

What's the best news you've ever heard?

That's the slogan of a course called Christianity Explored that we at Bethania have been running in recent months. It's a pretty informal short course that looks at the basics of the Christian faith: humankind's evident inability to sort out the mess it's in, the help on offer as a result of Jesus' death and resurrection, and how we as individuals can get in touch with God and tap into that offer of help.

There's no obligation and no pressure.

It runs for seven sessions of about an hour to an hour and a half (it depends on how long we chat for!) – we've been running it once a fortnight. The course is based on Mark's gospel, and in each session we read a short passage, then watch a short video to help stimulate our thinking, and then spend some time discussing things. That discussion is the best bit. It's certainly not a case of 'We have all the answers, so listen up!' – mainly because we don't have all the answers... It's much more about chatting and sharing our different experiences of life and learning from one another using the gospel as our guide.

Thanks to all those who've been involved. I've enjoyed it a lot, and I think everyone else has – at least, they keep coming back!

We're coming to the end of the course now, but we're thinking of running it again in the autumn. If you're interested in joining us or to find out more, call 07901 810013. 'My...witnesses have always been treated like this.' Luke Chapter 6 verse 23 – The Message

When we've been treated badly, we should always ask ourselves what we can learn from the experience. We need to consider how we could respond in a more Jesus-like way, whether we're willing to acknowledge mistakes, and figure out how we can grow wiser and handle similar situations better in the future. When misunderstanding and/or temper or has caused the difficult circumstance, the answer is forgiveness. We can often try and avoid the process of forgiveness because we think it's like letting someone off the hook for what they've done. But forgiveness doesn't mean we necessarily agree with or want a closer relationship with the person who mistreated us. It does mean though that we let it go, which prevents bitterness from building up inside us – sometimes for years. It is sometimes said that to be greater is to forgive the one who has treated you badly. The process of forgiveness can be challenging, and it might take us longer than we think it will. We often need to work through lots of emotions, thoughts, and resentments that have built up. Uprooting these things is hard work, but God can give us the strength we need to be able to do it. The Message version of the Bible paraphrases Jesus' words in Luke 6 like this: 'Count yourself blessed every time someone cuts you down or throws you out, every time someone smears or blackens your name to discredit me. What it means is...the truth is too close for comfort and that that person is uncomfortable...be glad when that happens...all heaven applauds. And know that you are in good company; my...witnesses have always been treated like this' (vv.22-23). By living this way, we also take back control by refusing to let another person dictate our mood, our perspective even our life.

What Now?

The next time someone hurts you, take some time to reflect on how you responded and think of any ways you could be more like Jesus if it happened again.

The Orb and Cross is used as part of the Methodist Church logo. The cross being in radiant form to symbolise the Glory of the risen Lord. The orb to symbolise the world.

The colours red and white are used: Red for the orb to symbolise the (Arminian) doctrine of the possibility of a universal salvation for all humanity through the power of the Holy Spirit - represented by the Whitsun colour. White for the risen Saviour of Eastertide.


The colour red is also the traditional colour of Pentecost and may be taken to symbolise the Methodist conviction that through the power of the Holy Spirit, all humanity may be saved. The cross, as it symbolises the risen Saviour,

has no boundary to the arms of the cross, just as there are no limits to the grace of God. Ours is a faith that addresses the deepest longings of the heart, but it is always turned outwards to the world and its needs. The whole logo in symbolic form summarises the mission and message of Methodism first set out by John Wesley: "I look upon the whole world as my parish; thus far I mean that in whatever part of it I am, I judge it meet, right and my bounden duty to declare unto all that are willing to hear the Glad Tidings of Salvation. By Grace are ye saved through Faith." (St Mary's, Oxford, 11 June 1738)

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

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Leeswood & Ponblyddyn has been officially recognised as working towards becoming a Dementia Friendly Community by the Alzheimer's society

What is Dementia?

Dementia is an illness caused by damage to a person's brain. Memory problems are one of a number of symptoms that people with dementia may experience. Others include difficulties with planning, thinking things through, struggling to keep up with a conversation and sometimes changes in mood or behavior. Whilst it mostly affects older people, younger people can also get dementia.

Supporting people living with Dementia

Over 17,000 people affected by dementia live in rural Wales, yet they often face barriers and challenges to accessing the support they need to live meaningful lives and to remain part of their local community.

