What's the best news you've ever heard?

That's the slogan of a course called Christianity Explored that we at Bethania have been running in recent months. It's a pretty informal short course that looks at the basics of the Christian faith: humankind's evident inability to sort out the mess it's in, the help on offer as a result of Jesus' death and resurrection, and how we as individuals can get in touch with God and tap into that offer of help.

There's no obligation and no pressure.

It runs for seven sessions of about an hour to an hour and a half (it depends on how long we chat for!) – we've been running it once a fortnight. The course is based on Mark's gospel, and in each session we read a short passage, then watch a short video to help stimulate our thinking, and then spend some time discussing things. That discussion is the best bit. It's certainly not a case of 'We have all the answers, so listen up!' – mainly because we don't have all the answers... It's much more about chatting and sharing our different experiences of life and learning from one another using the gospel as our guide.

Thanks to all those who've been involved. I've enjoyed it a lot, and I think everyone else has – at least, they keep coming back!

We're coming to the end of the course now, but we're thinking of running it again in the autumn. If you're interested in joining us or to find out more, call 07901 810013. 

Matthew 5:17-18

"Do not think that I have come to abolish the Law or the Prophets; I have not come to abolish them but to fulfil them. For truly, I say to you, until heaven and earth pass away, not an iota, not a dot, will pass from the Law until all is accomplished."

The word of God has been always been subject to attack. The first target was the content, but when properly understood the arguments put forward always evaporate. Ultimately the reliability of the text itself becomes the focus. Indeed Genesis 3 v.1 recounts that first ancient deception: "Did God really say, 'You must not eat from any tree in the garden'?

The 'modern' assault on scripture began in the 1700's with the first of the self-described higher critics, a German poet-philosopher named Gotthold Lessing. This 'enlightenment' movement sought amongst other things to replace a reliance on scripture with man's ever-changing ideas. Responding to such critics is always a battle but with God the truth is what matters, not the majority opinion of the day. To quote John 14:6: Jesus said to him, "I am the way, and the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me".

We read in the bible that the Berean Jews of Paul's time tested the scriptures for accuracy and consistency to determine if they were true. Described below are two Victorian scholars who followed in their wake.

Robert Dick Wilson (1856-1930) linguist, Presbyterian scholar and Old Testament professor, graduated from Princeton University at the age of twenty, by which time he had already mastered nine languages. He had a gift, but how to use it? At age 25 he resolved to divide his career into three 15-year segments, reasoning that he might live to the age of 70.

He took 15 years to learn every language that could offer commentary on the old testament and its times. So, in addition to Latin, Hebrew and Greek he acquired Coptic, Egyptian, Syriac, Arabic, Ethiopic, Phoenician, Babylonian, Assyrian, Aramaic (12 dialects), Armenian, Gothic, Anglo-saxon and several others, numbering in all more than 30 languages and dialects. Thus prepared, He then devoted 15 years to reading every relevant historic document he could find before committing the remaining 15 years to publishing his findings. In his major work "A Scientific Investigation of the Old Testament" he declared: "I try to give my students such an intelligent faith in the Old testament scripture that they will never doubt it as long as they live". He concluded: "I have come to the conviction that no man knows enough to assail the truthfulness of the Old Testament"

Sir William Mitchel Ramsey (1851-1939) was a contemporary and New Testament scholar, but while Robert Dick Wilson was raised as a Christian, William Ramsey certainly wasn't. He was led by the enlightenment teaching of the Tübingen theory to believe that the writings of Luke in the Gospels and the book of Acts would be wrong on almost every count, and he dutifully set about digging up the lands of Asia minor described in the travels of the apostle Paul to demonstrate this point.

Three Oxford fellowships, 6 honorary doctorates, a knighthood and an assortment of medals later he summarised his findings thus: "You may press the words of Luke in a degree beyond any other historian's and they stand the keenest scrutiny and the hardest treatment".

He concluded: "Christianity did not originate in a lie and we can and ought to demonstrate this as well as believe it."

The 2019 Methodist Conference.

A report about the business of the Methodist Conference 2019 Presidential addresses

The Revd Dr Barbara Glasson was inducted as President and Prof Clive Marsh as Vice-President of the Conference. 'So What's the Story...?' was the theme chosen by the President for her address, with the Vice-President exploring 'Pleasure, piety and politics' in his address.

Ordinations of presbyters and deacons

Twenty-two presbyters and four deacons were received into Full Connexion on Sunday morning during Conference Worship, along with seven presbyters by transfer, and one by reinstatement. Later that day ordination services took place in four venues across the region.

