There is an account of Bertrand Russell giving a public lecture defending his atheism when he was asked: "And Lord Russell, what will you say when you stand before the throne of God on judgment day?" Russell replied: "I will say: 'I'm terribly sorry, but you didn't give us enough evidence.". I suppose a short response would be "Why did you not more diligently seek him out?" (Luke 11:9 - And I say unto you, Ask, and it shall be given you: seek, and ye shall find: knock, and it shall be opened unto you.). Many require a more detailed response than this. Here is an account of a extraordinarily detailed response to a critic. On Sunday November 19th, 1899 a Russian émigré to America by the name of Ivan Panin picked up a copy of the New York Sun which had for some months been devoting most of a page to debating the truth of Christianity. On that date it printed a letter from one W.R.L., in which he denounced Christianity, and demanded some "facts" in defence of the Christian religion. Panin, a mathematics professor responded thus: Sir: In to-day's Sun Mr. W.R.L. calls for a "champion of orthodoxy" to "step into the arena of the Sun;' and give him some "facts." Here are some facts:

The first 17 verses of the New Testament contain the genealogy of the Christ. It consists of two main parts: Verses 1-11 cover the period from Abraham, the father of the chosen people, to the Captivity, when they ceased as an independent people. Verses 12-17 cover the period from the Captivity to the promised Deliverer, the Christ.

Let us examine the first part of this genealogy. Its vocabulary has 49 words, or 7 x 7. This number is itself seven sevens and the sum of its factors is 2 sevens. Of these 49 words 28, or 4 sevens, begin with a vowel; and 21, or 3 sevens, begin with a consonant. Again: these 49 words of the vocabulary have 266 letters, or 7 x 2 x 19; this number is itself 38 sevens, and the sum of its factors is 28, or 4 sevens, while the sum of its figures is 14, or 2. Of these 266 letters, moreover, 140, or 20 sevens, are vowels, and 126, or 18 sevens, are consonants. That is to say: Just as the number of words in the vocabulary is a multiple of seven, so is the number of its letters a multiple of seven; just as the sum of the factors of the number of the words is a multiple of seven, so is the sum of the factors of the number of their letters a multiple of seven. And just as the number of words is divided between vowel words and consonant words by sevens. so is their number of letters divided between vowels and consonants by sevens.

Again: Of these 49 words 35, or 5 sevens, occur more than once in the passage; and 14, or 2 sevens, occur but once; seven occur in more than one form, and 42, or 6 sevens, occur in only one form. And among the parts of speech the 49 words are thus divided: 42, or 6 sevens, are nouns, seven are not nouns. Of the nouns 35 or 5 sevens, are Proper names, seven are common nouns. Of the Proper names 28 are male ancestors of the Christ, and seven are not Moreover, these 49 words are distributed alphabetically thus: Words under A-E are 21 in number, or 3 sevens; Z-K 14, or 2 sevens; M-X also 14. No other groups of sevens stopping at the end of a letter are made by these 49 words, the groups of sevens stop with these letters and no others. But the letters A, E, Z, K, M, X, are letters 1, 5, 6, 10, 12, 22, of the Greek alphabet, and the sum of these numbers (called their Place Values) is 56, or 8 sevens.

Panin's full response ran to 50 pages! In it he demonstrated that the entirety of the New testament is constructed on an elaborate design of sevens which no human author could ever hope to accomplish. Truly we can be confident, as affirmed in

Psalm 118: v8 - It is better to trust in the Lord than to put confidence in man.



MAES GARMON

If 1869 saw a battle in the streets of Mold, you would need to go back as far as AD 420 to find Mold's first recorded Battle. According to the chronicles of the monk Bede, it was in this year that 'Saint Garmon' led the Christian Welsh to victory over pagan Saxons and Picts. narrow valley, and as the opposing forces reached a Welshmen hid behind trees in a clearing, the Welsh came out of hiding and under the guidance of their saintly leader shouted "Hallelujah" three times and brandished their weapons and flags. Their voices echoed from the rocks, leading the enemy to believe there were many more fighters. In a panic the invaders dropped their weapons on the ground and rushed away. Some fell into the river, it is said, and were drowned.