People affected by dementia often have to give up the things they love because of lack of awareness, stigma and unsupportive environments. With increased awareness, understanding and support from local communities, people affected by dementia can continue to live full and active lives.

This involves working together to ensure people with dementia feel understood, valued and able to contribute to their community. Everyone in the community can be involved from churches to youth groups, cafes to bowling club, the local shop to hairdresser etc.

People in the community need to understand dementia before they can take dementia-friendly actions that will make the community more inclusive. Dementia Awareness sessions provide an effective way of increasing understanding in local communities. The session is free, takes no more than 1 hour and involves learning more about dementia and the small ways we can all help.

ELECTION OF CHAIRMAN FOR THE FORTH-COMING COMMUNITY YEAR 2019/2020

It was proposed by Councillor R. Williams and seconded by Councillor G. Sherwood that Councillor R. Hughes be appointed Chairman for the year 2019/2020. All Councillors in agreement. The new Chairman, Councillor R. Hughes, stated that it was an honour to be elected as Chairman to the Council and thanked the Council for their support. **ELECTION OF VICE-CHAIRMAN FOR THE FORTH-**

COMING COMMUNITY YEAR 2019/2020

It was proposed by Councillor J. Caruana and seconded by Councillor R. Williams that Councillor D.K. Crowther be appointed Vice-Chairman for the year 2019/2020. This was unanimously agreed. Councillor D.K. Crowther thanked the Council for their support.

APPOINTMENT OF THE CEMETERY SUB-COMMITTEE FOR THE FORTHCOMING COMMU-NITY YEAR 2019/2020

It was proposed by Councillor J. Caruana and seconded by Councillor D.K. Crowther that the remaining six members of the Cemetery Sub-Committee be re-elected en-bloc. Councillor R. Hughes, Chairman to the Council, pointed out that if Councillors were continually re-elected en-bloc, it did not give the opportunity for new Councillors to join the Committee. The Clerk suggested that Councillors may wish to consider increasing the number of Councillors on the Committees. All Councillors agreed. Councillor L.C. Richardson was nominated to join the Committee, all Councillors in agreement. Members are: - Councillor R. Hughes, Chairman of the Sub-Committee, Councillors J. Atkinson, J. Caruana, D.K. Crowther, T. Hughes, Councillor L.C. Richardson and J.E. Saul.

APPOINTMENT OF THE FINANCE SUB-COMMITTEE FOR THE FORTHCOMING COMMU-NITY YEAR 2019/2020

It was proposed by Councillor T. Hughes and seconded by Councillor D.K. Crowther that the Finance Sub-Committee be re-elected en-bloc with the proviso that the matter should be added to the June monthly meeting Agenda to give the opportunity to one of the newer Councillors to be added to the Committee. All Councillors in agreement.

Current members are: - Councillor G. Sherwood, Chairman of the Sub-Committee, Councillors J. Caruana, D.K. Crowther, R. Hughes, D. Rule and J.E. Saul.

APPOINTMENT OF A DELEGATE TO ATTEND MEETINGS OF THE POLICE AND COMMUNITY CONSULTATIVE GROUP

It was agreed that this should be open to all Councillors.

APPOINTMENT OF TWO REPRESENTATIVES TO SERVE ON THE LEESWOOD COMMUNITY CEN-TRE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

Observation was made that the Leeswood Community Centre Management Committee in its current form would cease to exist once the asset transfer had taken place. This Committee is likely to be replaced by a Fundraising Support group. However, as the Committee is still in existence at this moment in time it was unanimously agreed, the members representing this Council on the Leeswood Community Management Committee would be Councillors J. Caruana and G. Sherwood. Following the dissolution of the Management Committee, the Trustees would give a report to the Community Council.

APPOINTMENT OF A REPRESENTATIVE TO SERVE ON THE HANSON HEIDELBERG LIAISON COMMITTEE

It was proposed by Councillor G. Sherwood and seconded by Councillor T. Hughes that

Councillor J. Caruana continue to serve as this Council's representative on the Liaison Committee. Councillor J. Caruana was thanked for his work on the Liaison Committee.

COUNTY FORUM REPRESENTATIVE

It was unanimously agreed that Councillor J.E. Saul and the Clerk would remain as the Council's representatives on the County Forum.

