if the ground is not ready or warm enough to sow and plant, there is still work to be done on the allotment in preparation. The photograph shows how new raised beds are being constructed on one of the plots this year. Can't wait to see what is going in them...watch this space!

As well as growing vegetables on their allotments, some members choose to grow flowers. I'm always reluctant to cut flowers from my garden and would prefer to buy from the supermarket or elsewhere rather than denude the garden of colour. Last year, therefore I grew some flowering plants. The gladioli and sweet peas did really well last summer and I was able to pick allotment daffodils for St David's Day this year

There are, however, certain plants which provide beauty and colour and are also edible. One is the blueberry. They are small shrubs which can be grown on patios and have white or pink flowers in Spring. In summer they have their sweet blue berries which are delicious and very versatile. Then in autumn, the leaves turn fiery red and are as bright and attractive as any Acer. Blueberries need light, plenty of water and acidic soil, so if

they are grown in pots use ericaceous compost.

There other many attractive, fruit bearing plants and what could be nicer than a trip to a garden centre at this time of year to check them out and most now have a café for tea and cake or something more

PONTBLYDDYN VILLAGE SIGN

The sign on the Nant, Pontblyddyn, will be put up in the next couple of weeks. Councillors referred to the replacement sign on the Chester Road, Pontblyddyn. 20MPH MANDATORY SPEED LIMIT OUTSIDE FLINTSHIRE SCHOOLS

It was pointed out that across North Wales there is a mandatory speed limit of 20mph outside Schools, except for Flintshire. Cars pass Ysgol Derwenfa at speed and this is a cause for concern. Councillors agreed that a 20mph mandatory speed limit outside the School is required. The Clerk pointed out that when she had previously e-mailed Steve Jones of Streetscene, Flintshire County Council, the response indicated that there was a mandatory speed limit of 20mph outside Flintshire Schools. Observation was made that the 20mph speed limit sign outside Ysgol Derwenfa is advisory. All Councillors agreed that the Clerk should take a photograph of the sign and send it to Mr Jones requesting that a mandatory 20mph sign be put outside the School in its place.

Hello readers,

Well, at last, I have finally managed to secure a date for further CPR and defibrillator training at the Community Centre. I am so sorry it has taken this long to sort out since our first training session but life, and what it throws at you, tends to get in the way sometimes!

There is a poster in this edition for you to check out the necessary details of the relevant date and time etc but, just to keep you fully informed, it is my intention to host three sessions on Saturday 13th April 2019 commencing at 3.00pm with the Welsh Hearts Charity allowing groups of around 15 to 20 people per session. As you can appreciate there was a lot of interest on the first occasion and many at the back did not get the best view. Hosting sessions in this way with groups of lower numbers will prove more fruitful for those attending. If numbers are high then we may just have to stretch that little further to around 25 per group but we will see.

There will be an opportunity for private training at the end of each session in which you can then obtain a certificate. Certificates will not be issued for those just simply wishing to attend without the private training.

If all goes to plan, the first session at 3pm will last around 45 minutes and we will then allow a further half hour for private training. The next session will then commence around 4.15pm with, hopefully, the same time frame developing and the same for the 5.30pm class taking us up to 7.00pm.

If of course these classes spark a lot of interest then it may be that we will have to host another session in the Autumn with the charity, if they can fit us in that is.

As you know the Community Centre is widely used each month for events such as bingos, children's/adults parties, zumba, rainbows and guides, and meetings to name but a few. It is therefore down to you, the public, to view whether or not you deem CPR and defibrillator training to be worth an hour or so of your time particularly when there is a machine there in case of emergency. Had we have had such access all those years ago to these machines then the lives of two men may well have been saved. But who knows. It really is a case of "Do **you** want to be able to learn how to try and save someone's life?" As a community we should at least be ready, willing and able to assist in some way.

I have maintained throughout this little venture that, in having these machines installed at both the Community Centre and the School, it gives those needing life saving assistance a better chance of survival should they be unfortunate to suffer a cardiac arrest. Something else I have always maintained throughout - why have these machines installed if you don't even know how to turn them on?!

There is no charge for the sessions. They are free. However, if you do feel you want to make a donation to the Charity for their dedication and continuing hard work, then you will be able to do so on the day. I'm sure they would be most grateful.

Contact details folks are on the poster - check it out. I would however very kindly ask the public not to just turn up without booking a place first. Many thanks.