The Theology and Ecclesiology underpinning the Diaconate and the Methodist Diaconal Order

The Conference adopted this major report brought by the Faith and Order Committee. The report emphasises that deacons are ministers of the Church, focusing and representing a ministry of witness and service. The Conference reaffirmed that the Methodist Diaconal Order is a religious order open only to those who are deacons in Full Connexion with the Conference and that all Methodist deacons are also required to be members of the Methodist Diaconal Order. The report explored the broad ministry of proclamation as it is exercised by deacons and affirmed that preaching is part of the ministry of deacons, making proposals for how that will be worked out in practice.

3Generate

Jasmine Yeboah, Youth President, reflected on her presidential theme, encouraging young people to step outside of their comfort zone to do something courageous for Christ. In an address to the Conference, Jasmine spoke of the priority for the Church to listen to the voices of children and young people. A manifesto has been developed which includes taking action on homelessness, building relationships within communities, supporting the lonely, caring for the environment, creating safe spaces for people to listen to each other and being creative in worship. The Conference urged Local Churches actively to engage with the 3Generate manifesto, by including it on Church Council agendas and committing to intentional actions as a The manifesto response. is available www.methodist.org.uk/3genmanifestos

Climate Emergency

In 2011, the Conference adopted Hope in God's Future, which set out a Methodist understanding of the challenges facing our global ecology and the theological and ethical implications, as a Statement of the Judgment of the Conference. The Conference heard that since then, both the scientific evidence and the global ambition for action have developed further. The Council reported to the Conference that it had endorsed proposals for the development of Eco Circuits and Eco Districts along with the Eco The Conference received a Church awards. memorial from the Bristol District, which highlighted the need for urgent action on climate change. Recognising the climate emergency, the Conference endorsed the need for urgent action. Conference also adopted a notice of motion concerned with reducing the use of plastic.

Other reports included Marriage and Relationships and Housing and Homelessness.

THE BIBLE BLOG

A Tale Of The Unexpected

'In their hearts humans plan their course, but the LORD establishes their steps.' Proverbs Chapter 16 verse 9—The Bible (OT) NIV

When our plans go wrong and our lives take an unexpected turn ... we have a choice to make.

God never promised that we'd have everything our own way, and that we'd never experience disappointment and hurt.

We will often determine where we want to end up in the journey of life, but it is God who usually decides how we get there!

When our plans go wrong, and our lives take an unexpected turn, as happened to me big style last month, we have a choice to make. We can either A. be angry with God, walk away from Him, and ask 'why me?' (This is usually because we feel that things should have turned out differently i.e. in the way that we wanted), or B., we can choose to keep trusting that God is good and faithful, despite the way we feel. We'd probably all like to choose the second option, but when we're in the middle of a disappointment we may well feel more drawn to the first. God never promised that we'd have everything our own way, and that we'd never experience disappointment and hurt. But He does promise to never leave us, no matter what we're facing or what we're feeling. And He promises to work all things for the best (have a look at Romans Ch. 8 v. 28 (NT)). When an irritant like grit or a tiny parasite, gets into an oyster's shell, the oyster gets to work to make it more manageable. It wraps it in layers of a substance called 'nacre', until a smooth pearl is formed. The oyster takes something unexpected and irritating, and turns it into something comfortable and beautiful. And that's what God can do with our disappointments and unexpected situations - He can turn them into something beneficial and beautiful. The Bible says, 'In their hearts humans plan their course, but the Lord establishes their steps.' God's in control of our lives because He can see the bigger picture. We may well make our plans as the verse says but His plans are far better than anything we can come up with ourselves. Isaiah Ch. 55 v. 19 (OT) says: 'As the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways and my thoughts than your thoughts'. We will often determine where we want to end up in the journey of life, but it is God who usually decides how we get there! We need to remember that God is at work in what we're going through now, today - for our good and His glory. All we need to do is to keep on trusting Him and persevere.

What Now?

Spend a little time researching how oysters make pearls (nacre). Then thank God that He can transform your disappointments and hurts into something beautiful and valuable. After that, let Him!
















What is the Leeswood & Pontblyddyn Age & Dementia Friendly Steering Group?

CEMETERY

Mr Aled Davies, Cemetery Sub-Contractor, met Councillors and Clerk on site at the Cemetery. A discussion took place about the plans for work in the new extension. Mr Davies expressed concern that the proposed drain along the top boundary of the new extension may not be sufficient to deal with potential water issues on the site. It was agreed by all Councillors that the drain should be out in as soon as possible, weather permitting, and the ground

could be inspected following this to see if any further drainage work is required. Observation was made that the existing Cemetery had 'lost' graves due to the poor layout over the years and that it is important to ensure that the plots in the new extension were marked out to achieve maximum capacity available. Query arose as to whether the fence separating the existing Cemetery and the new extension should be removed in its entirety. Reluctance at doing this was expressed because at the present this provided some sort of deterrent to moles and rabbits. The clay spoil in the existing Cemetery is to be moved to the bottom boundary of the new extension and the land there to be built up with the intention of putting a Remembrance Garden there in the future.