APPOINTMENT OF TWO REPRESENTATIVES TO ATTEND THE AREA MEETINGS OF ONE VOICE WALES

Agreed that G. Sherwood would continue to attend these meetings. Councillor R. Hughes, Chair to the Council would attend as this Council's other representative when available. If the Chairman was not available to attend, the other place could be taken by any Councillor free to go.

LEAD MEMBER FOR AGE FRIENDLY COMMUNI-TIES

It was proposed by Councillor T. Hughes and seconded by Councillor D.K. Crowther that Councillor G. Sherwood remain as the lead member. All Councillors in agreement.

RISK ASSESSMENT 2019/2020

Following a discussion, it was proposed by Councillor G. Sherwood and seconded by Councillor R. Williams that the Risk Assessment 2019/2020 be accepted. All Councillors in agreement.

DECLARATION OF INTEREST – MEMBERS CODE OF CONDUCT There

The minutes of the monthly meeting held on Tuesday 2nd April 2019 had been circulated to all members. It was proposed by Councillor R. Williams and seconded by Councillor J. Caruana that these be accepted as a true record of proceedings. All Councillors in agreement.

DANIEL OWEN FESTIVAL – 150th ANNIVERSARY OF THE MOLD RIOTS

Councillor R. Hughes, Chairman, welcomed Mr Kevin Matthias, Chair to the Daniel Owen Festival to the meeting. Mr Matthias explained to Councillors that the Daniel Owen Festival is in its tenth year. It was started to celebrate the writer Daniel Owen, who is referred to as the 'Welsh Dickens'. Daniel Owen is Wales' foremost novelist who wrote in the Welsh language and featured the working man in his novels. The Festival is going from strength to strength and has now been expanded to cover other important historical matters of the area and will feature events that will be held in the medium of Welsh only, the medium of English only and also in both languages. This year, although the Festival will be held from the 19th to 25th October, it will feature the 150th Anniversary of the Mold Riots. The dates of the Festival are always at the same time as they celebrate the birth and death of Daniel Owen. A play about the Mold Riots will be put on as part of the Festival. This Community play will have 100 people involved but only two of them will be professional actors. It will be staged outdoors and the Council car park on King Street, Mold, will be part of the theatre set. Mr Matthias informed that he had close ties to the area where the unrest started, his father was born in a cottage in a place known as the Oil Works dip which was right in the middle of the unrest. The intention is to extend the Festival to include the areas of Treuddyn, Coed Talon, Pontybodkin, Leeswood and Llanfynydd. It was hoped that on Sunday 20th October, a walk from Leeswood to Mold could be organised, this would finish with a tea put on at the Church on Tyddyn Street, Mold. On Thursday 24th October, a walk was to be arranged in the Leeswood area, taking in Cae Gwial and through the old Pipeworks, finishing, at Cedron Chapel. Other events in the week would be walks around the Argoed Colliery and Gwysaney, also talks would be given. Councillor G. Sherwood advised that he would be willing to assist with the walks and would liaise with Mr Matthias. Councillors expressed that they would be very keen to participate with the Festival, especially as the Mold Riots started in our own Community.

Councillor R. Hughes, Vice-Chairman, thanked Mr Matthias for attending the meeting.

An urn to be used in the café is to be purchased.

Mrs Shereen Devine will be starting to work in Holywell in August 2019 as they aim to become an Age Friendly Community. She will be working one day per week in Leeswood up until November 2019.

HANSON HEIDELBERG CEMENT

Councillor J. Caruana reported that the last Councillor J. Caruana reported that the last meeting of the Liaison Committee had taken place on Monday 13th May 2019. An Open Day is to be held at the Padeswood Plant on 26th June 2019. Complaints of noise had been received but these had been investigated and it was found that the issue had not come from the Plant. A specialist Company is to be employed to investigate any noise problems. **PARKING ISSUES – BELL'S CORNER AND JUNC-TION OF BRYN CLYD/KING STREET**

No further information had been received relating to the double yellow lines to be put on Bell's Corner and the junction of Bryn Clyd/King Street. Comment was made that the double yellow lines on the junction of Bryn Clyd/King Street were requested to facilitate the movement of buses around the Bryn Clyd/Heol-y-Goron estates, but as the buses were no longer travelling this way it was gueried as to whether it was worth having them. Ten to fifteen cars parked on the road in the area of the junction of Bryn Clyd/King Street would have to be moved if the yellow lines were put in place. It was proposed by Councillor G. Sherwood and seconded by Councillor T. Hughes that yellow lines on the junction of Bryn Clyd/King Street should be re-evaluated. All Councillors in agreement.