Bede does not identify the exact spot where the battle took place, but in the 17th Century Archbishop Ussher suggested it happened on farmland at Maes Garmon, just outside the town of Mold. In 1736 a member of the gentry, Nehemiah Griffith of Rual, erected a column on land nearby. Engraved on the column are the words, in Latin, "In the year 420 the Picts and the Saxons made war with their combined army against the Britons in this country, known as Maes Garmon today."

This column, or obelisk, is on private land, but it is possible to walk to Maes Garmon from the Take the road to Gwernaffield [there is a pavement for much of the way] and turn off left down Maes Garmon lane. You can imagine, if you wish, where the Hallellujah battle took place, and then walk back to Mold over fields.

Martin Hackett in his book, "Lost Battlefields of Wales" has difficulty connecting this site with the story. Where are the rocky slopes? Where is the narrow valley? And is the river deep enough to drown soldiers? Some scholars say the famous battle took place elsewhere, by the side of the River Dee, perhaps, near Valle Crucis. Others suggest the Nant y Garth pass near Llanarmon-yn-yal. Perhaps several battles and several stories have been blended together.

Who was Saint Garmon anyway? There was a Saint Germanus, a bishop from France, who came to Britain in 429, but "Germanus" does not translate naturally into the Welsh Garmon. Interestingly there is a Welsh word, Garmon, stemming from Garm, meaning a "shout" Perhaps that is the connection?

There is another problem, however: would a Bishop lead Christian forces into "war"? though there are some instances in Wales of such an event taking place. It has become a well remembered story, anyway, and provides us with a history of another "battle" near Mold.

This is all well and good, but, of course, it is essential that we are part of that kingdom in the first place, and not 'pretenders' or outsiders looking in.

*To live 'righteously' means to be virtuous, just, blameless, honourable, honest and upright.

Amen means 'So be it'!

need to keep up with everyone else, and that we're not valuable if we don't have the things that magazines, cold callers, adverts, the telly and friends tell us we need. But living God's way means we're at peace because we're living for the approval of God, not people and their/our culture. He's the One who provides for our needs, and these needs are not always material, but spiritual and/or emotional. And in Him we find our value and identity too because He loves us. The Bible says: 'Seek the Kingdom of God above all else, and live righteously*, and he will give you everything you need.' Notice that Matthew doesn't say that God will give you everything you WANT, but what you NEED. There is a difference! Often we are not happy with that difference either! So, what does it mean to 'seek the kingdom'? Here are a few ideas: 1) We look out for opportunities to serve other people and put them before ourselves. 2) We sacrifice our time, abilities and resources to help bring kingdom values such as peace, love, and joy to those around us. 3) We look to God when we're making decisions, and ask Him to help us live according to His will. 4) We rely on Him to meet all our needs, and trust that He has good plans for us. This is great stuff, but, it is essential that we have sought and found that kingdom in the first place, which is now in our heart and soul, and that we are not 'pretenders' or outsiders looking in. In Micah Ch. 6 v. 8 (OT) CEV The Bible says: The LORD God has told us what is right and what he demands: "See that justice is done, let mercy

POLICE LIAISON

PCSO 3684 Peter Jones was unable to attend this evening. He had forwarded a report to the Clerk which was circulated to Councillors.

<u>Incident update</u> - (from 30/05/2019 to 01/07/2019)

<u>Crime Issues / Trends</u> This Month

<u>Ffordd Derw, Leeswood</u> – Criminal damage offence, front bumper of car damaged which was parked on driveway overnight. CCTV of this incident which shows a male causing a damage. Officers have seized the CCTV and investigations are ongoing.

ASB Issues

<u>Llys Ann, Leeswood</u> – Caller stated that she could hear a big disturbance on a nearby street with a lot of shouting but could not see anything. Officers attended but could not find anything as described.