It was proposed by Councillor D. Foster and seconded by Councillor J. Caruana that Mr Davies should do whatever is necessary in order to put the drain in along the top boundary and to move the clay when weather permits. All Councillors were in agreement.

Technical Corner

Joseph Caruana

I have recently come across an old piece of machinery, and I was pleased to see that it was still in good working order. What I was really pleased about was that the machine in question was totally made in this country. This goes to show that when things were made in this country they were made to last. In those days people use to put their inspirations into practice and they were probably motivated by identifying a need which did lead them to produce an industrial solution to meet that need. What probably gave that generation a competitive edge, was that they had a more practical hand-on approach, and therefore understood the behaviour of the machines they developed. With this in mind, they applied the necessary precaution for the smooth running of the machine, which they designed to last forever. By making these machines to last so long, they carved a place in history, which will forever belong to them.

By having such a strong industrial past, it is possible that we can analyse the ways and systems which they applied in the development of their machines, and further develop the results from the analysis to achieve even greater results. However, to do this one needs to have an incentive, and the incentive is normally in the form of a reward in terms of financial well being. There are allot of individuals, who possess the talent to develop industrial projects to a level which would compete with excellence on the word market. If there are these individuals, with these abilities at their disposal, why are we not seeing more industrial developments? Could it be because they do not have the initial financial resources to start the ball rolling? Could it be because they do not have the expertise to market the final product, or could it be a combination of both? Whichever it is, it could be said that someone needs to address the situation and tap into these human resources to create wealth and prosperity within the industrial sector. In many cases, inventors are not properly appreciated. A fine example of this is when the Wright brothers come up with the idea of making an aeroplane. The powers that be of that time, could not understand that a machine which was heavier then air could fly. The Wright brothers did their best to persuade investor to invest in the invention, but for some reason

no one shown an interest. Unfortunately the Wright brothers pursued their invention else were. Nevertheless, the Wright brothers were from this country and they were inspired when they were in this country, therefore the invention was a British invention.

There could be another issue which could cause a problem with inventors. As an invention could be rather complex, an inventor could find it difficult to explain the invention to other people, because although an idea could look easy as a vision, it may prove difficult to either explain it verbally or put it on paper. It would therefore be a good idea to develop means to aid people with new ideas to be able to convey their intellectuality in a manner that could be easily understood and translated into industrial terms. With this in mind, one could open a number of opportunities which could be developed in a profitable industrial success.

It might be right to say, that we have a great opportunity to shape the future, and it is up to us to further develop of industrial heritage which has been left to us by our predecessors. It is good to feel proud that we carried on building on what we inherited, rather than relying on cheap imports made on the other side of the world.


FOOTPATHS and BRIDLE WAYS

Where **footpaths** are also public rights of way, they are shown on the Ordnance Survey Map as a green dotted line, [actually it's more of a dash than a dot] The **fields** they cross are shown with thin black borders. Stiles and gates are not shown on the OS Map, so it's always a surprise to find out how a footpath crosses from one field to another. Will it be a stile or a gate?

Some footpaths are known as **permissive** paths, meaning that the public are allowed to walk on them, although they are not public rights of way. Sometimes **permissive paths** are only open to the public at certain times of the year, for instance on National Trust property [Chirk Castle is a good example]. These paths are shown in red dotted [or dashed] lines.

Bridleways, which were originally "roads" used by horse drawn vehicles or people on horseback, as the name implies, are shown on the OS Map as green dots.


A **road** is shown with its edges in black, coloured in various ways, **red** for a main [A] road, **amber** for a B road, and **yellow** for a minor road. This yellow colour is darker where the road is more than 4m wide. Other, smaller roads [including **bridleways**] are shown without colour.



Where a footpath starts from a road, there should be some form of indication, a fingerpost or a waymark of some kind. Where these indications are missing it makes it harder for walkers to find the way off the road, where a footpath begins. You can sometimes spend ages looking for the right way in. The local authority is responsible for placing these signs in position.

I've reached Hay-on-Wye now on my Border Trail. By and large it's been possible to walk on footpaths, bridleways and minor roads [and one or two main roads, where no footpath exists – horrendous] But there is a great variation in the standard of maintenance I have to say that the richer the County [Cheshire] for example, the of these footpaths. better the provision of waymarks, fingerposts, stiles and walkers' gates. A county like Powys, however, which is the largest Welsh County in terms of geographical spread [and therefore with the most miles of footpaths] but with the smallest population pro rata, and therefore the lowest in terms of revenue from Council Tax here the standard of maintenance is not so good. In these days of austerity, of course, such Councils do not have the resources to keep up the maintenance of schools, even, and footpaths I'm afraid, come very low down in the list of priorities. These should be reported to Leeswood Community Council and Flintshire County Council.