CADWYN CLWYD - IBEACON PROJECT

The iBeacons had now been put in place. A launch of "Leeswood Digital Trails" is to be held on Thursday 16th May 2019 at the Community Centre, 10am till 12 midday. Staff and pupils from Ysgol Derwenfa would be invited to attend. Councillor J.E. Saul had designed a poster for inclusion on the notice boards in the Community. The Clerk advised that the Community Café group had been informed of this event. **PONTBLYDDYN CROSSROADS**

Councillors had been circulated with copy email correspondence from Lee Shone. In his email, Mr Shone advises that the surveys undertaken by Flintshire County Council were forwarded to GoSafe and the locations both fall within GoSafe live enforcement sites. Additionally, Flintshire County Council are currently in the progress of identifying route treatments for submission to Welsh Government for which this route will be included. This work takes a number of weeks, as it is necessary to prioritise all routes throughout the County, the assessment takes into account a number of factors including collision data, pedestrian generators, active travel solutions to name a few. The Community Council will be updated following this piece of work, to confirm which routes are likely to be submitted to Welsh Government for funding. Councillors appreciated the information from Mr Shone and all agreed that they would await the update.

PONTBLYDDYN VILLAGE SIGN

This sign had still not been erected. Councillor R. Hughes, Chairman, advised that he would speak to Mr Ian Williams of Streetscene about this.

YSGOL DERWENFA, LEESWOOD – IT EQUIPMENT The Clerk informed that she e-mailed Mr Gareth Owens of the Legal Department, Flintshire County Council and was awaiting a reply. Councillor R. Hughes advised that he would chase this up.

FLINTSHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL STANDARDS COMMITTEE – VISITS TO TOWN AND COMMU-NITY COUNCILS

Correspondence from Gareth Owens, Chief Officer, Governance, Flintshire County Council, which gives feedback on the recent visits by Standards Committee members to Flintshire Town and Community Councils had been circulated to all Councillors.

This is Mr Owens' fourth update regarding the visits by the Independent Members of the Standards Committee to Town/Community Council meetings to observe practice and gain an understanding of how local council business is conducted. The findings from further visits undertaken were reported to the Committee on the 29th April and Mr Owens is writing with feedback to all Town/Community Councils to give assurance on good practice and procedures. Findings from three further visits, undertaken in January and February 2019 were received by the Committee. As with previous reported visits, the four Independent Members

agreed that these had been positive experiences and praised the level of commitment and contributions by those in attendance. In addition to the procedural points, the Committee requested that the following be fed back to Town and Community Councils. One meeting seemed to take a very long time and finished very late. When meetings take this long people may find it more difficult to concentrate and it can mean that people are less able to stay to hear items that may be of importance to them. Tempers can also fray if meetings are overly long leading to intemperate behaviour. Clearly the length of a meeting will be dictated in large measure by the business to be discussed, number of participants (if there is a large public presence for example) and the significance of issues. In all cases though strong chairing can help to ensure that the business is transacted smoothly and effectively - for example it is important to prevent people from speaking multiple times or repeating points made previously, to move the debate on after the issues have been thoroughly aired etc. The members have now visited 26 councils and the remaining ten visits will be scheduled over the coming months. Once all have been completed the Committee aims to pull together an overview of its work into a single document. As before, the Committee hopes that this feedback is useful and wishes to acknowledge the dedication and good work undertaken by Town/ Community Councillors in their voluntary roles. Councillors accepted this correspondence.

CHANGES TO THE 26 BUS SERVICE

The Clerk advised that she had still not received a reply from Mr Mick Morton of Arriva Wales regarding the changes to the 26 Bus Service Mold to Wrexham which now excluded the Bryn Clyd/Heol-y-Goron estate. Councillors expressed disappointment at this but acknowledged that a return to including the Bryn Clyd/ Heol-y-Goron estate on the bus timetable is very unlikely. Councillor R. Hughes advised that he was looking into providing transport from the Senior Citizens estate to Mold and return on a Wednesday and Saturday.