Suspicious Activity

Bryn Clyd, Leeswood – caller reporting concerns after finding a man wandering the street. Caller stated that he was wearing a call help button which contacted callers care line but when answered they had no idea who the male was. Officers managed to get in touch with his family and made sure he was safe.

DEFIBRILLATOR AT THE COMMUNITY CENTRE, LEESWOOD

The North Wales Ambulance Service have been in contact about the Defibrillator in the Community Centre. This is currently recorded with them as unavailable to use. An estimation of costs to site this defibrillator in an outside cabinet to make it more accessible has been given, £354 for an unlocked cabinet, £384 for a locked cabinet. A fully certified professional installation of the cabinet could cost between £90 and £190. If the Ambulance Service were able to have any time access to the defibrillator they would need the make and model of it as there is a possibility of it going to the hospital with them and these details are required so it can be returned to the Community.

Comment was made that as the defibrillator had been purchased through the fundraising efforts of Mrs Louise Fennell, then it would only be courteous to approach her about this. Councillor G. Sherwood proposed that, if Mrs Fennell was in agreement, the defibrillator should be sited outside the Community Centre in a locked cabinet. The Community Council to stand the cost for this and any further maintenance. This was seconded by Councillor D.K. Crowther. All Councillors in agreement. Councillor R. Hughes, Chairman, was to speak with Mrs Fennell.

CEMETERY

Councillors noted that the Cemetery was looking very well. It was pointed out that Mr Aled Davies and his team were doing a very good job there. All Councillors were in agreement that they are very pleased with the Cemetery. Councillor G. Sherwood had been to investigate the potential of a water leak at the Cemetery. Hafren Dyfrdwy had read the Church water meter in error and applied it to the Community Council Cemetery account so there is no leak. The Clerk to contact Hafren Dyfrdwy in regard to this.

AGE FRIENDLY COMMUNITIES

Councillor G. Sherwood advised that a Dementia Friendly event would be taking place at Ysgol Derwenfa next week. The Book Club is to be launched on 17th July 2019.

Councillor R. Hughes, Chairman, pointed out that the Community Café is still well supported but new volunteers are required to help out.

PARKING ISSUES – BELL'S CORNER AND JUNCTION OF BRYN CLYD/KING STREET

The Clerk reported that she had e-mailed Mr Lee Shone of Highways, Flintshire County Council advising that this Council no longer wished to proceed with double yellow lines on the junction of Bryn Clyd/King Street. No response to this e-mail had been received. It was pointed out that parking on the pavement at Bell's Corner has started again, Councillor J. Atkinson confirmed that she had noticed this tonight as she came to the meeting. Councillor R. Hughes, Chairman, advised that he would speak to Mr Shone of Highways, Flintshire County Council about this matter with urgency.

150TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE MOLD RIOTS, 2019

Mr Kevin Matthias, Chair of the Daniel Owen Festival had sent e-mail correspondence asking if this Community Council would be prepared to fund some transport from Mold to Leeswood on the afternoon of the proposed walk from Leeswood to Mold on Sunday 20th October 19 for walkers to return home or back to their cars. It was agreed by all Councillors that the Community Council would fund the cost of a bus to transport people back to Leeswood from Mold.

WELSH NHS AMBULANCE TRUST – FEED-BACK FROM CARERS

Members had been circulated with e-mail correspondence from the Older People's Commissioner, over the course of the last year the Patient Experience & Community Involvement Team within the Welsh Ambulance Services NHS Trust have been engaging with and collating feedback from carers (especially older carers) that has demonstrated the importance to better understand their needs. Carers have said that they are reluctant to seek help for themselves due to carer responsibilities. A survey is being carried out to capture more indepth information to help develop the approach to improving experiences and outcomes for carers. This Carers Survey is now live and can be completed bilingually via the same link. The correspondence was accepted.

FLINTSHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL STANDARDS COMMITTEE – VISITS TO TOWN AND COMMUNITY COUNCILS

Correspondence from Gareth Owens, Chief Officer Governance, Flintshire County Council had been circulated to all Councillors. This is Mr Owens' fifth update regarding the visits by the Independent Members of the Standards Committee to Town/Community Council meetings to observe practice and gain an understanding of how local council business is conducted. The findings from further visits undertaken in January, February and March 2019 were reported to the Committee on the 3rd June and Mr Owens is writing with feedback to all Town/ Community Councils to give assurance on good practice and procedures. As with previous reported visits, the four Independent Members agreed that these had been positive experiences and again praised the level of

commitment and contributions by those in attendance.

Although outside the scope of the visits to Town and Community Councils it has become apparent that a number of Councils are losing their clerks, and that Councils generally are finding it increasingly difficult to recruit. Mr Owens is aware that several Councils employ the same clerk though they do so as separate employers and therefore do not share the costs of training and the time/effort of appraising and developing the clerk.

The Independent Members have also commented on the difficulties they sometimes encounter in locating information on Council websites. Each Council should, of course, be free to choose the design and layout of their websites to reflect their local priorities. However, the statutory requirements for what it must include are listed below and the key point is that residents must be able to find basic information (such as dates, times and agendas for meetings) quickly and easily.

Under the Local Government (Democracy) (Wales) Act 2013 a Community Council must publish the following matters on its website:

- (a) information on how to contact it and, if different, its clerk including —
- a telephone number;
- a postal address;
- an email address;
- (b) information about each of its members, including —

the member's name;

how the member may be contacted;

the member's party affiliation (if any);

the ward which the member represents (where relevant);

any office of the council held by the member; any committee of the council to which the member belongs;

(c) the minutes of the proceedings of the Council's meetings and (in so far as is

- reasonably practicable) any documents which are referred to in the minutes;
- (d) any audited statement of the council's accounts:
- (e) the register of members' interests.

FLINTSHIRE LOCAL DEVELOPMENT PLAN UPDATE

Correspondence from Andrew Roberts, Service Manager – Strategy, Flintshire County Council had been circulated to all members. This correspondence advises that the LDP will be placed on Deposit for consultation in September 2019. Prior to this the draft Deposit LDP will be reported to Flintshire County Council on Tuesday 23rd July 2019. This was accepted.

LEESWOOD MEMORIAL CENTENARY FIELDS

Members had been circulated with a copy of email correspondence from Fiona Mocko, Strategic Policy Advisor, Flintshire County Council, advising that Flintshire County Council have been successful in applying for Leeswood Memorial to be registered as a Centenary Field. Councillors expressed their pleasure at this information.

COUNTY COUNCIL MATTERS

- a) <u>Constitution Hill, Leeswood</u> grass growing out of the grids, Flintshire County Council will unblock these. Water remains on the concrete blocks on the bridge, Flintshire County Council will repair, but needs permission from the Railways first.
- b) <u>School Buses</u> there has been a lot of press recently regarding the charges being made to transport a child to School if they wish to attend their non-designated Secondary School. The dividing point for Leeswood is the Community Centre area, with the bottom side of the village attending Castell Alun High School and the top side of the village attending the Alun School. Many parents have expressed their dismay at these changes.

Technical Corner

Joseph Caruana

We all want our industry to be the best in the world, and we all take great pride when we are told that our products are world leader in their field. We do not have to look very far to spot British products showing the technological capabilities and technical expertise which we have at our disposal in this country. For those of us that has been abroad during the summer holidays might have noticed that most of the aeroplanes are powered by Rolls Royce engines. Rolls Royce engine has been the flag ship of our industry for many many years, and they have brought allot of revenue into the country. Nevertheless, we sometimes take these things for granted, and we do not appreciate the effort by those involved in keeping such a national brand at the pinnacle of world class manufacturing.