ONE VOICE WALES – NOTICES OF MOTION FOR 2019 ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

Members had been circulated with a copy of email correspondence from Lyn Cadwallader, Chief Executive, One Voice Wales, inviting for member Councils to propose a maximum of two notices of motion for debate at the One Voice Wales AGM to be held on Saturday 5th October 2019. Closing date for motions are by noon, Thursday 20th June 2019. This was accepted.

FLINTSHIRE 50+ ADVISORY GROUP Correspondence from R Barry Harrison, Chair of Flintshire 50+ Action Group, requesting consideration for financial support towards the printing and administration costs of the twenty -page newsletter, Codgers Quarterly had been circulated to all Members. The target readership for this newsletter is people aged 50 and over, in accordance with the Welsh Strategy for Older People. It was agreed by all Councillors that a letter be sent from this Council advising that donations were decided in February and inviting the Group to apply for consideration in 2019/2020.

SEAFARERS UK

Members had been circulated with a copy of correspondence from Nick Harvey, Campaigns Manager, Seafarers UK, requesting that this Council supports this year's campaign to raise awareness of the UK's ongoing dependence on Merchant Navy seafarers. Councillor R. Williams advised that he would be prepared to purchase the Red Ensign for it to be flown on Merchant Navy Day, 3rd September 2019. The Chairman, Councillor R. Hughes stated that he would speak to the RBL Leeswood sub-branch to obtain permission for the flag to be flown on the pole by the Cenotaph.

Technical Corner

Joseph Caruana

We live in an age of advanced technology, and intense utilisation through the of satellite technology any moving object can be detected and monitored by a satellite from outer space. This technology might be able to be adopted to monitor the speed of vehicles travelling through our road and possibly record the speed of an individual car at any spot on the globe. This system might be able to record the speed of a vehicle going through a stretch of road which might have a speed limit imposed on it. Those of us who are familiar with using satellite navigation are well aware that the satellite navigation in a car can tell us the speed limit of any stretch of road that we happen to be travelling along. However, the satellite information is translated into action by the driver of the vehicle, and as we are all human, we are liable to make errors, and may not adjust the vehicle speed to what the satellite navigation system is telling us.

On the other hand, if the satellite information is transferred electronically to the vehicle speed control system, the traffic will move along our roads at the appropriate speed.

miaht be the case that some vehicle It manufacturers have already been working on a satellite system that can control the speed of a car. This will of course be at the drivers' discretion, and will be able to be overridden, should the driver decide to do so in case of an emergency. This is a preventative measure which will positively stop drivers from speeding, rather than catch them if they do speed. Should we decide to apply it, the technology is there, and it is also constantly improving. It is up to those who are in a position to decide on such issues, who can enforce these technologies and make things happen.

Decisions are made on the results obtained from the analysis of the data which is collected. There are several ways in which a set of data can be processed, nevertheless, we must keep a clear understanding that one rouge value (either too high or too low) can create inaccuracies in the average value. If a rouge value is identified, one must determine what has caused that value and assess whether that value is going to have a significant effect on the average result. Statistics are statistics, and analysts are analysts, however, one is of no good use without the other.

In engineering, if we want to produce a large number of identical items to a certain specification, we are more likely to achieve consistent accuracy if we use an automated system rather than producing them manually. The reason for this is that automated machines do not get destructed by the surrounding environment and they do not suffer momentary lapse of concentration. This could have a common parallel with driving a car, because drivers can be destructed by the surrounding environment or a moments' lapse of concentration. The technology to prevent over speeding on our roads might already be available.

With this in mind, in order to achieve some kind of harmony between the roads and the road users, a consistent way of speed control could be installed. To this end, a computerised and satellite operated speed control system might be the answer.



LEESWOOD and the riots in Mold in 1869

Elizabeth Jones is buried in Pontblyddyn Churchyard. She was one of four people shot dead in Mold by men of the 2nd Battalion, the 4th (King's Own) Regiment on 2nd June, 1869. This is how it came about.

Leeswood Green Colliery was not doing very well, and on the 1st May a notice went up to say there would be a reduction in the cutting price of coal by 1 shilling a ton. This meant, effectively, a cut in miners' wages. The new rates came into force on Monday 17th May. The notice had been written by the Manager, John Young, an Englishman, probably from Northumberland, who did not speak Welsh, the language spoken exclusively by the miners. The miners had a grievance.