There are different formulas that can be applied to measure the level of world class manufacturing within an industrial establishment, however, they all give an accurate figure which can be used as a base for further devel-Obviously, if a manufacturing opments. establishment does not apply its available time with at least seventy per cent effectiveness, a manufacturing establishment falls below world class manufacturing. lf а product manufactured at an establishment which operates below world class level, the product is likely to be more expensive, because it took longer to produce a finished product.

Looking busy does not necessarily translate into wealth creation, and one can look busy moving things around the shop floor without adding value of the product. We need to understand the difference between value added action and non value added action. Transportation of goods halfway around the globe does not add any value to a finished or semi finished product. To the contrary, moving things about can sometimes have a negative effect and a costly outcome. The smaller a manufacturing organisation is, the more efficient it needs to conduct its operations. This is because it will not be in a position to afford wastage, neither in time nor in material let alone manpower.

As today's society is controlled by the finances, it may not be possible to embark on a costly industrial adventure just for the sake of someone's dream. From my experience in Industry, I have seen many investments which did not make any profitable returns, and some of them did not even enter production. With this in mind, an overall picture needs to be analysed so that practical investment is applied from the very beginning.

Going back to lean manufacturing, it is of interest to mention that the number of defects is no longer measured in percentage terms, but in parts per million, and one defective part in a million parts produced is not acceptable by certain manufacturers. To achieve this high level of quality, a process capability control is put into practice. This is a system which measures how closely identical each and every manufactured item is within a preset limit. The narrower the preset limit is, the more efficient the process is, and the more efficient the process is, the leaner a manufacturing establishment is.

Manufacturers these days come in different forms, sizes, and competition comes from all over the world. We are no longer competing with manufacturers within one nation or with manufacturers within a few selected nations, but with manufacturers from all over the world. It is due to this aspect that goods must be manufactured to a world class level because they will face stiff international competition. Companies have to produce what the customer wants or the customer will go elsewhere. It is therefore imperative, that prior to any major investment, a comprehensive research is undertaken to establish what the demand is going to be.

There is allot of analysis that a progressive company does conduct in order to hit the ground running when it launches a new product. One wrong move, or one aspect overlooked and the whole project will come crushing down with a strong possibility that a few million pound has been poured down the drain. A progressive manufacturing company might also need to anticipate what the competition is going to come up with in order to keep one or two steps ahead. To conclude, I would like to emphasise that for a manufacturing establishment to be successful, a positive collective effort needs to be adopted, implemented, and maintained.

LEESWOOD AND THE 2019 DANIEL OWEN FESTIVAL

The Daniel Owen Festival is held every year in October in and around the town of Mold.

This year the festival runs between the 19th and 26th of October. It celebrates the arts, literature and heritage of the area with a local Welsh emphasis. It is named after the Welsh language author Daniel Owen who was born and lived in Mold, and whose birthday and the anniversary of his death falls in the same month. The full programme is to be found on www.danielowenfestival.com and Leeswood is the venue for two of this year's events.

2019 is the 150th anniversary of the Mold Riots and Theatr Clwyd's community play of the same name, based on the events of 1869 will be the central feature of the Daniel Owen Festival this year. Industrial unrest and violence in Leeswood, Coed Talon and Treuddyn were the causes of the tragedy which happened in Mold later.

The first event is a walk from Leeswood Community Centre to Tyddyn Street chapel, Mold on Sunday afternoon 20 October: 'In the footsteps of the rioters'. Walkers will be greeted with a well-deserved cuppa by chapel members and have a chance to see a display about the riots and learn a little about the history and causes of the event. Children at Ysgol Derwenfa will be creating art work and banners helped by Theatr Clwyd, for the walkers to carry! The walk starts at 1:30 and full details of the route, etc. will appear on the Festival's website. Leeswood and Pontblyddyn Community Council have generously organised transport back to the Centre at 5:30.

The second item in the programme is a guided walk around the places in Leeswood and Pontybodkin associated with the 1869 riot and the history of its industry on Thursday morning, 24th October starting at 10:30 at the Community Centre. These are only two of the events in a packed week so I hope to see you in one or two of them.