The Wednesday after, an angry crowd of some 60 miners confronts John Young at his house in Leeswood. He is manhandled, put in a wheelbarrow, paraded through Pontybodkin and Pontblyddyn before being taken to a railway station [variously described as Coed Talon or Hope Junction] where he is rescued by two police constables. The intention had been to send him back to England.

On Friday miners and others ransack John Young's house, remove his furniture and take it to Mold Railway Station. One, William Hughes, identified as a ringleader in the original disturbances, is arrested in Leeswood and taken to police cells in Mold. He is due to face charges in Mold's court house the following day, but on his way from the police station he is grabbed by his mates and carried shoulder high, like a hero, through the streets of Mold. Later in the day he gives himself up, probably on the intervention of David Phillips a Methodist lay preacher from Carmarthen who also worked in the pit. William Hughes is summoned to appear in court on 2^{nd} June, bail being set at £60. In the meantime seven other men are arrested, accused of assaulting Young, and are also bound to appear in court alongside William Hughes.

The court house at the time is still standing in Chester Street, close to the present Police Station and Terrig House, and on the fateful day a large crowd of miners, numbering 600, gathers outside, joined by an even larger group of supporters. By the afternoon it is estimated 2000 people are milling about in Hall Fields, where they are addressed by David Phillips and other Methodists who preach restraint. There seems to have been something of a holiday atmosphere, with only a "few lads (hanging about brandishing)... cudgels or sticks." At 5 o'clock all the men are found guilty and sentenced.

William Hughes and Edwin Jones are fined 10 shillings (with costs). Robert Davies, Richard Taylor, John Hughes and Thomas Jones are fined £1 [with costs]. Ishmael Jones and John Jones, however, are sentenced to one month's imprisonment with hard labour.

It seems the authorities were anticipating trouble, and had brought in 56 soldiers from Chester, under the command of Captain Blake, to supplement the 39 Flintshire policemen and maintain control.

The two men to be jailed are escorted out of the Court House to the Railway Station, which at the time was just across the road, on a site now occupied by Tesco. On the way they are confronted by an angry crowd, protesting at the severity of the sentences. Although members of the crowd were not armed, there were plenty of missiles available in Tyddyn Street, as the railway line between Mold and Denbigh was being constructed, and a large number of stones were instantly available.

The crowd throws stones not only at the military and police, but also at the railway engine, carriages and platforms, yet in spite of the attack, the prisoners reach the station. 23 troopers and 13 policemen are injured, including Captain Blake. The Chief Constable of Flintshire, Peter Browne, implores the military to open fire, but Captain Blake refuses to do this unless authorised by a magistrate. Chief Constable Browne races down the platform and bundles an astonished Justice of the Peace from Chester, Mr Clough, out in front of the crowd. Mr Clough reads the Riot Act. Nothing can be heard amid all the uproar, and eventually Captain Blake gives the order to fire blank shots over the heads of the crowd. This has no effect and accordingly the order is given to fire live ammunition into the protestors.

Many people among the crowd are injured and four killed, Robert Hannaby and Margaret Younghusband, both aged 19, instantly. Edward Bellis, aged 22 is taken back to Pontblyddyn and cared for in a public house there, where he later dies. Elizabeth Jones, [50] from Pontblyddyn is cared for in the nearby Victoria Hotel. Four men are arrested and the crowd disperses.

The next day, Thursday 3rd June, an inquest opens into the deaths of the three killed, and on the following day returns a verdict of "justifiable homicide." On Saturday Elizabeth Jones dies of her wounds, and an inquest opens to pronounce on her death. It again gives a verdict of "justifiable homicide". Elizabeth's husband, Isaac Jones attends the inquest and is arrested for his part in the riot.

On Monday 7th June six men appear in court, including Isaac Jones, who is allowed out to attend the funeral of his wife in Pontblyddyn. The case is adjourned, when the defendants are joined by 4 more men and remanded to appear at the Assizes. In July Young is once again forcibly evicted from Leeswood and made to walk through Buckley to Queensferry.

At the Assizes five men, including Isaac Jones, are found guilty and sentenced to 10 years in prison, with hard labour. In a separate charge three men, including the lay preacher David Phillips, are found guilty of conspiracy and assault and sent to prison with hard labour.

Bridge Books

Soon afterwards Young leaves North Wales for good.

David Philips comes out of gaol and opens a greengrocer's in Coed Talon.

And Leeswood Green Colliery closes down.


